POULTRY MEN TO BE GIVEN FIELD SERVICE

Douglas County Flour Mills Secures Services of H. E. Gurney.

WILL AID EXPANSION

Company's Action Is Expected to Result in Immediate Growth of Industry in County.

A step that is expected to result in immediate benefit to the poultry industry of Douglas county has been taken by the Douglas County Flour Mills, one of the county's largest distributing agencies for all kinds of poultry feeds and supplies. The company has secured the services of H. E. Gurney, of Winchester, one of the county's best known and most successful poultrymen, as a full time fieldman and poultry adviser and it will be his duty to aid all poultrymen in increasing production and profits. As a result of the company's action in making such advice and assistance available to poultrymen, it is expected that there will be an immediate growth in the poultry industry as the more inexperienced growers will have an opportunity to avail themselves of the information secured by Mr. Gurney through long years of practical experience.

Mr. Gurney has had both the practical and theoretical training and experience in the poultry business, and his work in this county gives him a complete knowledge of local conditions making his services particularly valuable to the growers in the Empire Valley.

The company is providing this service without cost and any grower is invited to consult with Mr. Gurney at any time regarding poultry problems. Mr. Gurney will spend five days of each week in field work and will visit the poultry farms wherever he is invited and will assist the poultrymen in making improvements and outlining schedules that will aid in production and reduce losses and operating costs. On each Saturday afternoon he is to be at his office in Roseburg where he may be consulted by poultrymen.

He will continue to operate his farm at Winchester, but will place some experienced man in charge of the business so that he will only have to superintend the work at his place. It is also planned to use his farm for various experiments to secure additional information for the poultrymen of the county.

Mr. Albert Bashford, manager of the Douglas County Flour Mills, has been exceedingly active in promotion of the poultry industry, and a great deal of the success has resulted from his personal efforts. For a long time he maintained a truck service to aid the poultrymen in getting the produce to market. He still provides this help to some districts not served by the truck line. He has also donated the use of his mill for a depot where eggs are loaded for trucking to the packing plant at Eugene.

Mr. Bashford feels that there is a great future for the poultry industry in Douglas county and is encouraging the expansion of the industry in every possible way. The new plan adopted by the company will doubtless be a very important step in such expansion as it will relieve, in a large measure, the necessity for a new man in the business to develop his poultry business slowly because of lack of experience, for the advice available will safeguard him in his investment and operations.

BANKRUPTCY GROWS FROM GASOLINE WAR

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22.—The first casualty in Portland's gasoline price war has been filed. A voluntary petition in bankruptcy has been filed in federal district court here by William E. Johnson, Inc., operator of two filling stations. Liabilities were placed at \$27,475.43 and assets at \$29,169.15.

PORTLAND PEPS UP WARFARE ON YEGGS

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 22.—Pope here today were engaged in warfare against safekeepers, although the first shot of the war was yet to be fired. Plans for a campaign to clear the city of criminals were laid at a conference of all commanding officers last night. Since November 1, fifteen safes have been blasted in Portland. From twelve of these, \$5,500 in cash has been taken. As a result of the conference many patrolmen will be taken from the day and night night shifts and placed on special duty at night. They have orders to arrest all suspicious characters.

IRRIGATION OF FARMS ON COW CREEK PLANNED

be retired by annual levies against the land involved. The bonds, according to present plans, would be purchased by the farmers themselves so that there would be little money sent outside the district.

Low Operating Cost
The plan for the irrigation development has been drawn by Ben Irving of Roseburg, surveyor and irrigation engineer. Under the proposed system the water would be taken from Cow creek by pumps operated either by electricity or Diesel engines. Electric power is available and if the cost is not found prohibitive it is proposed to use electricity rather than oil.

The pumps would be operated for about three months out of year, depending, of course, upon seasonal conditions. Water would be furnished each tract from a pipe line 2 1/2 miles in length. The natural slope of the land makes it possible to give each consumer the necessary water at a very low cost.

It is estimated that the cost of operation will be between \$5,000 and \$6,000 annually, or about \$6 per acre, which will be considerably lower than the average district where the annual cost usually runs from \$10 to \$15 per acre, and often as high as \$20 per acre. Bond retirement, over a period of 10 years, will be less than \$5 per acre.

Land Well Located
Not only is the land well located for irrigation purposes, but it is also situated so that the farmers can easily get out their produce. Two roads cross the district in each direction, one of the roads running between Ribble and Canbyville and the other following up Cow creek, both being well developed county roads.

The land now bears some very valuable orchards, and new plantings are planned by several of the growers. A large part of the land will be planted to alfalfa, clover and other crops particularly profitable on irrigated lands.

Plans Approved
A committee composed of O. V. Leeson, Fred E. Fornkorn and J. H. Griggs has been appointed to take charge of the organization work and preparation of preliminary plans. This committee, together with Mr. Irving, has just returned from Salem where the project was placed before the state engineer and was given official approval.

PORTLAND QUACK FOUND GUILTY OF LARCENY ATTEMPT

PORTLAND, Jan. 22.—P. J. Kolar, who posed as an X-ray specialist and "bloodless surgeon," was convicted of attempt to commit larceny today by District Judge Fredrickson. The case was heard without a jury.

The defense failed to put a witness on the stand, and closed its case a few minutes after the court denied a motion to dismiss the case but ruled that the maximum verdict possible would be to "attempt to commit larceny by trickery."

Motion to dismiss the case was based on the fact that Edna Christie, Kolar's X-ray expert and the complaining witness, knew she was victimized when she paid Kolar \$15 for his X-ray plates. Kolar was charged with using two X-ray plates for various patients, one plate showing an unhealthy condition and the other

GERMANY HONORS MEMORY OF NOTED WRITER, LESSING

BERLIN, Jan. 22.—The bicentenary of the birth of Gotthold Ephraim Lessing, noted German dramatist and critic, was celebrated throughout Germany today. As part of the celebration, a group of residents of Cleveland, Ohio, who are visiting here plan to present a bust of the author to the City of Kamen, upper Lusatia, where Lessing was born.

In turn the government has decided to present to the public library of Cleveland a copy of a portrait of Lessing by Wilhelm Tischbein now in the national gallery in Berlin.

Government radio stations throughout Germany devoted today's program to readings from Lessing's dramas. In the course of the week the Prussian state theater will stage various of the plays. The government has authorized the issuance of Lessing memorial silver coins.

CHICAGO ROUNDUP OF CROOKS LEAVES 303 IN THE JAILS

CHICAGO, Jan. 22.—Of the more than 1,000 prisoners taken in Chicago's greatest roundup last week, only 303 remained in cells today.

Police promised these would be released by formal court discharge, paroled or identified and booked on a specific charge before night-fall.

By far the largest number were in the detective bureau, a check of the cells showing 282. Two hundred of these were to be arraigned in the South State Street court on a disorderly conduct charge, and 41 others were to be sent to the boys, the morals, or the racketeering courts.

The majority of the outlying police stations reported they were clear of the "clean-up raid" prisoners.

OREGON'S FIRE LOSS

SALEM, Or., Jan. 22.—The total fire loss in Oregon outside of Portland was \$1,177,000, says a report by Clara A. Lee, state insurance commissioner and fire marshal. This was less than for the years 1924 and 1926 but greater than for 1925 and 1927. The loss during December was \$147,000.

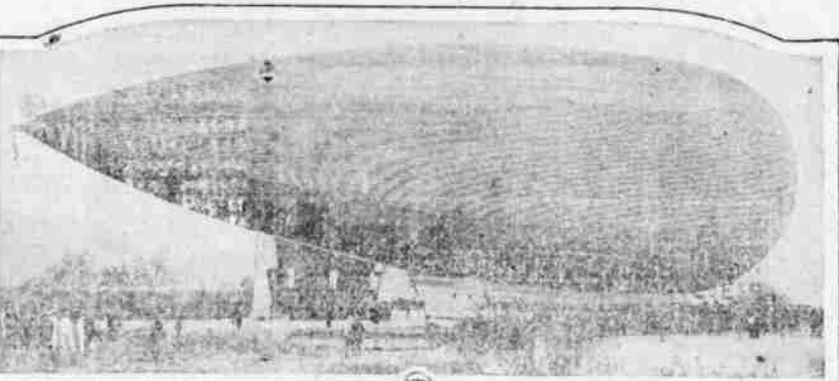

Big New Lake in the Making for Arizonans



Now that the famous Coolidge dam is completed at a cost of \$5,500,000, a new lake is forming in Arizona. Behind the gigantic dam waters of the Colorado and Gila rivers will eventually form a lake 21 miles long. The dam is of multiple-dams construction, 220 feet high, and will make possible irrigation of 122,628 acres and generation of electric power. Across the dam crest is the highway connecting Globe and Safford.

All-Metal Steam Dirigible Soon to Fly



The first all-metal steam-driven dirigible ever constructed is due to take the air soon at Glendale, Calif., on its first flight. 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OREGON STATE TO MEET DETROIT IN POST SEASON GAME

CORVALLIS, Jan. 22.—Paul J. Schaefer, head football coach and director of athletics at Oregon State college, returned to the campus today following a month's trip to the East where he attended meetings of coaches and arranged an intercollegiate football game.

The game arranged with Detroit university is expected to be one of the leading post-season clashes of the middle west, as Coach Gus Dorais had an undefeated team in 1928, and losses but one or two men.

SUICIDES HEAD VIOLENT DEATHS IN MULTNOMAH

PORTLAND, Jan. 22.—Suicides led by a large number the violent deaths in Multnomah county in 1928, an annual report of the coroner shows. Of the 343 violent deaths in the county last year, there were 160 suicides, 72 deaths from automobile accidents, 29 from falls, 21 from acute alcoholism, 14 drownings and nine murders.

The suicides include 20 by gunshot, fourteen by poison, 12 by gas, 12 by hanging, four drownings, two by dramatics, seven by knife wounds and one by suffocation.
