Lewis Cass Haines, Oregon pio-
neer and son of Alfred Haines and
Sarah Haines, was born October
12, 1859, and died December 23,
1928. He was 68 years 2 months
and 11 days old. He crossed the
plains with his parents in 1887 and
with them settled at Elkhart. There
he lived until a young man. He
made his home in San Francisco,
where he was engaged in work as
a street car conductor, for many
years. He became a member of the
Baptist church when quite young
and was a constant member until
the time when he moved to Elkhart
20 years ago. At that time he be-
came a member of the M. E.
church and served it faithfully un-
til death.

In 1911 he was married to Miss
Fannie Hawyers, by whom he is
survived. He is also survived by a
sister and two brothers, Mrs. Wm.
White of Roseburg, James A.
Haines of Eugene and Edward E.
Haines of Oakland.

ENGLAND AND U. S. NEED HEART CHAT. McDONALD SAYS

Unhappy Relations Grow
Worse Owing to 'Sulky
Suspicion,' Avers
Ex-Premier.

(Associated Press London Wire)
NEW YORK, Jan. 24.—An ap-
peal for active efforts by the gov-
ernments of the United States and
Great Britain to remove the "sulky
suspicion" which has crept into
the relations between the two coun-
tries is made by Ramsay MacDon-
ald, former British labor premier,
in an article appearing in "The
Nation."

"This is no case for private and
unofficial action and conferences,"
Mr. MacDonald says. "The govern-
ments must act. Both countries
ought to appoint five or six of
their most outstanding public men
representative of the whole nation
to meet and drag from the obscure
corners of ships are being built
and why both nations went to the
Geneva naval conference on the
assumption that war was possible.
"Why do not the statesmen act?"
he asks. "If they are acting why
do they not give us comfort by in-
forming us that they are? Is no at-
tempt to be made to clear up the
confusion of the freedom of the
seas? Has neither of us the cour-
age to discuss with the other what
the interests and obligations of
both are in, and to the world and
each other."

Pertinent Questions
He suggests that both nations
get down to reality, particularly on
the naval question and bring to
a common table for discussion the
reason why ships are being built
and why both nations went to the
Geneva naval conference on the
assumption that war was possible.

Naval Pact "Bungling"
The recent naval accord between
France and Great Britain, which
Mr. MacDonald characterizes as
being also a military agreement, is
described by the former premier
as illustrating the "bungling" of
so much of Great Britain's foreign
affairs by the present government.
"Do not believe that it was de-
vised against the United States,"
he says. "It was simply stupid, it
sacrificed our own national inter-
ests for more than it menaced
yours."
