BOSTON, Jan. 26.—The Commercial Bulletin will say today: "The market this week has been rather on the quiet side. There has been an increasing interest in wool on the part of the manufacturers, however, as the week has progressed, more especially in the finer wools and one or two of the large mills have already secured a sizeable nest egg in fine Texas wools against the new season, or possibly

against current contracts, for the mills have still a fair volume of old business on the books.

"New prices named by the American Woolen company on staples, practically unchanged, or in a few numbers slightly lower than six months ago, should prove attractive to the buyers of cloth.

"Contracting in the west is supposed to be fairly steady, although fine wools are not quite up to the level of early December either in London or in the colonies. Combed wools are very firm."

ROCKY MOUNTAIN STATES IN GRIP OF SEVERE COLD

Roads and Trains Blocked and Water Freezes in Fire Hose; Costly Fires Occur.

DENVER, Jan. 25.—More snow, in many sections of the Rocky Mountain region, and continuation of the Arctic temperatures for today was the portion the weather man served out to the mountain states today.

Colorado received the coldest weather of the winter last night. Temperatures hovered around zero or below.

Montana, with a temperature of 23 degrees below at Miles City, expected more snow.

Wyoming yesterday had cold weather with the temperature at Sheridan 30 degrees below.

A passenger in a stalled bus on a snow-banked highway near Evanston, Wyo., was reported to have died.

In Montana, three rescue parties braved subzero weather and the heavily drifted snow to start out with axes and sleds and snowshoes and skis to bring Jack Worth, 39, of Missoula, winter caretaker of the hotel near Old Faithful geyser in Yellowstone national park, to a doctor. He is ill with heart disease.

It was so cold in Samuels, Ida., yesterday that water flowing through a fire hose froze and the \$50,000 mansion of H. P. Samuels, coal mine operator and three times candidate for governor of Idaho, was destroyed by fire.

Anacosta, Mont., experienced a \$200,000 fire in the loss of a garage and theater. Firemen battled the flames with the mercury registering 12 degrees below zero.

Snow Buries Train
SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 25.—Heavy snowfall that today had blocked highways in this locality, isolated Bluffman, near here, and had buried an Oregon short line passenger train under a 15-foot slide.

The train was caught by a slide in Bear canyon and the engine and two cars were buried. A crew of shovelers attacked the slide and it was expected the train would be freed this afternoon. No one was injured.

All railroad trains, including Interurbans, north and east of here were running hours late because of the heavy snow, and highways were reported blocked.

Blizzard Stalls Bus
ROCK SPRINGS, Wyo., Jan. 25.—Twenty-two travelers in automobiles and motor buses marooned for 36 hours in a terrific blizzard which swept over the Red desert at Table Rock station, 15 miles east of here, were recovering here today from the effects of their exposure.

Oregon Roads Blocked
LA GRANDE, Ore., Jan. 25.—Additional snow coupled with heavy winds, blocked two state highways in this section late yesterday and both were still closed this morning, with department snow plows at work piercing drifts. On the Old Oregon trail from here to Hot Lake and Nunn Powder, the highway is blocked. A plow from Baker has reached Union but the wind is still blowing, forming new drifts.

The Wallowa Lake highway is closed between Elgin and Minam but it is expected it will be opened later today, Oscar Cutler, state highway engineer, reported. The La Grande to Pendleton sector of the Oregon Trail is open to travel.

Ten more inches of snow fall in La Grande during the past 24 hours brings the total fall here in the last eight days to 31 1/2 inches. The minimum temperature last night was 10 degrees above, but at 7:30 a. m. it had risen to 19 above. Snow has stopped but the skies still threaten.

FEW IMPORTANT BILLS PASSED FIRST TWO WEEKS

commissioners. Both senate and house adopted a joint memorial to congress asking for an increased tariff on timber and timber products and the senate has adopted a joint memorial asking for a higher tariff on cherries.

All of the house bills passed by the senate were the repeal bills introduced by the special committee on repeal of obsolete laws, except an appropriation bill for \$135,000 to pay the expenses of the legislature.

The house also adjourned at noon today until next Monday.

Fire Hazard Stressed
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 25.—For the fourth time the ways and means committee Thursday night heard of the danger to human life from fire in a state institution. This time it was the industrial building at the state hospital for the insane. A sub-committee reported this building to be in a dangerous condition, even in danger of collapsing. Otherwise the institution was reported in first class condition, and the full amount of the appropriation requested, \$966,576, was recommended to the general committee.

Three times previously had the committee heard of fire danger. Governor Patterson and Superintendent Meyers of the state prison emphasized the danger from fire in the women's quarters at the penitentiary. A sub-committee deplored a dangerous condition at the Month normal school, where three students recently lost their lives

In a fire, and a delegation of mothers of the University of Oregon students Wednesday night pleaded for an infirmary at the university that would replace the present frame building that is without fire protection.

For Child Welfare
The committee heard Dr. Philip A. Parsons of the University of Oregon and George Clousa, respectively head of the board of directors and executive secretary of the state child welfare commission. This organization asks for an appropriation of \$28,957 for this autumn. The organization has jurisdiction over children in the state-aided institutions outside of Salem. The amount asked is an increase over the allowance of two years ago, and Chairman Staples of the senate committee declared that the commission is saving money for the state.

Money for Schools
Sub-committees reported favorably on the appropriation asked by the state tuberculosis hospital at Salem, which is \$235,778; normal school at La Grande, \$79,500; and the eastern Oregon hospital for the insane at Pendleton, \$451,085. The committee visiting the new tuberculosis hospital at The Dalles made no recommendation relative to the appropriation of \$162,500 recommended by the governor, for the reason that since the institution is yet incomplete an estimated requirement is considerably a guess. This was admitted by Budget Director Koser.

Veto in the Balance
At its next meeting, which will be next Tuesday night, the committee will pass on a bill of the 1927 session, vetoed by Governor Patterson, to appropriate \$275,000 for a library at the University of Oregon. Senator Bell last night moved that the committee recommend that the veto be sustained, but at the request of other members action was deferred.

The committee has not yet taken final action on any requested appropriation, except \$55,000 for a garage and dormitory at the penitentiary and to change the "old boys" training school into an intermediate institution for first-offense prisoners.

Commercial Signs Hit
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 24.—An act prohibiting the use of such warning words as "beware," "danger," "be careful," in commercial advertising signs along the highways is sponsored by the roads and highways committee of the house of representatives. It was decided to meet Tuesday evening. The committee has been moved that the highway commission to sponsor such an act.

Warning words in advertising signs, say the commissioners, lessen the effectiveness of danger signs placed by the highway commission in actual danger spots.

Aimed at Utilities
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 24.—For the first time at this session of the legislature the body really became stirred up today when Representative Weatherpoon introduced a bill that would remove the requirement that privately owned utilities must get certification of convenience and necessity from the public service commission before entering any territory for operation.

For some years this requirement has been on the statute books. On January 2 of this week privately owned utilities received a solar plexus blow when the state supreme court held that certificates of convenience and necessity are not required of cities that wish to extend municipally-owned utilities to operations beyond the city limits. Justice McBride declared in the opinion that this was the law and that he found it necessary to so hold in the case of the Yamhill Electric company against the city of McMinnville. Speaking for himself, he added the comment that such a possibility was poor economics, that it would tend to stifle private enterprise without being hampered by state regulation.

It is probable that the Weatherpoon bill was inspired by the supreme court decision, since it would throw down the bars for private enterprise as well.

Election Law Changes
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 24.—A list of bills introduced in the house today by Representative Robinson of Multnomah county are designed to remedy certain defects in the election laws and, in general, harmonize the statutes pertaining to elections.

Six of the measures harmonize the law relating to absent voters and give the county clerk 30 days

in which to prepare ballots. The present law, unintentionally it is claimed, gives only 22 days.

Another bill requires discontinuance of the small ballot boxes for state and district ballots. Few election boards, it is said, now use both the large and small boxes as provided by law.

Under the present laws some voters are barred from voting at special elections for the incorporation of cities and towns, although a properly registered voter is presumed to have the right to vote at all elections. One of the Robinson bills proposes a constitutional amendment harmonizing the law.

Since enactment of an amendment requiring all electors to be registered prior to election day, the third clerk of election boards has little to do. One bill equalizes the duties of the board members.

Another provision removes the one-fifth excess from the law requiring that the number of ballots printed for precincts shall be one and a fifth times the number of registered voters. The present law prohibiting swearing in on election day makes the excess unnecessary.

Since the state constitution has been amended so that electors must be able to read and write, the constitutional provision barring those who cannot read and write, and one of the Robinson bills proposes the repeal of the old provision.

Water District Bills
Bills on the program of the state irrigation congress were introduced today by Representatives Chin and Collier summarized, these provide as follows:

That assessments levied by irrigation or drainage districts shall be for the benefit of the district and not the county.

That distressed irrigation districts need not repay the state for interest on district bonds guaranteed and paid by the state, on condition that the bondholders agree to some plan of reorganization that will assure successful operation of the project.

That the time of meeting for election of irrigation district directors shall be the first Tuesday in January instead of February, and that attendance at irrigation congresses and kindred meetings shall be regarded as official business of the district.

Budget Law Prop
Representatives Anderson, Crin and Hamilton and Senator Corbett and Kidd introduced a bill to strengthen the local budget law. It provides that no expenditure not itemized shall be disbursable, and for a filing with the secretary of state in each budget adopted and transfers made thereunder. It prohibits transfers from one fund to another without due appointment of the lay members of the budget committee by the governor on county budget committees, and that all budgets adopted shall be upon forms furnished by the secretary of state.

Salary Boost Bill
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 24.—Representative Earl C. Bronaugh of Multnomah county announced today that he is introducing a bill in the house providing for an increase in the salaries of the industrial accident commissioners from the present salary of \$3600 yearly to \$4800 yearly, to become effective June 1, 1929.

The bill, if passed, would not necessitate any expenditure from general funds of the state but would be paid out of the commissioners' funds.

Bronaugh stated he has letters from 40 of the heaviest contributors to the fund endorsing the proposed increase.

\$100,000 for Champco
Senators Moser and Corbett of Multnomah county today introduced a bill in the senate providing an appropriation of \$100,000 for the Champco memorial. This sum would match a federal appropriation of \$125,000 provided in a bill now pending before congress. The bill in congress credits the state of Oregon with expenditures already made of \$25,000, represented by present buildings and grounds now at Champco.

Bans Airport Bonds
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 24.—A bill to prevent the issuance of bonds by any city or other municipal corporation for the purpose of constructing airports, was introduced into the house Thursday morning by Russell of Yamhill and Carlin of Jackson.

The bill contains the proviso that airports may be built by cities out of accrued funds, current income from existing revenue or revenue from existing airports. The bill is house bill 224.

Teachers' Fund Approved
Without opposing argument, and with only Senator Bennett of Multnomah voting against it, the teachers' retirement bill passed the senate today.

The measure increases the retirement fund and readjusts the method of creating it.

Senator Sam Brown of Multnomah county introduced a memorial resolution to congress asking for an increase in the tariff on filbert nuts, both shelled and unshelled, as a protection against foreign competition.

Senator Eberhard, chairman of the resolutions committee, announced that a public hearing will be held next Tuesday night on the Dunne memorial asking congress to pass the Johnson bill providing for a nation-wide telephone investigation. The hearing was called at the request of the Pacific Telephone & Telegraph company.

After Tuition Dodgers
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 24.—The senate this morning without debate and without recording of a negative vote adopted senate solution 18, introduced under the signatures of 18 members of the upper house and calling upon the presidents of the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college to supply the senate with "complete lists of all residents students enrolled in their respective institutions, showing the home address, parents' address, school of preparation from which

The object of the resolution, as explained by its sponsors, is to provide the legislature with prima facie evidence of the extent to which the two institutions are complying with the statute requiring payment of tuition fees no students from outside the state as a basis for such further investigations as the legislature may deem it necessary to undertake.

Bills Passed
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 24.—The house of representatives Thursday morning passed 15 bills repealing and revising sections of the state code. Three bills were re-referred or held for further consideration.

On motion of Carlin of Jackson county, the house consented to the withdrawal of house bill 32, which sought to do away with the publication of county expenditures in newspapers. Twenty-six new bills were dropped into the house hopper Thursday morning.

House bill 47, which repeals sections of the code providing for military training in the state's high schools was passed by a small majority.

The only woman member of the two houses, Dorothy McCullough Lee, of Multnomah, made her maiden speech during Thursday morning's session when she spoke in favor of retaining in the code sections relating to limited partnerships which house bill 57 would repeal. On motion of Collier, the bill was referred to the committee on banking and corporations.

The second round of the Goldstein Henderson boat development over the passing of house bill 62 which repeals sections of the code awarding medals to men who served on the Mexican border.

The bill carried. House bill 61 relating to Indian war veterans was held up until Friday to allow members of the repeal of laws committee to make further investigation regarding the manner in which records of Indian war veterans are kept.

Mrs. O. N. Denny Aided
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 25.—A deficiency appropriation bill, appropriating nearly \$150,000 to meet immediate expenses of the state departments and other state expenses, listed as house bill 190, was passed by the house Thursday afternoon. In addition to the emergency bill, house members passed a bill authorizing the state game commission to pay \$1200 during the coming biennium to Mrs. Gertrude J. Denny. Six bills repealing and amending existing statutes were passed and three new bills were given first reading.

Mrs. Gertrude J. Denny, widow of the late Judge O. N. Denny, imported the first Mongolian or Chinese pheasants into the state of Oregon at her own expense. She is now 92 years old and one of the few remaining survivors of the Whitman massacre. The past four legislatures have made similar bequests for Mrs. Denny.

Old Laws Junked
House bills 65, 68, 109, 116, and 126, all repealing obsolete sections of the state statute books, were passed without contest. Senate bill 1, repealing sections of laws relating to mining claims, in conflict with federal statutes, was also passed by the house Thursday afternoon.

House bill 153 which provided that an alien may become a notary public if he is duly declared intentions of becoming a citizen and received his first naturalization papers, was indefinitely postponed.

House bill 229 introduced by Anderson of Multnomah limits working hours for licensed pharmacists to nine a day, would limit the number of hours at work in two weeks time to 108 and would make it unlawful for a pharmacist to be employed for more than 33 consecutive days without a full day off.

The Multnomah delegation introduced a senate bill Thursday providing for an increase in salary for constables in Multnomah county from \$300 to \$275 a month.

Senator Moser and Representative Anderson introduced a joint memorial to congress that would restrict immigration from Mexico by placing it on the same quota

basis as that imposed on other nations.

For Pure Milk
SALEM, Ore., Jan. 25.—A bill specifically outlining requirements to be met by every milk dealer in the state with penalties of fines and imprisonment for violation, is being considered by the house committee on food and dairy products and will be dropped into the house hopper as soon as a few disagreements on provisions of the bill are ironed out between committee members and the state dairy and food commissioner, J. D. Mielke, originator of the bill.

Mielke's bill is similar to milk dealer's laws in effect in Portland and Salem. Members of the committee however have removed from the bill the proviso that containers must remain in steam for 30 minutes. This would scrap a number of bottle washing machines now in

use by milk dealers.
