MONEY FAVORING SHARKEY TO BEAT K. O. CHRISTNER

Ultimate Prize of Chance at Stripling Spur to Effort in Bout in N. Y. Tonight.

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—While sweet dreams of Miami beach unfold there, Jack Sharkey and K. O. Christner, clash in a two-round bout in Madison Square garden tonight. Christner, the rubber tire industry's gift to heavyweight rank, is confronted with the chance of a lifetime. A knockout victory for him would automatically shove Sharkey out of his match with Young Stripling at Miami Beach, February 27. At the same time there is more than a chance that such an upset would establish the Akron rubber worker as an entirely adequate substitute for Sharkey against Stripling.

But the Akron battler's impressive record of 37 knockouts in 44 fights has not disturbed the gambling fraternity in its conviction that Sharkey will win, and win decisively. They are backing that conviction at odds of three to one. Despite the Boston sailor man's notorious incoherence, most experts believe he will dispose of Christner if for no other reason than that he must if he is to meet Stripling at Miami Beach.

"Pa" Stripling Talks

NEW YORK, Jan. 25.—A chubby little fellow with a soft drawl of the southland is peeping out from under the trim of his black derby today as things flit in the big town. Tonight he will sit at the ringside in Madison Square garden and turn his entire attention to Jack Sharkey's efforts to bruise K. O. Christner—and vice versa.

The little fellow with the slow smile is "Pa" Stripling who raised his boy to be a fighter of such proportion that the little fellow is now one of the leading heavyweights, one of the principals in the battle of the palms Tex Rickard planned for Miami Beach on the night of February 27.

Dixie Athletes Lead
"The south," he said, "is just finding itself athletically. We had the greatest football team in the country last fall in Georgia Tech. Bobby Jones and Walter Gaudin thrilled the section with their golf and Ty Cobb made baseball fans of thousands. Now Young Stripling has come along to take his place as the foremost southern representative in the boxing world."

"The Sharkey-Stripling match will be one of the biggest sport events in the history of the section and the boy must uphold the prestige of his predecessors. Georgians, and especially the fans of Macon, will move on Miami Beach almost to a man. There's never been anything like it down there."

"Florida never had but one big fight before and that was when the sport was practically outlawed. Those fans haven't had a real chance to yell since Jim Corbett stopped Charley Mitchell in Jacksonville 25 years ago."

"You know, southerners are more sentimental than northerners or westerners and we consider that this fight is something of a memorial to Tex Rickard. Tex was the man who gave the boy his chance and favored him to win the heavyweight championship. The south won't forget that."

Square Deal Assured
"The boy doesn't care who references the match either. Sharkey is just as into against prejudice in the south as he would be in New York. They'll boo him if they don't like the way he fights and they'd boo Stripling, too."

"No one with any sense would want to steal a decision with newspaper men from all over the country at the ringside. I've always found that a poor decision against you results ultimately in your favor. You notice that Pauline fought Tom Heeney twice, was once and drew the other time, but the Spaniard didn't get the title shot with Tunney. Heeney got it because the newspaper men thought Tom was worth a fight."

Stripling Fights Tonight
NEW ORLEANS, Jan. 25.—The giant western scrapper, Ralph Smith, will have it over W. L. (Young) Stripling, Georgia heavyweight championship contender, in their fight here tonight in height and reach, but the other measurements give Stripling the margin.

The fight will be Stripling's last engagement before his elimination contest with Jack Sharkey at Miami Beach February 27.

This service, taken from the hands of a republican president while all of the bitterness of the inter-party fight over the League of Nations still rankled, undoubtedly cost him the democratic leadership in the senate, a leadership he was loath to surrender, since his party had lost control of congress.

First elected to the house of representatives from the Birmingham district of Alabama in 1904, Mr. Underwood assumed leadership of the democrats there when they took control of the house in 1911 and on the record he made within a year his friends advanced him for the presidential nomination at Baltimore.

Mastering nearly 100 votes, he remained in the fight until the forty-sixth ballot when his name was withdrawn without either his knowledge or consent and his strength thrown to Woodrow Wilson.

Wilson's Valuable Aide
Refusing to be considered for the vice-presidential nomination with Wilson, he continued his service in the house and through his parliamentary skill and his tact of leadership he contributed very materially toward making Wilson's first four years of administration a period of far-reaching legislation. At the same time he brought country-wide recognition to himself as the author of a tariff bill which supplanted the famous Payne-Aldrich act.

After 29 years in the house he moved over to the senate. His fame had preceded him and with the death of Senator Thomas Martin of Virginia, he was chosen democratic leader, a place he held until 1921.

Re-elected to the senate in 1926, he announced just before the expiration of his second six-year term that he would not be a candidate to succeed himself in 1928.

BROTHERS ARE APPREHENDED IN ROBBERY ATTEMPT

Wesley Green, 28, and Ray Green, 21, were arrested about 10:30 last night by "Doc" Martin, special night police officer, as the two men were attempting a robbery at Burke's lunch on Jackson street, according to the official report made this morning. The two men, according to Officer Martin, cut a hole in the screen door at the back of the restaurant and were in the act of stealing canned goods from the storeroom back of the kitchen when arrested.

The officer, who is engaged by the merchants to patrol the business section, was attracted by the hole in the screen and found the two men on the porch. He stated they claimed they were looking for a place to sleep, but he found a sack partially filled with canned goods and so placed both under arrest and took them to the city jail.

An investigation revealed that Wesley Green is married and has two children. Officers learned that the family is in very desperate circumstances, with no food in the house. Miss Pitchford, county juvenile officer, arranged this morning to secure food for them until the case against the men can be settled. The men claimed that they had been unable to find work, except for an occasional job playing for dances.

Defense Scores
Defense counsel summed up McNabb's testimony in one long question: "At the time you had this negotiation with Mr. Keyes about the delivery of this record and those documents—from that time until you had concluded with that matter, if you ever concluded it, and from that time to this, did Mr. Keyes do anything so far as you know, in any way to hinder you or permit you from prosecuting the case fully, without any let or hindrance on his part?"

"No sir," replied McNabb. "Did he attempt in any way to stimulate you from the prosecution?"

"No sir."

"In your inquiries that you made, did he, as far as you know, render you every aid and assistance that was within his power?"

"Yes, sir," replied the United States attorney. "It was mutual. We helped them and they helped us with the records."

CONVICT ALLEGED ONLY 16 WHEN HE WAS IMPRISONED

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 25.—Petition for a writ of habeas corpus seeking to release A. P. Loundagin from the state penitentiary has been filed in circuit court here by A. L. Loundagin, father of the prisoner. The petition alleges A. P. Loundagin is being held in prison here on a commitment from Umatilla county not to exceed a year for obtaining money under false pretenses. He avers the prisoner was but 16 years of age when committed, that he was born at Boise, Idaho November 14, 1912, and committed to prison November 15, 1928.

The father avers that his son when arrested was immediately placed in jail, was not allowed counsel or to consult with counsel, that he was not taken before juvenile court and never has been and that when sentenced to prison he was not allowed the advice or help of counsel. He states in the petition that had the boy been taken before the juvenile court he would have been sent to the state training school for boys rather than the state penitentiary. The hearing has been set for Saturday morning before Circuit Judge McMahon.

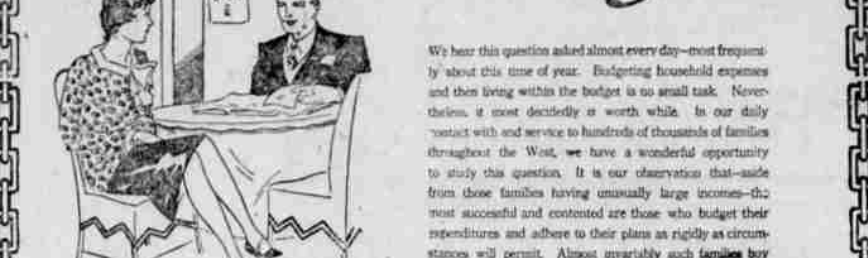
