(Associated Press Licensed Wire) STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Cal., Jan. 25.—Students in special assembly voted to keep secret names of those caught cheating in examinations. Speakers said 22 men had been caught cheating since 1922, but that no women had been caught.

DEATH CLAIMS GYPSY KING AND TRIBE MAKES FUSS STOCKTON, Cal., Jan. 26.—Mourning of a gypsy tribe over the death of John Miller, "their king," precipitated a tense riot here last night. Five policemen and three deputy sheriffs ejected the Nomads from the emergency hospital and later from the morgue where the body was taken.

Miller fell dead while enroute from the gypsy camp just outside town to the emergency hospital. He was carried to the hospital by some of his followers and some 20 others rushed into the room as a physician was examining the body to see if the man was dead.

Later they followed the body to the morgue, begging the privilege of taking it back to camp. When the coroner refused, they offered him \$20 to allow six of them to stand guard over the coffin. The coroner declined, but told two of the leaders they could remain.

Tribe members said Miller was born in Brazil and had a fortune of about \$2,000,000. They said they would take the body to Washington, D. C., for burial.
