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world work a hardship on the families unable to afford more than one vacation a year.

Killing Does Discussed

The matter of killing does was also the subject of considerable discussion. The proposal was made that if the law was changed to read "one deer" that a hunter should be allowed to kill either a doe or a buck. The statement was made that there are now too many barren does, due to the lack of bucks for breeding purposes and the thought was expressed that an open season on does as well as bucks would be an improvement.

Ed Walker, deputy game warden, however, took exception to this proposal. Poachers and others hunting illegally kill a great many does during the closed season, he said. While evidence is lacking in a great majority of the cases, yet it is common knowledge that many does are killed during the closed season, so that to allow them to be killed in open season would destroy the balance and would result in extermination.

Would Protect Spikes

Mr. Lockwood stated that he would like to propose an amendment to the bill making it illegal to kill bucks smaller than forked horns. Such a law, in his opinion, would not only make it safer for hunters in the woods, by causing a hunter to look more carefully before shooting, but would also save the younger bucks for breeding purposes.

The matter of fixing a permanent date for the opening of the season met with unanimous approval.

For the past two years the governor and game commission have arbitrarily postponed the opening date until after the first fall rains. It was pointed out that this works a decided hardship upon many families who, able to secure only one vacation, have set the dates for their trip only to find that they were prohibited from entering the woods. It was recommended that whatever date is fixed for the opening of the season be made permanent and that the power of any official or commission to change the date be removed.

Recommendations Made

After a lengthy discussion of these matters the club went officially on record as favoring the retention of the present season dates from September 10 to October 20, with the dates set permanently and that the bag limit be one buck male deer or two buck blacktail deer, not less than a forked horn.

The club then took up the matter of open season on other game. There was considerable sentiment expressed favoring the reduction of the bag limit on ducks and geese but no action was taken.

Would Change Grouse Season

It was recommended, however, that the grouse season be changed to conform to the deer season. It was pointed out that many deer hunters do not hunt during the pheasant season, when it is lawful to kill grouse under the present law. By opening the grouse season during the deer season it would not only give the hunters an opportunity to get birds, but in many cases would save the slaughter of does for "camp meat."

No change was suggested in the season on China pheasants.

It was recommended that the season on valley quail be opened from October 15 to October 31 with a bag limit of ten birds in any one week. The quail season is open during the time in Jackson, Josephine, Coos and Curry counties, and it is desired that Douglas county be added to the list.

Quail in closed territory, it was stated, are becoming small in size. This it is thought possible is due to inbreeding. Quail remain in coveys, seldom changing from one group to the other. Hunting them and scattering them around during a short season and with a small bag limit would improve the condition of the birds some of the sportsmen thought.

Increase Bounties

The meeting concluded with a discussion regarding bounties on predatory animals. Mr. Lockwood stated that there had been numerous requests received from sportsmen organizations asking for increased bounties on predatory animals, particularly those that prey on deer. Bounties are now paid by the game commission on cougar and wolf, and it was suggested that the state pay an additional bounty of \$10 on cougar making \$25 in all, \$15 on wolves, making a total of \$45 and \$5 on coyotes and \$2 on bob cats.

Mr. Lockwood stated in conclusion that he would bring these recommendations before the committee, together with a bill inflicting a severe penalty for night hunting. Spotlighting deer, he stated, is increasing alarmingly throughout the state, and he proposed a law imposing a fine of from \$200 to \$500 or a jail sentence of from 30 days to 6 months, or both fine and imprisonment.

cerning gear, length of seines and traps beyond the mouth of the Columbia river. The fishermen's union is insisting on a clearer definition relative to gear than now provided.

The committee from each legislature will be composed of five senators, five representatives and the presiding officers of each house.

Teacher Plan Opposed

The state board of standardization of colleges, universities and normal schools, meeting here yesterday, went on record as opposed emphatically to proposed entrance into the elementary teacher training field by the University of Oregon. This action was taken mainly because of the state's financial condition. It was held that should one institution of higher learning enter the field other state institutions, and independent colleges as well would enter the field, with the result that there would be competition for the state funds and attendance.

However, the board declared the plan offered by the university for the training of elementary teachers on a four-year basis to be the equivalent of a standard normal course.

President Hall of the university, who is a member of the board, did not vote on the question.

The board authorized the state superintendent of schools to recognize as standard for the purposes of certification those institutions of higher learning outside of Oregon that are members in good standing of standardizing associations that accept the standards of the American council of education.

The board adopted a resolution that Oregon institutions now engaged in the training of teachers take steps looking towards meeting the standards of the American council of education by January 1, 1932.

Yeon Memorial Plan

Senator Dime's concurrent resolution providing for the John B. Yeon memorial commission will come before the senate Monday for adoption or rejection. There is a strong prospect, it is said, of a large park of 160 acres in Portland being turned over to the state and that financial contributions will be made by individuals to the extent

of \$10,000 or \$12,000. The memorial will be placed in the park.

Among senate bills on third reading in the senate Monday will be the Bailey bill providing that high school tuition funds be placed in the custody of the county treasurer instead of the county school superintendent.

Airport Traffic Bill

The public service commission has received from the board of railroad commissioners of North Dakota the copy of a bill to be introduced in the legislature of that state for the licensing and regulating of air traffic. It is believed a similar bill may be introduced in Oregon. A committee of the national association of railroad and utility commissioners has been studying the subject.

\$600,000 Bill Opposed

A public hearing on Senator J. O. Bailey's bill to repeal the state office building act will be held in the senate chamber Monday night.

The act that Bailey seeks to repeal is the one authorizing the state to borrow \$600,000 from the funds of the state industrial accident commission for the construction of an office building for state departments, thereby relieving the necessity of renting space.

Those opposing the use of the funds for the office building will probably be led Monday night by J. B. Kerr, Portland attorney. The fight on the other side will be led by State Treasurer T. B. Kay and probably Roy Shields, Portland lawyer.

BROTHERS TO LEAVE TOWN

Wesley and Ray Green, arrested Thursday night for entering the porch at Burke's Lunch, were arraigned in the justice court today on a vagrancy charge. They entered pleas of guilty. The men, it was learned, were stealing food because they were unable to find work, according to their claim, and had nothing in the house to eat. Because of these circumstances the officers did not feel like pressing the charge and Mr. Burke would not prosecute. The two men have a job for today and promised to leave the county as soon as they have completed the work, and so were allowed to go without sentence upon them.

Prisoner Released

Joe Simmonds, who was arrested November 29 charged with spotlighting deer and was sentenced to 60 days in jail, was released today after completing his term.
