

NEW CODE FOR REALTY FIELD OBJECT OF BILL

State Supervisor Would Be Insurance Head, Vested With More Power

HOUSE HOPPER BUSY

13-Month Calendar Idea Is Approved; Would Limit Immigration From Mexico.

(Associated Press Local Wire) — SALEM, Ore., Jan. 25.—A new real estate code, similar to the code proposed in the 1927 session but without its objectionable features, was presented to the house today in house bill 248 introduced by Bronaugh of Multnomah.

Bronaugh's new code retains the insurance commissioner as the real estate commissioner and strengthens the commissioner more power and authority to correct abuses in real estate transactions. The chief objection to the new code, introduced by German in the 1927 session, was its creation of a separate real estate commissioner. Bronaugh says that the new code conforms in its major aspects with the MacCleskey code endorsed by the National Realtors association, which is the ideal at which all states aim.

13-Month Year Favored
A short resume of Roman history came Friday morning when Wilcox of Washington county defended his joint memorial for the ultimate adoption of a 13-month calendar year. On the assurance that the 13 month year would not affect their \$3 per diem, Carlin of Jackson brought the house from the joking stage to a serious consideration of the memorial by stating that the metric system, a unified monetary system and a revised calendar year were only a matter of a few years and that passing the memorial would "be one small step in the right direction." Only 19 "no" votes were cast against the adoption of the memorial.

Ask Tariff Boosts
The house Friday passed house joint memorial No. 2, memorializing congress to place a duty on bananas in order to protect fruit harvested and marketed in this country.

The house also passed joint memorial 2, which memorializes congress to revise and increase the tariff on cherries and cherry products.

Tax Rebate Provided
House bill 249 introduced Friday by Loneragan of Multnomah provides for a two per cent rebate on all taxes paid in full on or before the 15th day of April in any given year. Loneragan also introduced house bill 241 which requires tax collectors to keep a delinquent tax roll for both real and personal property and provides that where the cost of collecting any delinquent personal property tax would exceed the amount of the tax to be collected the county court or board of county commissioners may order the cancellation thereof.

The third bill introduced by Loneragan Friday morning provides that no deed shall be issued by the clerk until all taxes appearing against the property to be deeded shall have been paid.

A bill which requires railroads in the state of Oregon to preserve and keep open to the inspection of the public service commission a complete record of railroad tickets, passes and mileage books issued free of or for other than actual money consideration at full rates, was introduced into the house of representatives Friday by Loneragan.

The youngsters from the junior high were going "great guns" at the start of the game but could not maintain the grind against the heavier team. The game was a thriller, however, the score before the end of the first quarter was 19 to 15. The result was really in doubt until the last few minutes of play.

Coach Turner had every reason to be proud of his team last night. Starting a squad consisting of Atterbury, Koenig, Fisher, Hull and Robertson, the score at the end of the first quarter was 19 to 4 in favor of the local pickers. Fisher started throughout the evening. This will be his last game as he will be graduated and is ineligible to continue the season. A flock of substitutes was sent in at the start of the second quarter and the score at the half was Roseburg 34, Coquille 10.

During the second half the Roseburg team did not make such a good showing. The Coquille lads had evidently been "talked to" by the coach for they guarded more closely and took chances on long shots. PADELFORD IN FINE SHAPE FOR COMING FIGHT

Is Training Harder for Bout With Marcus Than Ever Before.

GOOD CARD COMING

Fights at Armory Wednesday Expected to Be Best Seen Here This Season.

Pat Padelford of Medford, former Roseburg boxer, who is to fight Joe Marcus of Portland at the local armory Wednesday, January 31, for the junior light weight championship of the Pacific coast, is training as he never trained before, according to word received from Medford. Padelford, who for several years was content to string along with the second raters, giving little thought to training and conditioning, started taking his work seriously a little over a year ago and has had his eye on Marcus' crown since that time. Padelford has been working out some of the best men of his class, working continually for a bout with Marcus.

With his goal in sight Padelford is said to be going through a training grind that has placed him in the pink of condition for his bout on Wednesday. His chief difficulty is in finding sparring partners. He has roped in nearly every available fighter around Medford, it is said, and has beaten most of them so badly that he has not been able to keep partners who will fight with him. Even the heavyweights of the Medford locality have been cut, bruised and battered while trying to stay with Padelford in the training bouts.

"Pat," as he is known to the many Roseburg fans, carries a terrific wallop in either hand. He is a rugged fighter, and his lous reach gives him considerable advantage over the ordinary fighter of his class. He is a good boxer, unusually fast, and when in condition can stand lots of punishment. There is no question that he is up against the toughest antagonist of his career when he meets Marcus. The Portland boy is a terrific slugging man who has earned his place by his clever work as a boxer. He is exceptionally fast and a hard hitter and can stand punishment.

He went to Australia recently and beat all of the men in his class on that continent. He then started fighting in the lightweight division and went to the top of that class so that he holds both the junior lightweight and the lightweight titles for Australia. After polishing off all contenders in those divisions he entered the light-heavyweight class and beat a number of his opponents in that class.

Wednesday's fight card, featuring these two boys in a 10-round main event is attracting a great deal of attention and is expected to draw a big house, particularly from outside of town.

A good many of Padelford's followers are coming up from Medford, while Sutherland fans are preparing to turn out en masse. Padelford's home was at Sutherland for many years. There are also a number of fans coming from the coast. The fight is to be the most expensive ever staged in Roseburg as Marcus is a main event fighter in Portland and had to be given a large guarantee in order to induce him to appear in the local ring. This will be one of the very few fights that he has ever had in any of the smaller towns of the state.

The rest of the card also offers good entertainment. Young Jeff Willard of Libby, Montana, and Pat Gorman of Albany fight the 6-round semifinal. These boys are heavyweights, both weighing over 200 pounds, which will be the first heavyweight bout to be seen in this city for many years.

A four-round special event will be fought between "Tiger" Dunn of Riddle and Edgar James of Roseburg. Both of these boys are new fighters in the ring, but they have made rapid progress. Dunn has had three fights, winning two by knockouts, and taking his first on a decision by a wide margin. James has had only two fights, but has won both by knockouts. Both boys are sluggers and are developing very rapidly into first class fighters.

Pondergrass of Roseburg and Frank Humlin of Roseburg will furnish a four-round preliminary. Pondergrass has fought several times in a local ring, demonstrating more than ordinary fighting ability. Despite his weight of 175 pounds he is a heavy hitter and has won several of his bouts by knockouts. Humlin is a new boy in the ring, but has had a good deal of training.

The class of fight cards that Promoter Willard has been giving local fans has attracted much attention all over the state. The bouts have won commendation from promoters and matchmakers everywhere and Mr. Willard's fair dealings with the fighters imported for these entertainments has been proven by the manner in which managers are writing to him in increasing numbers daily offering him the use of their fighters. Fighters appearing regularly in the big cities, and who seldom go outside the larger centers are offering to fight in Roseburg, because of the fact that

GOVERNOR JOHNSON ALLEGED DEVOTEE OF HINDU HOKUM

Witness Tells of Incense Burning and Draperies of Oriental Type in Apartment.

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(Associated Press Local Wire) — OKLAHOMA CITY, Jan. 25.—The cold, searching eye of the state legislature today rested on spiritualism and Hindu philosophy as alleged factors in influencing the actions of Governor Henry S. Johnston, now under suspension, and facing impeachment.

Out of the maze of testimony, charges, tales of strange Hindu chants and mystic Oriental philosophy practiced by those behind the governor's chair, one bit of practical action stood out, the addition of another charge of impeachment to the seven already voted against the chief executive by the house of representatives. This charge dealt with the much-discussed testimony by Johnston of Dewey Crosswhite, a convicted murderer, in December, 1925, while Crosswhite was listed as a fugitive from justice.

The house has yet to act upon two charges brought by its investigating committee which yesterday delved farther into alleged administrative irregularities, and brought to light the first hint of a conspiracy to which belief it has been said the governor himself subscribes.

Oriental Hokum
Weird tales of an apartment, draped "in Oriental splendor," where incense pots burned and James R. Armstrong hummed what "seemed to be a part of a ritual" were dragged from the reluctant lips of H. E. Sullivan, the governor's secretary, by members of the house committee.

Armstrong is Governor Johnston's political adviser, and an uncle of Mrs. O. O. Hammond, confidential secretary of the chief executive, and often spoken of as the "Mrs. Colonel House" of the administration.

Sullivan, repeatedly interrupting his testimony with spirited protest, said he had gone to Armstrong's home at the request of the governor to get Armstrong's opinion on a legislative bill under threat of being jailed for contempt. Sullivan testified that Armstrong "had five or six pots of incense—was lighting them when I came into his bedroom."

Sullivan also said Governor Johnston had called him into the executive offices, after the house investigation had been underway for some time, and had declared: "Damn you, Sullivan, you've got to shoulder responsibility for the pardon," alluding to the Crosswhite clemency act.

MERZ'S DEATH IS PUZZLE TO JURY

(Associated Press Local Wire) — FULLERTON, Calif., Jan. 26.—A coroner's jury returned an open verdict concerning the death January 19 of Ferdinand Merz, Pasco, Wash., and Pendleton, Ore., railroad man, whose body was found by the Santa Fe railway tracks near here. "We are unable to state whether this was murder or suicide," the verdict read in addition to declaring death having been due to a cut throat.

County authorities are continuing a search for two men believed to have been with Merz before and after his death. One inquest witness reported having seen the pair run from near the spot where the body was found, but definite trace of them has not been found.

DAILY PAPERS AT BAKER COMBINED

(Associated Press Local Wire) — BAKER, Ore., Jan. 26.—The Baker Morning Democrat, one of the oldest daily newspapers of the Pacific northwest, was purchased here today by Bernard Mainwaring and Lucien P. Arant, owners and publishers of the Baker Evening Herald, from Ralph M. Mitchell, editor of the Portland Journal of Commerce. The deal involved a cash consideration of approximately \$28,000.

The publishers announced that effective February 1 the Morning Democrat and Evening Herald will be consolidated. Articles of incorporation for \$50,000 will be filed at Salem soon for the Baker Democrat-Herald company.

Full night-hour leased wire printer telephone service of the Associated Press, which carries 15,000 words of news daily, will be installed at once.

LENGLEN AND FUTURE MATE OFF FOR PARIS
(Associated Press Local Wire) — NEW YORK, Jan. 26.—Suzanne Lenglen, French tennis star, her mother and Baldwin M. Baldwin, wealthy financier, left for France today on the steamship Paris.

Also aboard was Dudley Field Malone, New York and Paris lawyer, who said he would try to obtain a divorce for Baldwin and that then Suzanne and Baldwin would be married.

JURY INCREASE BILL RECEIVES SENATE S.O.K.

Costly Lesson Learned in D'Autremont Case Has Sequel at Salem.

13 OR 14 PERMITTED

Carlin Withdraws Bill to Prohibit Issuance of Bonds to Establish City Airports.

(Associated Press Local Wire) — SALEM, Ore., Jan. 25.—Senator Marks' alternate juror bill was passed by the senate today. It grows out of an incident in the famed D'Autremont case, and provides that in the trial of felony cases the court, in its discretion, may draw twelve or twelve alternate jurors in addition to the 12 regular jurors. The alternates would attend the trial in event of death or inability of one of the regular jurors to sit at any time during the trial an alternate could take his place.

Under the present law such a situation causes a mistrial. The death of a juror in the D'Autremont trial, resulting in a mistrial, is said to have cost the taxpayers of Jackson county about \$10,000.

Senator Norblad's bill authorizing cities, by vote of the people, to transfer administration of public parks from park boards to the city council, passed the senate. It adjusts the park administration to the managerial form of government.

Batch of Other Bills
Senator Bennett introduced a bill that would make the county judge and the county commissioners the county equalization board instead of the county judge, the county clerk and the county assessor.

Senator Bennett of Multnomah today introduced his bill to make the date of expiration of motor licenses June 29 instead of December 31. It would be effective on and after January 1, 1930. To tide over the period from January 1, to July 1, 1930. Another bill by Bennett provides for issuance of temporary licenses.

A joint resolution was introduced by Senator Bennett calling for an amendment to section 3, article 1, of the constitution whereby vacancies in the senate or house delegation from any district would be filled by election by the county central committee.

The senate adopted a senate joint memorial introduced by the committee on agriculture asking congress for a tariff increase on poultry and poultry products.

In House Hopper
Representative Russell of Yamhill introduced house bill 252 which would remove from the tax exemption list all municipally owned property other than that of counties which is not used for governmental, educational, park or charitable purposes, or which is held as a result of assessment or tax foreclosure, or which is held in a proprietary manner.

Bronaugh of Multnomah introduced house bill 248 which repeals the present real estate code and substitutes a new code which strengthens the administration of the real estate commissioner's office by giving him more power and authority to correct abuses in real estate transactions.

Representative Carlin Friday morning withdrew house bill 224, which was designed to forbid the issuance of bonds by cities for the establishment of airports.

worked said he was present throughout the day.

On January 9 Wood shot and killed Ambrose Hagerty, while police of Detroit and Wynadotte, state troopers, deputy sheriffs and newspapermen looked on. By arrangement they were present when three alleged conspirators with Mrs. Wood, from whom Wood has been estranged for a year, accompanied his real estate office.

Opposite Evidence
Mrs. Wood's attorney, William Krenner, said today that the three men were engaged by Mrs. Wood to investigate the fact which she suspected her husband played in the bank holdup. Her suspicion was aroused, Krenner said, by the

fact that one of the Sturgis bank robbers had but one arm, as Mrs. Wood, and by the fact Wood had been in financial difficulties but had not requested aid.

Mrs. Wood admitted that she planned to have her three employees search in Wood's office for some papers, which she said he had told her would "ruin her" if released.

Krenner charged that Wood told her of the papers and employed Holt to suggest their removal and Wood's abduction so Wood might have an opportunity to halt his wife's investigation of the bank robbery. State police previously had investigated Wood, where abouts on the day of the holdup. Their attention was directed to him by Hagerty, the man shot.

Identification of Holt and Wood as participants in the holdup was made by Miss Helen Crane, a clerk in the bank, and Joseph Parrish, a customer. Both were positive in their declarations that there could be no mistake.

Wood, a limp coat sleeve dangling on one side, and Holt, his studious appearance suggesting his occupation was an accountant, were placed in solitary confinement on separate floors of the jail at Centerville.
