PORTLAND, Jan. 28.—As the result of police raids conducted over the week end, 155 men were under arrest today on charges ranging from vagrancy to gambling and possession of liquor.

Thirty men were arrested Sunday night at a pool hall. Charges were preferred against only fourteen of the 30, however. Three found playing pool for money, were charged with gambling. Eleven were charged with vagrancy.

Saturday night was the big night. More than 125 men were taken to the police station, questioned by detectives, finger-printed and their records compared with those on file.

\$200 to \$275 a month was tabled in the senate.

Rural Fire Protection

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 28.—Senator Upton introduced a bill providing for the organization of rural fire protection districts outside of incorporated cities and towns, and providing for the levying of taxes and issuance of bonds for the maintenance of the districts.

The measure gives county courts authority to establish the fire protection districts on petitions from the people, and if objections are filed by 25 or more residents of the proposed district representing 50 per cent or more of the assessed property valuation, the court is authorized to call an election on the question.

The district would be governed by a board of directors who, among other things, would elect a fire chief.

To Abolish county Judges

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 28.—Two bills which abolish the office of county judge and would create the office of county commissioner to take the place of the county judge's office was reported to the house Monday morning by Representatives Anderson and Carlin and Speaker Hamilton.

House bill 265 provides for the appointment of county commissioners for counties of Oregon and the abolishment of the office of county judge. The act provides that in each case the present county judges are appointed commissioners to fill out present terms.

House bill 266 would transfer all judicial jurisdiction heretofore placed in the county courts to the circuit courts. It is a companion bill to 265.

G. A. R. Benefit

Members of the Grand Army of the Republic in good standing, if residents of the state, will be granted the privilege of railway fare of one cent a mile within the boundaries of Oregon if a bill introduced today by Senator Hall passes the legislature and is signed by the governor.

AIRPLANE LINKS THEM

LONDON.—A new air passenger line, connecting London and Stockholm, will be inaugurated soon. The service will bring the two cities within 11 hours' travel of one another.

\$10,000 MONKEY BITE

NEW YORK.—Malcolm O'Connell of this city has been awarded \$10,000 damages for a monkey bite. Defense of the hotel, which owned the animal, to the effect that the bite wasn't worth that much and that the boy's mother had refused medical attention, failed to impress the jury.

COP SAVES OPERATION

JACKSONVILLE, Fla.—Surgeons at County hospital were about to probe for a bullet believed to be in the body of Henry

Dorsey, a shooting victim, when Patrolman Clark walked in with the announcement that the pellet was in his pocket. The nature of the wound was such that doctors were unable to determine, at first, whether the bullet had lodged in the body or not.

COPS GET EYEFUL

LONDON.—A hotel proprietor at Leith was sentenced to 30 days' imprisonment and recommended for deportation, because police used field glasses to obtain evidence. Constables testified to spying from neighboring buildings and seeing couples dancing in the nude while others paraded in the corridors only partly clad.
