AL SMITH CALLS ON HOOVER AT FLORIDA HOME

Rivals for Presidency in 1928 Have Social Chat for 25 Minutes.

PLANNED BY RASKOB

Conversation 'About Funny Things of Campaign,' Says Defeated Candidate.

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Jan. 29.—President-elect Hoover and Alfred E. Smith spent twenty-five minutes with each other today at the Hoover vacation home on Belle Isle, mostly reminiscing about events in the spectacular campaign last fall in which they were the principals.

Wearing his celebrated brown derby and formal morning clothes, the democratic standard bearer of 1928 reached Belle Isle promptly at 11 a. m., the hour for his appointment with his victorious opponent. His inevitable cigar was very much in evidence as he stepped from the car in which he had driven from the Miami Biltmore hotel at Coral Gables where he has his headquarters.

Accompanying the former governor were John J. Raskob, chairman of the democratic national committee and William F. Kenry, life-long friend. Smith led the way up the short concrete walk to the door of the sun parlor where he and his companions were greeted by Lawrence Richey, secretary to Mr. Hoover.

The president-elect in white trousers and shoes and a double-breasted blue serge coat stood just within the doorway and shook hands first with his late opponent and then with the other two. The visitors were made comfortable in two large easy chairs and the president-elect and the democratic leader did most of the talking.

Gov. Smith said afterwards that he had congratulated Mr. Hoover and wished him luck. "And I meant it," he added, emphasizing each word. "We talked about some of the funny things that happened during the campaign," the former governor went on, explaining that Mr. Hoover related some of his own experiences that gave him amusement and that he did likewise. "Mr. Hoover looked well," was the comment of the distinguished visitor.

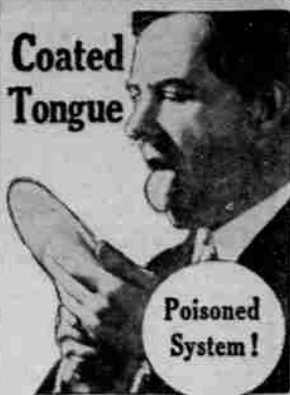
This was the first talk the late opponents ever had had although they had met once before back in 1921 when both were speaking on the same platform in New York City.

Raskob Is Emissary
Mr. Smith drove directly back to Coral Gables for breakfast, explaining that he had come away from his hotel without the morning meal in order to be on time for his call which was arranged for last night by Mr. Raskob after Mr. Hoover had made public a statement saying he would be glad if the democratic leader could find time to call.

For the first time since his arrival in greater Miami last Sunday, Mr. Smith's car was accompanied by a motorcycle police detail. It crossed the Venetian causeway leading to Belle Isle at rather high speed and entered the entrance by a little-used entrance. Few of the hundred or more persons gathered in automobiles along the highway realized that the former governor had arrived until after his car was within the grounds.

RADIO LICENSES EXTENDED; BOARD MEMBER RESIGNS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—The radio commission today issued a general order extending until March 16, all existing licenses covering coastal, point-to-point, experimental and ship radio transmitting stations. The order also extended all such licenses which had expired since Dec. 22 last year, and upon which renewal applications had been filed but not acted upon by the commission.

Sam Pickard, who has represented the fourth zone on the radio commission since November 1, 1927, has sent his resignation to the president to be effective February 1. Mr. Pickard is understood to have accepted a place with the Columbia Broadcasting chain.

The commissioner has been with the radio commission since its organization, March 15, 1927. He first served as secretary.

Mr. Pickard became identified with radio in the early days of broadcasting when he established the first "college of the air" at Kansas State Agricultural college in 1922.

President Coolidge accepted the resignation in a letter today to Mr. Pickard.

ENOUGH PROXIES SECURED TO OUST STEWART, CLAIMED

NEW YORK, Jan. 29.—Victory in his battle to oust Col. Robert W. Stewart as chairman of the board of the Standard Oil company of Indiana was claimed for John D. Rockefeller Jr., today, by an associate of Stewart's.

Thomas M. Debevoise, manager of the Rockefeller campaign for proxies to be voted at the annual meeting of the company March 7, said he believed the Rockefeller group now has enough votes to swing the election.

It is estimated that approximately 30 per cent of the total stock will be represented at the meeting and that control means the holding of more than 45 per cent of the proxies. There are 9,282,000 shares of stock held by 58,000 stockholders.

The fight by Stewart to retain his position in the company in defiance of Rockefeller, which resolved itself into an intensive drive on both sides for proxies, has attracted widespread attention.

The contest had its origin in the refusal of Stewart to resign at the request of Rockefeller after the chairman had appeared before the senate committee investigating the teapot dome oil leases. Testimony of Stewart concerning his relations with the Continental Trading Corporation displeased Rockefeller and the request for his resignation followed.

George K. Bowden, who has been handling Stewart's proxy campaign in New York, said he did not believe the Rockefeller group had enough proxies to control the election.

HOOVER OATH AS PRESIDENT TO BE GIVEN POSTERITY

WASHINGTON, Jan. 29.—For the first time in history the words and movements of a president-elect taking the oath of office are to be recorded in sound pictures.

When Herbert Hoover is inaugurated the ceremony will be graphically recorded for future generations, much as though the words and figure of Abraham Lincoln, with one hand upraised and the other on the Bible, could be heard and seen today in motion-taking pictures.

Andrew May, president of the white house photographers' association in charge of inaugural photographic arrangements, said today the celebration would be the most photographed national event in the nation's history, eclipsing even the capital reception to Charles A. Lindbergh. Three hundred film and cameramen are expected to attend.

ANOTHER REVOLT ATTEMPTED IN SPAIN IS FRUSTRATED

MADRID, Jan. 29.—Premier Prieto de Rivera issued a statement this afternoon declaring that another rebellion in Spain had been frustrated.

From the meagre advices received here it would appear that the subversive movement developed all along the southern and eastern coast of Spain touching the Mediterranean and that the main cities, presumably Barcelona, Valencia, Cartagena and Malaga, were affected. It appeared to have affected the region as far north as Tidalaga.

On September 12, 1923, General Prieto de Rivera, as leader of a military coup d'etat, took over the reins of government in Spain and set up a directory which is now the governing body in that country. In the more than five years since that time there have been many minor revolutionary movements reported but none of sufficient magnitude to imperil the De Rivera dictatorship.

While there has been a movement in Spain directed against the dictatorship in favor of a return to the constitution, there also has been a Catalan separatist movement designed to make Catalonia an autonomous state.

In September 1925, one of the most serious revolts against the government broke out. The rebellion centered about elements within the Spanish artillery and numerous artillery officers were

arrested and their corps dissolved. Later many of the officers were reinstated.

ASA KEYES CASE IN FOURTH WEEK

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 29.—The trial of Asa Keyes, former district attorney, Ben Getzoff and Ed Rosenberg, charged with bribery and conspiracy, was in its fourth week today. Superior Judge Edwin I. Butler announced that night sessions may be held in order to finish it early next week.

Mrs. Lillian Keyes, wife of the former prosecutor, will be recalled to the witness stand as a state's rebuttal witness. District Attorney Burton Fitch said, unless attorneys stipulate regarding certain parts of her testimony. He did not say what stipulations were desired.

It is expected that defense attorneys will close their case with an attempt to show that the diary of Milton Pike, former Getzoff employee, on which most of the evidence against the defendants is built, was for sale to the highest bidder, and that Pike negotiated repeatedly for its sale before taking his information to the grand jury.

Several character witnesses for Ed Rosenberg were the last to testify in regard to Keyes' character. The jury today weighed the testimony of three witnesses who stated that Ed Rosenberg was in Whittier, California, on the afternoon of February 19, 1928—the day Jacob Berman testified that Rosenberg told him Getzoff had arranged to "deal with Keyes" for \$125,000, and that Berman could probably make a like deal.

The Maharajah herself is getting along splendidly and the baby is also in excellent health. The infant is very dark as to complexion and has dark hair and eyes.
