House amended section 4599 Oregon laws as previously amended to make house bill 154 include all counties in the state having a population of 100,000 or less. The original act included counties only up to 25,000 population.

Eberhart's bill states that all incorporated cities shall share in the general county road tax levy irrespective of legislative charters which would exclude them. Until the act was amended only Wasco, Jackson, Tillamook and Douglas county were affected. The amendments throw in Marion, Lane, Washington, Clackamas, and possibly one or two other counties whose population reached the 25,000 mark since the 1910 census.

Other Bills

After defeating the Childs bill, which provides for the issuance of motor vehicle licenses by the sheriffs of the various counties, during the morning session, House members Thursday afternoon moved to reconsider the bill and it was recommitted to the house judiciary committee.

The house passed Senate bill 11, which provides for the cancellation of interest and penalties on delinquent taxes on property acquired by the state.

School buses would be exempt from paying the motor license fee if house bill 321 introduced by McCourt of Multnomah county, becomes a law.

Joe Dunn Bill Lost

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 1.—Senator Dunn's bill providing that the industrial accident commission be increased to five members, one of whom should be a woman, and the state insurance commissioner, made an ex-officio member was killed by the senate Thursday by indefinite postponement. The adverse committee report was adopted.

The deficiency appropriation bill providing for an appropriation of \$142,000, approved by the ways and means committee, was passed with only Senator Upton voting against it. Upton gave as his reasons the fact that for several sessions he has favored the abolition of the state emergency board, which he says gives every opportunity for extravagance, and that he was opposed to expensive activities between sessions by special committees appointed from only one house of the legislature. He cited the property tax relief commission, which has reported expense bills sufficient to make an \$18,000 total. The deficiency appropriation covers all emergency allowances made since the 1927 session.

Hot Fight Due On Bill

Several senators made an unavailing fight Thursday against Senator Bell's bill which makes the county board of equalization in each county composed of the county judge and the two county commissioners instead of the judge, the county clerk and the county assessor. It is understood the bill will be hotly contested in the house.

Senate house bill 48, introduced by Moser, providing that the state board pilot commissioners be made self-sustaining by an increase in the pilot license fees from \$20 to \$50 was passed by the senate.

The senate passed 14 house bills introduced by the committee on repeal of obsolete laws.

Mrs. Denny Pensioned
Governor Patterson has signed house bill 156, introduced by Representative Bynon, which appropriates \$50 a month for Mrs. Gertrude J. Denny, aged widow of Judge Denny, who introduced Chinese pheasants into Oregon. This appropriation is made by each session of the legislature.

house, H. B. 329 provides for two additional circuit judges for the four judicial district and declares an emergency; H. B. 327 fixes the fees to be charged in district courts and H. B. 327 provides for an additional district judge for Multnomah county and increases the salary of all district judges from \$3000 to \$3600 a year.

Settlement of Marion, chairman of the fisheries committee, Friday introduced to the house a bill which would reopen the Columbia river fish wheels.

H. B. 323 repeals the first four sections of the fish wheel bill passed at the election in November, 1926. The bill contains the emergency clause.

Senator Staples Ill

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 1.—Senator Isaac E. Staples, of Multnomah county, veteran chairman of the senate ways and means committee, is confined to his apartments here. Visitors are excluded on orders of his physician. The senator has been absent from senate and committee meetings since Wednesday evening.
