COLD STILL BRINGS MISERY TO EUROPE

PARIS, Feb. 13.—For the first time since 1895 the Seine was frozen from bank to bank today at Montreuil, only 59 miles from Paris. The cold persisted throughout the country and many French communities experienced new low temperature records. More than 15 deaths, attributable to the frigid conditions, have been reported.
