GROWERS TO GET BENEFIT FROM FARMERS' WEEK

Conference to Be Held Here Next Week of Much Importance.

REPORTS PREPARED

Inventory of All Farm Products to Be Secured and Recommendations Made for Future.

Farmers' Week, which will be observed here February 18 to 22, is expected to be one of the most important events of the year for Douglas county agriculture. Farmers and business men of the county are urged to participate in these programs, for they will have an important bearing on agricultural development and profitable farm operations in this county.

Several years ago the state college sponsored a series of agricultural conferences, which were very successful and resulted in an unusual benefit to agricultural interests where the work was properly followed up. Douglas county failed in many respects to take advantage of the opportunity offered by that conference, and it is hoped that this year there will be full cooperation.

The plan for Farmers' Week is almost much the same line as the economic conference, but has a somewhat different arrangement that is expected to result in more definite application of the recommendations.

The purpose of these meetings is to take stock of the agricultural industries of the county, compare results of the past, hear of the latest developments in production and marketing, and make plans for the future in the light of authentic outlook reports.

Washington, D. C., a conference on crop outlook. At this meeting representatives from every part of the country were present and examined statistics pertaining to plantings in every section, so that they might determine exactly the volume of each crop to be produced and the possibilities for market.

These reports are of much value in aiding farmers in planning their plantings to avoid a surplus of any commodity and to maintain a good market.

In addition to these reports there will be talks by experts on various phases of farm problems, and reports by local committees.

These local committees, made up of producers, are working diligently on reports to be presented each day. These reports will contain an inventory for Douglas county on each commodity and agricultural line of activity, together with a recommendation for future activities based upon the general local, state and national outlook, so that it may be readily seen that these reports are of vital importance, not only to the growers, but to the general public as well.

The local meetings will be held at the K. K. hall, starting each morning at 10 o'clock. The dairy meeting will be held at Reedport on Friday at the I. O. O. F. hall in that city.

Consider Crops First Day

February 18 will be crops day. Professor G. H. Hyslop, farm crops specialist, Oregon experiment station, will be one of the speakers at this meeting, discussing such topics as pasture improvement, which will be of special interest to livestock people, also seed crops which are proving profitable in Douglas county. Mr. Bressman of the Oregon experiment station, who specializes in corn work, will also be present to discuss corn growing with the farmers. During the past year, approximately 100 carloads of corn were shipped into Douglas county and a large portion of this could be profitably grown at home if proper cultural methods were used and sufficient acreage planted. Weed control will also be discussed.

Tuesday, February 19, will be livestock day. Professor E. L. Potter, animal husbandryman at the Oregon experiment station, will be present to make one of his usual interesting and profitable talks. Professor Potter is recognized as one of the outstanding animal husbandrymen of the United States. Stanley Jewett, state leader of predatory animal control work of the U. S. biological survey, will discuss formation of control districts for predatory animals. This should be of special interest to men having losses from coyotes and other predatory animals. H. A. Lindgren, livestock fieldman, O. A. C. extension service, will also be present on that day and discuss with the growers problems of cost of production of livestock. R. L. Clark, secretary of the Portland stock yards, will speak on the subject, "When to Market Lambs."

Wednesday, February 20, has been designated as poultry day, at which time committees which were appointed at a recent meeting with A. G. Lunn, will report on the poultry industry in Douglas county and make recommendations for the future. Mr. Lunn, who is chief in poultry at the Oregon experiment station, will discuss topics relating to management of commercial flocks, emphasizing the importance of proper feeding for winter laying, and brooding and care of baby chicks. H. D. Soudner, chief in farm management, will discuss cost of poultry production, and McKinley Huntington of Yoncalla, president of the Douglas County Cooperative Turkey Growers, will discuss some of the latest developments in the production and marketing of turkeys.

Thursday, February 21, will be horticultural day. Specialists secured for this branch of agriculture include Henry Hartman, pomologist at the Oregon experiment station, and Clayton L. Long, O. A. C. extension service, who will discuss topics of interest to the fruit industry as related to Douglas county.

Friday, February 22, will be dairy day and the program will be held at Reedport, which is tributary to a large portion of the dairy industry of the county. J. D. Mickle, state food and dairy commissioner, will be present on this occasion. Mr. Mickle has recently returned from Europe where he made a study of the dairy situation and will have a message of value to the dairy people. N. C. Johnston, dairy specialist, O. A. C. extension service, will discuss the formation of contagious abortion-free areas, formation of cow testing associations and other topics of special interest. No effort will be spared to make these sessions interesting and profitable, and as many of the farmers of Douglas county as can are urged to attend.
