BANK CASHIER FINED FOR DEPOSIT TAPPING

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 15.—Louis Fernald, 43, former assistant cashier and teller of the Citizens National bank of Baker, was fined one thousand dollars here today when he pleaded guilty to "tapping" deposits to the extent of \$2,571. Fernald himself had advised the bank of the irregularity and is understood to have repaid all the money taken. The court considered this circumstance as ample evidence of reformation and the United States attorney recommended that a fine only be imposed.

COUNTY COURT LETS GASOLINE CONTRACT
The county court today signed a contract with the Standard Oil company for the delivery of gasoline for county purposes. Fixing prices caused the county to change its policy of passing the county's purchases of gasoline and oil around among the various contractors and resulted in a call for bids for furnishing the county with such supplies for a period of one year. The Standard Oil company's bid of 17 1/2 cents per gallon, 7 cents below retail price, was considered the best and was accepted. The county uses about 50,000 gallons of gasoline yearly.
