

EXPANSION OF LIVESTOCK IS BASED ON FEED

there be no expansion in the sheep business until feeding conditions are improved. It is necessary that sheep growers who desire to continue increasing their flocks think seriously of increasing the feed supply.

Already the extreme and unusual cold weather has demonstrated what an emergency can do. The cost of buying and shipping in feed has already eaten up a large share of the profit from the industry this year.

Douglas county has facilities for producing a great deal more feed than is now raised and before flocks are increased there should be more feed provided to meet whatever conditions may be encountered.

It is also found that there has been a steady increase in sheep in the state of Oregon for several years. Depressed conditions in other lines of agriculture have led many farmers who have not raised sheep before to think of making a change in that direction. Any general expansion for an increase in sheep, it is claimed, would be unwise.

"Although goats are generally considered only a means of clear-

ing land and scarcely enough kids are saved in many flocks to replace losses, some increase in the number of goats in western Oregon seems to be justified, due to the fact that there is an abundance of outside range, which is suitable for that purpose only," the report continues. "The outlook for mohair producers is quite favorable for the coming year, although not so good as a year ago. Domestic production appears to be increasing more rapidly than consumption, and the foreign consumption was less than in 1927."

Rodent Eradication Discussed
Means of eradicating the coyote menace were discussed by Elmer Williams, assistant leader of predatory animal control. He explained the method used in placing poison bait, stating that the poison is put out only upon the request of the owners of the lands. Work has been carried on very successfully in the Days creek section by John Ullam, he reported, and told in detail the results that have been obtained there.

He also reported that some skunks and badgers were poisoned by the baits, but so far as has been learned no other far-bearing animals have been killed in Oregon. The skins of 50,000 predatory animals have been turned into the bureau's office since May, 1915, he reports. 85 per cent of these were coyotes.

He also discussed new methods of using the poison for coyotes that have become "strychnine-wise," a seltain capsule being used.

Tells of Lamb Market
Another interesting talk was presented by R. L. Clark, secretary of the livestock exchange at Portland.

Mr. Clark emphasized the importance of the lamb industry in Douglas county, pointing out that the Douglas county producers have a great advantage in the fact that they can place their lambs on a market considerably earlier than producers elsewhere.

Plans should be made, he said, to have the lambs in condition for market not later than July 15, as the market becomes oversupplied after that date. The most important factor in lamb marketing, he stated, is to get the animals into the markets while there is a strong demand and high prices.

Lambs marketed before July 15, he believes, will pay from \$1 to \$2 more per head to the grower than those held until September.

Tomorrow Big Day
Tomorrow is to be the big day of the conference. It will be poultry day and some very interesting reports have been prepared. These reports were made up by the local committees after carefully considering the national and state outlook and will contain detailed information and recommendations for chicken and turkey growers. There will also be several subject matter talks of great value to all persons engaged in the industry.

At noon the chamber of commerce will hold a luncheon at the Umpqua hotel for all local business men and for the visiting poultry producers, as well as any other persons interested in the poultry industry of the county.

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At the CAPITAL

(Associated Press Special Wire)

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 18.—The senate today passed the Rogue river fish conservation bill introduced by Senators Miller and Dunne and Representatives Carlin and Briggs.

The measure provides for the withdrawing from appropriation for power development and dam construction the waters of the main channel of the Rogue.

Jury Immunity Widened

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 18.—Chiropractors, Christian Science practitioners, naturopaths and undertakers are added to the list of those exempt from jury duty in house bill 296 Monday passed Monday morning by the lower house. The bill also provides that the jury lists shall be drawn from the registration rolls instead of entirely from the tax rolls.

The state market agent's duties came in for considerable discussion on the floor of the house Monday morning before H. B. 273 was passed. This bill, introduced by Johnson of Walla Walla, raises the license fees for public and terminal warehouses from two to ten dollars per year. The increase will provide for more inspection under the state market agent. Henderson of Multnomah attacked the bill on the basis that no more provision for inspection was made in the bill but that the license fees were only raised.

"A surplus of \$24,000 was turned back to the general fund by the state market agent at the end of the last biennium," said Henderson. "This is the wrong system of taxation."
