KLAMATH WOMAN DRAWS PENALTY ON DRY LAW CHARGE

PORTLAND, Feb. 18.—Camille Christie, wife of her husband, operated a hotel in Klamath Falls, appeared in federal court here today for sentencing on a liquor-sale charge and drew a jail sentence of thirty days and a \$500 fine.

Mrs. Christie failed to appear last week when her husband and other defendants were sentenced. Her attorney put up the plea that there was "nobody home to run the business if she is sent to jail."

After sentencing Mrs. Christie asked for a 60-day stay of execution until her husband is released.

The court granted her a ten-day stay and required a new bond of \$1,500.
