

POULTRY MEN ARE GUESTS AT NOON LUNCHEON

Chamber of Commerce Sponsors Meeting at Umpqua Hotel.

FINE PROGRAM HEARD

Poultry Day Brings Out Best Attendance of Any of the Farm Week Meetings.

In connection with today's observance of poultry day at the farmers' week conference, the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce presented a noon luncheon at the Umpqua hotel as a feature of the program. The luncheon was made a part of the general program for the day, and aided in making today's meeting the most successful of the conference so far.

The attendance today was exceptionally good, more than 100 poultrymen being present at the morning session, with an additional group on hand for the afternoon meeting. The program for the day was as follows:

Mr. G. W. Burt, one of the county's leading poultrymen, presided.

Luncheon Well Attended

The luncheon at noon was so well attended that places had to be set in the main dining room of the hotel for the overflow crowd. Mrs. C. S. Reimline had charge of the musical features and presented three most excellent selections. The first was a piano duet by Allene Walker and Anna May Unruh, after which Miss Vera McClintock sang two charming solos.

A soprano solo was then given by Louise Langenberg, accompanied at the piano by his sister, Miss Marie Langenberg.

Mrs. Reimline led the audience in a novelty song, after which A. C. Marsters, president of the chamber of commerce took charge of the meeting and introduced County Agent J. C. Leedy.

Mr. Leedy in turn introduced Prof. A. G. Lunn, head of the poultry department of the state college, who spoke very briefly upon the importance of the poultry industry in Oregon. He stated that Douglas county has always been looked upon as the leading poultry county of the state, and that there is ample room for development.

He stated that there is no danger of overproduction as long as a high quality is maintained, but that one of the chief problems that must be observed is that of economic production, as there is now a very wide variation in the cost of eggs and poultry production. Yet there is no branch of agriculture, he said, that offers a greater opportunity for a person adapted to the work, than does poultry, particularly in view of the conditions in the state of Oregon. Roseburg, he said, is especially favored climatically, and is well suited to the industry every possible aid.

Herbert Devere, manager of the Douglas County Cooperative Turkey Growers' association was next introduced and spoke on the work of that organization and the possibilities for the poultry industry in this county.

BURNETT FOUND GUILTY BY JURY CIRCUIT COURT

Was Indicted on Charge Driving on Wrong Side of Road.

SENTENCE WITHHELD

Glendale Youth Given Six Months on Booze Charge But Is Paroled.

Gordon Burnett, indicted on a charge of driving his car on the wrong side of the road and causing a wreck which resulted in the death of Edna Parks Gardner, was found guilty by a circuit court jury after a lengthy deliberation yesterday evening. The jury required several hours before reaching its decision.

The defense was given time to prepare a motion for arrest of judgment, so that sentence will not be passed until after the motion is heard.

The court took up the case of Douglas Creditors' association against J. E. Salsbury immediately following the Burnett case, the action being one in which the credit association is suing for approximately \$90 on an account assigned by the Douglas County Farm Bureau. The defense claims that the machinery purchased, and for which the association is suing, was defective and was not as represented. The association is represented by Attorney R. B. Compton and the defendant by Attorney George Jones and John T. Long.

Gerald Kendall, indicted for possession of liquor, appeared for sentence and was ordered confined in the county jail for a period of six months, but was paroled to the custody of A. G. Clark, of Glendale.

Two arrests were made yesterday on secret indictments returned by the grand jury. Henry Archambault was taken into custody accused of the possession of liquor. He was arrested some time ago on a charge of threatening to commit a felony, it being claimed that he threatened to shoot a neighbor with whom he had quarreled. It was stated, however, that he was under the influence of liquor at the time, and the grand jury returned a not true bill on that count, but brought in a new indictment charging possession of liquor. He will probably be arraigned late today.

John T. Black, of Myrtle Creek, was also arrested on a secret indictment. It is charged that he shot and wounded a cow belonging to Ed Weaver because the cow was annoying him. He also will be arraigned today. It is expected the court is expected to take up the case against Ed Main of Yoncalla tomorrow morning. Mr. Main was indicted on a charge of possession of hash.

Present indications are that the term will be completed either the last of this week or early next week. It was at first thought that it would probably continue well into March but the fact that Roland Schwartz changed his plea from not guilty to guilty and paid his fine, together with the dismissal of several other actions and the continuance of some cases, now causes it to appear that the work will soon be finished.

Three cases were continued for the term today. They are the actions of Alta Denley against P. A. Webb; Oregon Stages vs. H. L. Chambers, and C. A. Lockwood against G. T. Ruyer. Several other actions will also probably be continued instead of being brought to trial as previously expected.

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GAS DOWN FURTHER IN PRICE WARFARE IN COAST STATES

(Associated Press Local Wire)

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 20.—The Portland retail gasoline dealers' protective association is in a quandary.

After having promulgated an order that members must adhere to the 19 1/2 cent per gallon price established yesterday, and threatening severe action against any dealer who cut his prices further, the association was faced today with a slash by General Petroleum to 17 1/2 cents a gallon.

The protective association is now marking time, waiting to learn whether the oil companies will meet the situation.

The Standard Oil company this morning had "no confirmation of a 2-cent cut."

The Shell company had "no official advice."

In response to the question of whether its price had dropped two cents, a Union Oil company official said "not that we know of."

The Richfield Oil company had "no confirmation I know of."

Associated Oil said there was "no change."

The Texas company alone had followed General Petroleum into the battle and retail stations operated by it displayed 17 1/2 cent signs.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 20.—Announcement of reduction of two cents a gallon on gasoline, the second reduction within a week, was made by the Standard, General, Texaco and Shell Oil companies here today acting on instructions from headquarters of the respective companies. At the Associated and Union plants it was stated that no advice had yet been received for the reduction locally.

Last Friday a cut of two cents from 23 to 21 cents was made general here by all the companies, and the present reduction by some companies is from 22 to 19 cents.

War in California

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 20.—Gasoline prices today again another two cents here today with General Petroleum corporation making the first cut. The company established 16 1/2 cents per gallon as the official retail price, 12 1/2 cents the wholesale price and offered a two cent rebate to retailers handling General gasoline exclusively.

The Texas company which led the two cent reduction last week in a renewal of the gasoline war that has sent gasoline down seven cents per gallon, followed the lead within half an hour, establishing the same prices.

Shell Oil company and Standard Oil company of California met the price reduction. Conferences were being held at headquarters of the Union Oil company and Richfield Oil company with indications that they, too, would meet the cut by noon.
