

CABINET PLAN MOVED NEARER POPULAR VOTE

Senate Favours Resolution
Submitting Proposal
to Electorate.

9 DEPARTMENTS FIXED

Governor, State Secretary
and Treasurer Outside
of Provisions of
Measure.

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 19.—By unanimous vote the senate today did its part towards placing on the ballot at the next general election a proposed constitutional amendment for the establishing of the cabinet form of state government and abolition of the existing form. This was by the adoption of senate joint resolution 16, introduced by a special committee on administration and reorganization of state government.

The measure provides that the executive and administrative functions of the government be performed by the governor with the assistance of the following nine departments: Agriculture, labor and industry, financial administration, commerce, education, public works and domains, health and public welfare, state police and military, and legal affairs.

All present executive and administrative offices, boards and commissions, except the offices of governor, secretary of state and state treasurer, would be abolished on July 1, 1931. Each new department, except education, would be in charge of an officer known as the director of his department. The governor would be director of the department of state police and military affairs. The department of education would be in charge of a board of nine directors known as the state board of education.

All officials would be appointed by the governor except the secretary of state and state treasurer. These remain elective.

Blow at Loan Sharks
The senate today passed the Marks and Corbett bill providing for the organization of credit unions whereby mutual loan associations may be formed for the benefit of members wishing to borrow money. It is designed mainly for laboring men and, as explained by Marks, gets them away from the necessity of patronizing loan sharks. Associations under the act would be under the supervision of the state superintendent of banks.

Barber Bill Slain
A solid vote by the so-called farm bloc killed Loneragan's barber bill in the lower house Tuesday. The bill, H. B. 290 had been so amended and changed as to have lost all likeness to its original form. The only provisions in the bill, as finally presented to the house, were those requiring that all barber shops be equipped with sterilizers and that clean linen be used for each customer. The increased license provision was deleted in committee but nevertheless the farmers joined the barbers in being "agin" the bill.

Anderson's bill to clarify statutes relative to hens for labor on catching of commercial fish was passed by the house.

The potato bill, frankly admitted by Childgren, its sponsor to be a "regulatory bill," but not "drawn up by the state market agent," was passed by the house with only two opposing votes.

The lower house passed the bill increasing the salary of the state superintendent of public instruction from \$4,000 to \$5,000 per year, despite the vote of the "conscientious objectors" to all salary increase or appropriation measures.

HUSKY HOOPSTERS CLINCH TITLE OF NORTH DIVISION

FROM FLORIDA TO ROSEBURG IN NASH

Describing a recent trip from Delroy Beach, Florida, to Roseburg, Oregon, which was made in a Nash coupe, Mr. H. C. Braeger, of this city, speaks glowingly of the performance of the Nash car. In a letter to the Nash Motor Co., which was forwarded to the L. R. Chambers Motor Co., Roseburg distributors for Nash cars, and who gave us this interesting story, Mr. Braeger expresses entire satisfaction with mileage obtained from Delroy Beach. In the Sierran range we encountered snow and landslides, and after driving in a blinding snow storm on the summit of the Sierran range in the neighborhood of the Oregon-California line, descended the winding road into the Rogue River valley and headed on north to Roseburg without a single mishap. The Nash never went back on us at any time, and I found the car gave best results while making 16 to 45 miles an hour, and the car certainly gave entire satisfaction under all conditions and kinds of roads."

PERCY WILLIAMS. CANADIAN FLASH, FIRST TIME LOSER

60-Yard Event Dropped to
Jack Elder, Notre Dame
Halfback; 2 Records
Broken at Meet.

NEW YORK, Feb. 19.—A heavy muscled football star has come out of the middle west to beat Percy Williams, Vancouver sprinter, at his own game.

Jack Elder, halfback on the last Notre Dame football team, finished the track season with a sensation last night when he conquered Williams in a 60-yard dash at the annual New York A. C. games in Madison Square Garden.

It was the first defeat of Williams' career. The double Olympic spring champion, up to last night, had not the greatest sprinters in the world at varying distances and always with the same success. Williams was slow off his mark, as usual, but his famous "kick" near the finish failed by half a yard to nip the flying elder. The time, six and two-fifths seconds, failed by one-fifth of a second to equal the world's record.

New Records Made
The games developed two new world's records and an amazing pole vault of 14 feet by Fred Sturdy of Yale.

Wesley Backin, now competing for the N. Y. A. C., achieved a fifth of a second off the indoor mark for the 60-yard high hurdles, clearing the four barriers in 7.25 seconds in one of the trial heats. He was beaten in the finals by a clubmate, Carl Ring, in 7.45 seconds. A New York prep school relay team shaded the inter-collegiate record for the mile which was turned in 3:50.25, a second faster than the former mark set by the same school in Pennsylvania two years ago.

Sturdy, who was forced to take a one-a seat in competition last year because Yale's best pole vaulter happened to be one Sabin Carr, came within an inch of his famous former teammate's indoor world's record of 14 feet, one inch. Sturdy needed his 14-foot performance to nose out Victor Pickard of the University of Pittsburgh who competed for Canada in the last Olympics. Pickard cleared 13 feet 10 inches. Sturdy failed in three attempts to break Carr's record with the stick set at 14 feet, one and one-half inches.

Paavo Nurmi turned in the fastest two miles of the season to beat a mediocre handicap field. The Finn's time was 9:15.25, far behind his world's record of 8:55.15 set in the same games four years ago.

\$8,000,000 GIVEN NORTHWESTERN U.

CHICAGO, Feb. 19.—Through its largest single endowment, a gift of \$8,000,000, Northwestern university hopes to build up "the most outstanding undergraduate school in the west." Robert W. Campbell, president of the board of trustees, was announced.

The endowment, which is to be devoted exclusively to development of the college of liberal arts, was made public yesterday when the will of the late Milton H. Wilson, Evanston clothing manufacturer, was filed in probate court.

Mr. Wilson, who was a trustee of the university, had given the school \$1,500,000 before his death February 10. The next largest item in the will was an \$800,000 trust fund established for his grandson, Carl Wilson Alton. This also is to go to the university in case the grandson dies without heirs. The total estate was valued at \$10,000,000.

THREE FUGITIVE OHIO CONVICTS SOON CAPTURED

In Philadelphia for murder. One Believed Wounded.

Rosso was captured after he and a companion had been driven from a general store near the farm where he was captured. The owner of the store heard the men as they discarded their prison uniforms for overalls from his shelves and opened fire. He believed he wounded the man with Rosso and a posse took up his trail. Searchers had no indication of the direction taken by the other fugitive.

McDermott and Jacko were first sighted by Charles Gardner, who overtook them in a truck after they had stolen his automobile. He

notified authorities, who trailed them to a power house in a rock quarry. The deputies found them crouching at the head of a stairway, and captured them without difficulty.

McDermott wore a civilian cap and both had covered their prison clothes with raincoats. They were armed with paring knives. Neither would tell how they got the raincoats, nor the knives.

Warden Preston E. Thomas fixed direct responsibility for the escape on one of two guards assigned to watch the cell tiers through the night. The guards, Charles Shively and J. B. Isaacs, were questioned at length by Warden Thomas and other state officials assigned to investigate the escape by Governor Myers Y. Cooper, who expressed the opinion that the other fugitive convicts would be returned in a short time.

Fuel system of the new Ford has been designed for reliability and long service



THE practical value of Ford simplicity of design is especially apparent in the fuel system.

The gasoline tank is built integral with the cowl and is unusually sturdy because it is made of heavy sheet steel, terne plated to prevent rust or corrosion. An additional factor of strength is the fact that it is composed of only two pieces, instead of three or four, and is electrically welded—not soldered.
