LINCOLN AND LANGTRY—BEAUTY AND SERVICE. On Lincoln's birthday February 12th, 1929, the Associated Press carried, in connection with the death of Lily Langtry, the most famous beauty the world has known, this incident:

"Last November, as a wrinkled old lady of 76, she was the guest of honor at a birthday party in a fashionable London hotel and the curious were informed that she was Lady de Bath—Lily Langtry, you know."

"Then there were exclamations of surprise. Most of the diners thought Lily Langtry had 'gone on,' as had King Edward VII and many other famous men and women with whom this birthday celebrant, in her younger days, was on terms of close friendship."

"Thus was it demonstrated that Lily Langtry was a survivor of her own beauty and fame and general popularity; an epilogue to a story of shining wonder and beauty."

"Postal card pictures of this same Lily Langtry once were sold by the tens of thousands. Newspapers acclaimed her. The United States bowed to her loveliness; far down in Texas, near the Mexican border, a town was named after her."

"Now, even in her own England she was unrecognized! It was a strange anti-climax."

But three score years have passed away And Lincoln's name holds greater sway; His glory gains with every year— The world now bends above his bier. Oh, hear, ye hosts of modern youth, Mark well this most important truth: The man who lives to serve mankind His immortality will find!

MASS MURDER OF CHICAGO GUNMEN NEARS SOLUTION

CHICAGO, Feb. 20.—The enforcement agencies of the United States government, the county of Cook and the city of Chicago expressed a united belief today that last Thursday's mass murder of gangsters was approaching solution.

A secret informant gave definite and significant information to federal investigators last night. It lent corroborative color to the theory, first expressed by a federal official, that Chicago police officers may have had a part in the seven-fold slaying.

"Moran's gang (the seven who were killed) were members of the George Moran crowd," stole \$12,000 worth of a Chicago policeman's liquor," said the informant, "and think what the shooting's all about."

"The policeman who owned the liquor has a partner and a sweetheart. The girl runs a beauty shop and the partner runs a roadhouse northwest of Chicago. The officer has a half interest in the roadhouse."

Origin of Clew. That was the way the story came to the investigators. It was explained that the informant had overheard a conversation between the policeman and the girl through a thin partition of the beauty shop.

Whether the authorities had more definite information than this as to the officer's identity, was carefully concealed. It was pointed out, however, that the dying statement of Frank Gusenberg, the only gangster not killed outright in the massacre, was that "a couple of coppers did it."

Coroner Herman D. Bundesen, twice threatened with death because of his activity in the investigation, said he was at work on "a real clue," but did not say what it was. In addition, a new witness was found who declared positively that the car used by the murderers was actually a police squad car and not one that "just looked like a police car."

MOSCOW.—The biggest bell in Europe, the Tsar Kolokol, or "ring" bell, has been converted into a chapel. The bell was cast in 1823 and weighed 194 tons. A fire in 1877 destroyed its supporting beams and the bell crashed to the ground. Then someone thought of casting a door in the metal and, presto, a church bell became a bell chapel.
