NEW FARM METHODS

Whatever the ins and outs of farm relief as a general subject may be, it is becoming evident that the application of scientific principles to agriculture is a first essential. The extension service of the State College of Washington recently issued a bulletin to dairy farmers of that state, pointing out that any dairy cow which failed to produce at least 300 pounds of butter fat a year costs her owner more than she gives. The farmer actually is out at the pocket at the end of the year with such cows in his herd. A score of years ago the average farmer wouldn't have known what you meant if you talked about "butter fat" and the like. The old methods of farming, glorified by unthinking conservatives, were wasteful and inefficient. Scientific methods, exemplified by this Washington State College activity, are what agriculture needs.

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LINDBERGH NAMED EXPERT ADVISER IN U. S. AIR SERVICE

(Associated Press Local Wire)

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh has been appointed technical adviser to the aeronautics branch of the commerce department.

Secretary Whiting, in announcing the appointment and Lindbergh's acceptance, said today that the flyer's entrance into the government service would not keep him permanently in Washington. Under the arrangement Lindbergh will be at the call of William P. MacCracken, Jr., assistant secretary of commerce for aeronautics, to give his advice and personal assistance on any phase of the regulation of civil aviation, the establishment of airways and airports, research and accident prevention. The post will carry a salary which will be determined by the actual amount of time the colonel is required to give to his official duties. Mr. Whiting expressed his personal gratification over the department's "having secured the services of one who has contributed in such an outstanding manner to the advancement of aviation, both at home and abroad."

PERCY WILLIAMS EQUALS RECORD IN 60-YARD SPRINT

TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 22.—Percy Williams' flying feet have brought him to the Canadian national indoor 60-yard championship in record-equaling time.

The alma Vancouver sprinter, Olympic 100 and 200 meter champion, was beaten in 7.80 of the trial heats of the 60-yards at the Canadian national indoor track and field championships here last night but came back to win the final in 6 and one-fifth seconds, equalling the world's record. The meet developed three other new Canadian amateur records. Harold Osborn of the Illinois A. C. jumped six feet two inches to set a new mark in the high jump; Vic Pickard, of the University of Pittsburgh, cleared 13 feet in the pole vault; and Jimmy Hall, runner-up to Ray Harbati in the Olympic 400-meter final, clipped two seconds off the Canadian mark for 300 yards. Phil Edwards, of New York university, after breaking the tape first in the 600 yard championship, continued on to the 660-yard mark, equalling the best recorded time for the longer distance—one minute and 21 1/5 seconds.

BORAH DECLINES JOB IN CABINET

WASHINGTON, Feb. 21.—Friends of the senator understand declared today he had eliminated himself from consideration as member of the Hoover cabinet but the senator would make no comment on his long conference of last night with the president-elect.

In his quest for an attorney general, it is known that Mr. Hoover turned to the senator despite the latter's previous declaration to be considered for secretary of state. Friends of the senator understand that he feels his opportunities for public service are greatest in the senate where he is chairman of the powerful foreign relations committee.

Mr. McGarry has had a great deal of experience in gasmaking and will be able to take over his duties here immediately. He will move his family to this city in the very near future.

MANTONA, Cal., Feb. 22.—Howard R. Sewell, 38, principal of the Mantona grammar school, dropped dead on the floor of the school gymnasium here last night, just as he was struck in the head by a basketball. The principal was playing in a game with students. Death was declared to have been due to exertion superinduced by shock at being hit by the ball.

12-YEAR-OLD CATCHER SIGNED BY TOM TURNER

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HOUSE COMMITTEE APPROVES BATCH OF RESOLUTIONS

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 21.—The resolutions committee of the lower house has recommended the passage of Senator Kiddle's memorial petitioning congress to set aside and reserve as a national park approximately 100,000 acres of the Willowa mountains in Union and Walloona counties.

A favorable recommendation also accompanies Senator Belts memorial petitioning congress to pass senate bill 1434, the object of which is to purchase the place name work of Will G. Steel of Eugene. This collection of place names, including the historical significance of more than 80,000 place names in all states of the union, is the life work of Will Steel, the "father of Crater Lake."

Other resolutions receiving the recommendation of the house committee are Senator Corbett's resolution providing for the appointment of a committee to study the actuarial soundness of the workmen's compensation act; the Upton and Wells resolution looking toward a soldier's state loan fund; the Norblad, Robinson and Johnson memorial asking congress to use money from Sand Island to propagate salmon in the Columbia river district.

BAKING KING'S WIDOW INHERITS \$20,000,000

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y., Feb. 21.—William B. Ward, baking magnate and philanthropist, who once planned a \$1,000,000,000 "merger with a soul," which would follow biblical precedents by giving one-tenth of all profits to charity, left almost his entire estate, valued at over twenty million, to his widow, Mrs. Ethel Hanes Ward.
