Ford Promotes Edison's Ceremony and Discusses Prohibition, Golf, Automobile Industry, World Peace

FORT MYERS, Fla., Feb. 20.—In the same little frame building in which the electric light first burned, Thomas A. Edison will celebrate his history-making invention on the fiftieth anniversary of its perfection.

Henry Ford, the electrical wizard's close friend, yesterday revealed that Mr. Edison has agreed to go to Dearborn, Mich., for the anniversary celebration on October 21, in the original Menlo Park, N. J., laboratory, now in Ford's museum. Edison will gather around him the aged assistants who helped develop the incandescent lamp, and with a brief ceremony will re-enact its creation.

The ceremony will take place in the historical village near the main museum, for which Mr. Ford recently made a gift of \$5,000,000 on the occasion of Mr. Edison's 82nd birthday.

Good Outlook for Autos
Mr. Ford discussed a wide variety of subjects in a two-hour interview.

The motor magnate believes conditions in the automobile industry are satisfactory and that there is little danger of over-production.

In his own factories, he said, 7,000 cars a day are being turned out.

During his vacation, Ford disclosed, he is working on automatic machinery for the manufacture of parts used in his cars. He is being assisted by Edison.

"I am trying to make a straight line out of a circle," he said. "We are working 800 men making 140,000 of these parts daily. I am trying to cut this down."

Ford reiterated his confidence in the ability of Edison to find a plant that can produce a rubber supply for the United States with-

in its borders.
Would Ground Lindy
Expressing pleasure at learning of the engagement of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, the automobile magnate said he hoped the famous flyer would give up flying himself.

"He is too valuable to risk his life," Ford said. "Incidentally, the only two flights Ford has ever made were with Col. Lindbergh."

Discussing aviation, Ford expressed the belief that airplanes "are far from perfection" and that aircraft of the future would be a combination of lighter than air ships, the helicopter and present type planes.

The manufacturer reiterated his previously expressed views on prohibition, declaring that the United States would "see real enforcement in the next two or three years."

"The grafters," he said, "eventually will be weeded out of the dry enforcement forces."

Warning to Golfers
Golf, Ford asserted, is causing more heart trouble than any other one thing.

"I own a golf course," he said, "but never play. The American people drag themselves over the courses at slow speed, then completely fatigued, sit down and eat hearty meals."

"My favorite form of exercise is running or brisk walking, but I always rest before meals."

Mr. Ford said that at 65 he often runs several miles a day and exercises vigorously upon arising or retiring daily. He said that almost every one eats too much.

"Peace is a matter of education," the magnate said in turning to another subject, "and Americans are too well educated to participate in another war."

Markets

BOSTON, Feb. 23.—The Commercial Bulletin today says:

"The wool market has continued to sag under the pressure of heavy wool offerings with comparatively light demand for the finished fabric. Foreign markets are, for the most part five per cent lower for the week on fine wools and about two per cent lower on medium to low descriptions."

"The goods market is generally conceded to be healthy, although there is no snap to the demand for finished goods."

"In the west, only a little buying is reported and that on the early short wools of Arizona, for which prices varying from 29 to 23 cents is reported on the equivalent of 95 cents to \$1.00, clean hand baled. It is doubtful if as high prices would be paid today, in view of the foreign price tendencies."

"Mohair is quiet and tending in favor of the buyer."
