

## ROSEBURG BEATS GRANTS PASS BY SCORE OF 26 TO 19

Roseburg high school won a fast and rough game of basketball Saturday night, defeating Grants Pass 26 to 19. While the game was rough and hard-fought, there were few personal fouls called, for both teams played a clean game.

Roseburg started off too fast for accuracy and the boys had a hard time holding the ball, several good plays being marred by fumbles, but after a few passes the local boys became more accurate and tossed four baskets in quick succession, running up a score of 9 points before Grants Pass scored. Grants Pass made its first score on a free throw.

The local boys then started working their signals with clockwork precision and made three baskets in plays directly from tip-off. By the end of the first quarter Roseburg was leading 15 to 3. In order to give experience to other members of the squad, Coach Turner then made substitutions, which broke up the scoring system, so that by the end of the half the score was 21 to 8.

Grants Pass rallied in the third quarter, which ended 26 to 15. In the last quarter Roseburg resorted to stalling so that there was little change in the score.

## GOVERNOR TO BE GIVEN REGENTS MEASURE TODAY

ments the committee cares to make to the bill are all right with me."

### Chief Provisions

In place of the three boards of regents the bill sets up a state board of higher education composed of nine directors appointed by the governor with the approval of the senate.

The bill comes to the house from the committee on education amended to make a two-thirds affirmative vote of the senate necessary for ratification of directors nominated by the governor.

The original bill provided for a committee of five senators to meet and pass upon any interim appointments made to the board by the governor, and this has been amended to enlarge the committee to six senators and require a vote of four of them to approve an appointment.

Another amendment specifies that gifts to any of the institutions administered under the common board shall be credited to the funds of the institution to which the gift is made, although all millage taxes and appropriated funds of the university, college and normal schools are pooled for expenditure as the board shall determine after the 1929-1930 biennium under the terms of the bill. For the coming biennium, it is specified, each of the schools shall be credited with the millage funds and appropriations already allotted.

### Would Bar Politics

Though a survey of the functions and needs of the institutions involved, which the board is directed to carry on during the next two years, the sponsors for the plan hope to see the entire system of higher education in the state reorganized on a basis that will eliminate duplication and overlapping of work, put an end to wasteful and extravagant competition for students, and take the institutions out of politics.

It is set forth in the bill that "All relationships and negotiations between the state legislature and its various committees and the institutions of higher education shall be carried on through the department of higher education. No subordinate official representing any of the separate institutions shall appear before the legislature or any committee except upon the written authority of the board." This is lobbying by the institutions disapproved of.

### Appointment Time Brief

Past action in the selection of nine members of the board of education will be required if the bill is approved by the governor, as it provides that "prior to the adjournment of the thirty-fifth legislative assembly, the governor shall appoint the members of said state board of higher education, designating the terms of office of the appointees from one to nine years, respectively, so that thereafter the term of office of one of said members shall expire each year for nine years. The successor of each of the original appointees shall be appointed for a term of nine years."

Selection of such a board by the governor upon such short notice would be no small task, particularly in view of the fact that the appointees must be acceptable to two-thirds of the members of the senate; none of them shall be residents of the cities in which the schools are located, and not more than three shall be alumni of the institutions.

The new board would have its headquarters in Salem and would deal with the institutions through respective executive secretaries having his office in the capitol.

### House Votes Own Pay

SALEM, Ore., Feb. 25.—Overriding the protests of a minority who cited the state constitution in support of their contention that members of the legislature can be legally paid only \$3 a day for their services, and that only for 49 days in any one session, the house Saturday afternoon adopted a resolution appropriating \$5 a day for expenses to all members.

The measure now goes to the senate, where 16 votes are said to be pledged to its passage.

In the senate the Saturday afternoon session was featured by the defeat of Representative McAllister's bill to designate taxes as the levies of the year for which they are collected rather than of the year for which they are assessed.

The measure came out of the judiciary committee without recommendation and was opposed principally upon the ground that such a change would lead to confusion.

H. B. 248, by Knapp—Increasing salary of Curry county treasurer from \$1800 to \$1900 a year.

H. B. 489, by Collier and Hamilton—Increasing salary of Jefferson county treasurer from \$1000 to \$1200 a year.

H. B. 428, by Representative Briggs and Senator Dunne—Increasing Jackson county treasurer from \$1800 to \$2000 a year.

H. B. 465, by Chinook—Giving state engineer authority to refuse applications to appropriate water.

Bills passed by the house Saturday afternoon before adjourning were:

H. B. 360, providing for appropriation for payment of awards at the eastern Oregon livestock show.

on revision of laws—repeals legal provision that all residents of county seat towns must register with county clerk. County clerk authorized to appoint registrars. Provides for registration of electors who are ill.

Senate bill 168, by Corbett—providing that funds held in trust for charitable and educational purposes may be invested in high grade stocks.

Senate bill 202, by Klepper—requiring stricter qualifications for members of state board of aeronautics.

### More Dry Law Teeth

The senate is awaiting the reappearance of Senator B. L. Eddy's bill tightening up the law relating to drunken drivers on state highways, and which was referred to the alcohol committee last Saturday after a spirited debate.

Senator Eddy opposed the motion, "No man has a right to drink intoxicating liquor and then drive an automobile on the public highways," said Eddy. "Why should the legislature protect a man whose brain and nervous system are warped by alcohol? I can see no reason for re-referring this bill."

Quator Eddy finally agreed to place the bill on the table until its opponents might have time to submit any amendments they might desire.

### VIOLATIONS LIQUOR LAW ARE CHARGED

Five arrests for violation of liquor laws were made over the week-end. Deputy Sheriff Fred L. Perry arrested James Evans and Frank Collier at the Wigwam dance Saturday night on a charge of intoxication. Both entered pleas of not guilty when arraigned this morning before Justice of the Peace Hopkins. Earl Quinn, Harry Montgomery and J. H. Avery of Eugene, California, were arrested by Capt. Griffith at Myrtle Creek, charged with being intoxicated.

### Steps Torn Off as Cars Collide

The machines driven by Mrs. S. Buell of Dillard and Kenneth Lawson of this city were both damaged when they collided near the intersection of Pine and Mosher streets Saturday evening at about 5 o'clock. The Lawson car going into the front yard and tearing off the steps at the residence of Mrs. J. C. Hamilton on the corner of the two streets, as a result of the impact. Occupants of the machines were uninjured.
