of the state bankers' association. The committee has not taken action on the bill.

In effect senate bill 71 would repeal section 57 of the building and loan code and would permit interest on the banking department when building and loan companies use the word "savings" in their business.

The building and loan men, through their spokesman, Ben Hazen, of Portland, claimed that the repeal of 57 would give the "bankers a corner on the use of the words, 'savings' and 'deposits' and 'savings banks' which they claim as their inalienable right. 'This bill has only one object,' said Hazen, 'and that is to restrict the proper growth of building and loan associations in the state.'

\$150,000 for Fair Ground
SALEM, Ore., Feb. 27.—It took some persuasive argument by Senator Lloyd Reynolds of Marion county Tuesday night to get the ways and means committee into a mood to report out favorably the Reynolds bill providing for a new exhibit building at the state fair grounds, but Reynolds succeeded in getting it through.

The committee voted 10 to 8 for a favorable report.

The bill calls for an appropriation of \$100,000, with the additional sum of \$50,000 to be raised by private subscription. Both the state appropriation and the private advances are to be repaid from proceeds of the state fair.

During the next two years the Oregon laws will again be codified if the legislature passes a bill reported out favorably by the committee, and appropriating \$35,000 for the purpose. This will be returned, in part at least, by sales of the new code sets. It is the plan to sell them to state departments and the courts of the state and not make gifts of them as has been done in the past. The price of a set will be \$35 or \$40. It is probable that an Oregon attorney will not be given a contract to codify the laws. This has been done in the past, but it is planned to have the code prepared by the publishing house that prints the volumes.

The committee reported out without recommendation the much contested bill to curb cattle rustling by placing a license on meat dealers and requiring strict tagging of meat and recording of transactions.

The committee recommended adoption of the Weatherpoon joint resolution for an investigation of the feasibility of state-printed textbooks, carrying an appropriation of \$500 for expenses of the probe.

It was decided to approve a \$6,000 appropriation for the payment of teachers at the children's farm home near Corvallis, which asked for \$12,150.

A favorable report was made on a bill to appropriate \$100 a month for the next two years for the relief of Mrs. Clyde R. Diddinger, whose husband was killed by the explosion of a cannon at a national guard training camp.

Unfavorable recommendations were voted on the Cottage Grove and La Grande armory bills and on a bill to increase the salary of the labor commissioner from \$3,000 to \$3,600.

On consideration moved by Representative Amos, the committee approved a joint resolution providing for an investigation in the next two years into the possibility of receiving compensation from the government in lieu of taxes on government owned land.

The state board of control's request that the appropriation previously approved for conversion of the old state training school into an intermediate penal institution be changed to provide for an administration building and cell house at the penitentiary was approved. This amount is \$35,000 and the previous action was nullified by a recent fire that destroyed the old school.

for the Oregon national guard, \$230,933; for the state printing board, \$171,030; for the preservation of the John McLoughlin home and other institutions, \$79,777; for sundry claims against the state, \$5,900; for support of homeless children and wayward girls, \$255,000; for county fair premiums, \$48,500.

House bill 575, providing for liquidation of land settlement commission.

House bill 576, amending sections providing for restoration fund for replacement of state property damaged or destroyed by fire.

House bill 577, appropriating a total of \$3,108,740 for the state penitentiary, state industrial schools, deaf school, blind school, state hospitals for insane, soldiers' home, feeble minded, (tuberculosis) hospitals.

Salary Bill Deferred
SALEM, Ore., Feb. 26.—Failure of lower house attempts to secure a classification of state and a uniform salary schedule for the various classes is discouraging house members from further efforts along this line. Members of the resolutions committee decided Tuesday morning to hold H. J. R. 21, by MacPherson, until there is some promise of kinder treatment by the senate than other classification efforts have received.

H. J. R. 21 provides for a committee to be appointed "to prepare a report and draft a bill to establish a classification of counties as a basis of fixing county officers' salaries." The committee is to serve without remuneration. A report is to be made and a bill drafted for the 1931 legislature.

Efforts for classification legislation this session were centered on H. J. R. 522 prepared by a special classification committee appointed by the speaker. The bill provided for classification on the basis of equalized assessed valuation.

The bill had easy passage through the house but was killed with little delay by the senate committee.

Lodge Insurance Bill
With an impassioned denunciation of "vice super thieves" who have robbed and murdered 20,000 old people between the ages of 67 and 75 of their old age security, Robinson of Clatsop county Tuesday morning urged members of the lower house to vote "yes" on his fraternal insurance bill. The bill carried with only seven opposing votes.

Robinson's bill, H. R. 445, requires a two-thirds favorable vote of the certificate of policy holders of a fraternal insurance company before such a company may raise its rates more than ten per cent in any one year.

Mrs. Lee's bill requiring all boards and commissions of the state to deposit their funds with the state treasurer instead of maintaining their separate bank accounts, was also passed by the lower house.

Dry Cleaners Hit
Henderson's dry cleaning bill once killed and then resurrected, finally passed the lower house Tuesday morning by a narrow margin. This bill, H. R. 355, provides that dry cleaning establishments, regardless of location, must meet the safety requirements formerly required of such establishments located within municipal limits.

It is aimed principally at dry cleaning firms who have their workrooms immediately outside a city limits thus escaping restrictions, but nevertheless present a fire hazard to a city.

Anti-Card Bill
A bill to eliminate card playing in billiard rooms was introduced to the house Tuesday by Maloney of Multnomah county. According to the bill the use of playing cards, card tables, dice or any gambling devices would be prohibited in places where billiards are played for a profit.

Party Pledge Deleted
Senate bill 216, the party platform bill sponsored by the state republican central committee, was taken from the table today with its favorable minority report and unfavorable majority report and referred back to the committee on elections and privileges. It is to be amended by striking out the section that would require primary candidates to state on the ballot that they do or not subscribe to the party platform.

The senate killed the following bills by indefinite postponement: H. R. 406, by Carlin, Iringa and Chinook. Authorizing joint tenancy in personal property in husband and wife with right of survivorship.

H. R. 444, by Robinson—Providing that certain criminal cases may be tried by Judge instead of jury.

H. J. R. 10, by Anderson, Carlin and Hamilton—For an interim investigation of public schools.

H. R. 331, by Johnson of Benton, Norton and Johnson of Union and Wallawa—Authorizing secretary of state to supply each member of legislature with copy of Oregon laws and supplements.

A majority of the roads and highways committee reported adversely on the Swift bill aimed at the practice of carrying dogs on the running boards of automobiles and a minority reported favorably. The bill and the reports were tabled.

Senate bill 212 by Senator Dunne and Representative Howard, which would relieve motor vehicle owners from responsibility for injuries to passengers in their cars, got a favorable majority report from the roads and highways committee and an adverse minority report. They were tabled.

Safeguard Tax Bill
SALEM, Ore., Feb. 26.—The "ace in the hole" which members of the property tax relief commission and the champions of its program in the legislature have kept carefully concealed now makes its public appearance in house bill 581, introduced by the house committee on taxation and revenue, a measure authorizing the state tax commission to levy a direct tax upon property in an amount not to exceed one mill for the next two years for the purpose of meeting the deficit and current running expenses of the state.

Representative Carlin, chairman of the property tax relief commission, explains that the bill is intended to guarantee that sufficient revenues shall be available to the state to carry it "out of the red" during the next two years. Levy of the tax would be optional with the tax commission, he points out, and it would be brought into play only in the event the legislature are referred, or they fail to raise sufficient money to meet all of the state's obligations.

If the excise tax and the tax on intangibles should stand, but not the direct tax, sufficient revenue to meet the deficit, then the tax commission would levy a property tax in an amount sufficient to make up the balance required.

The excise tax has already passed the house and senate and is in the hands of the governor. It is estimated to produce about \$750,000 annually. The tax on intangibles, expected to bring in another \$500,000 a year, has been approved by the house and senate.

Death of P. S. C. Looms
That the temper of the senate is favorable to passage of Senator J. O. Bailey's bill to abolish the state public service commission and establish in its place a department of public works was indicated Tuesday when the committee on county and state offices reported favorably on the bill. Minor amendments were made in committee, one of them providing that the director of the department and not the supervisors of the various divisions shall appoint engineers employed. The measure will be on the calendar for third reading Wednesday.

Also on Wednesday's calendar will be the Bell-Henderson party platform bill.

House bill 104, by Weatherpoon, providing for an increase in the salary of the secretary of the state board of horticulture, came out of the committee on horticulture without recommendation.

Three Bills Killed
The following bills were killed by indefinite postponement on adoption of adverse committee reports and without debate:

Senate bill 225, by Upton—providing that lands insolvent in irrigation districts shall be assessed according to value prior to district improvements, with approval of reclamation commission.

House bill 225, by Russell and Carlin—restricting issuance of tax certificates of delinquency to private persons.

Senate bill 165, by Dunne—designating and declaring certain streets and roads to be state highways.

Senate bill 543, introduced by the committee on forestry and forest products, providing for the creation of forest fire hazard areas, came out of the committee without recommendation. It has been bitterly contested because of restrictions placed upon vacationists and residents in forest areas.

The senate adopted the Bennett-Corbett-Upton concurrent resolution providing for an interim committee of thirteen members to study the cost and feasibility of water transportation of grain and livestock on the Columbia river and report back to the 1931 session.
