B League Teams to Meet
at Junior High
School

FINALS AT NIGHT

Girls' Preliminaries Will Be
Played in the Morning
and Boys' Elimina-
tions in Afternoon.

Roseburg basketball fans will be able to watch some very interesting contests this week. Friday night the Senior high school team played Myrtle Point in the final contest of the Coos district conference. Myrtle Point, Roseburg and Marshfield hold the three top places in the district, and a victory over Myrtle Point will group the three teams very closely in percentage. Myrtle Point beat Roseburg in the first game of the conference season, by a very close score, and the local players hope to retaliate Friday night. The game should be very interesting and the boys are hoping for loyal support on the part of the local fans. The attendance at the games this year has not been as good as has been hoped for, and has not been in keeping with the brand of basketball that has been offered.

The game Friday night will be preceded by a preliminary between the team of troop 6, Roseburg Boy Scouts and a team of Myrtle Point scouts, giving the spectators two mighty interesting games—a win-win for the season.

Saturday the county B league basketball championship will be decided in a tournament to be played at the Junior high school gym. Eight teams are entered—four teams of girls and four of boys. Girls' teams represent Drain, Glendale, Oakland and Smith River, while the boys' teams come from Drain, Glendale, Riddle and Smith River.

The girls' preliminaries will be held Saturday morning, the first game starting at 10:30 o'clock. The boys will play in the afternoon with the first game at 2 o'clock. The finals will be played in the evening, starting at 7:30 o'clock.

The B league is made up of the teams outside of Roseburg the high schools in the northern and southern districts being selected to play for the championship. The league has worked out in a very successful manner and has attracted a great deal of interest throughout the county, and has been a very important factor in stimulating basketball interest. Some mighty fine teams have been developed by the smaller schools, and the games Saturday should provide plenty of entertainment for Roseburg fans. It is hoped that there will be good support given the tournament, as the contests will be well worth while from the spectators' standpoint.

LINDY'S SKILL AND GALLANTRY GLORIFY CRASH

When a mechanic greasing it had failed to refasten the cotter key which held it to the axle. When he was flying back to Valhalla field Colonel Lindbergh's thoughts were on his predicament, and how best to emerge from it. Finally he reached over to Miss Morrow seated at his side, and told her, above the roar of the motor, they probably would turn over when they landed.

He showed her how to take the cushions from the plane's seats and pack them around her body, with others about her head so that the shock of the crash would be lessened. Then, to guard against evulsion of the gasoline when the plane turned over he maneuvered back and forth over the field until all but the wings in the tank were exhausted.

Ground Force Warned
He waved to army mechanics and officers below, pointing to his damaged landing gear, and then shot out of space onto the level, lighting directly on one wheel, and the tail skid. It seemed for a moment the plane would come to rest without mishap, but the loose end of the axle struck the ground and it careened forward, turning over, first on its nose and then on its back.

Field attendants helped the aviator and Miss Morrow, seriously but not fatally injured, through its side to the ground. His first words upon turning to her were, "Are you all right?"

She noticed he grasped his right shoulder, as if in pain, but when he protested he was not hurt she allowed him to escort her off the field in an ambulance car which took them to Mexico City. There at the Morrow home he remarked after a while the pain in his shoulder was growing more intense, and Mrs. Morrow insisted upon calling a physician.

Shoulder Dislocated
Dr. Sydney Unfeller discovered the shoulder was dislocated. An effort was made to administer an anesthetic at the Morrow home but when this failed the aviator was taken to the Lady Cowdray hospital for the operation.

Within two hours he emerged, his right arm and shoulder band-

aged heavily and shrouded in a gray overcoat, and insisted on driving an automobile with Miss Morrow and her sister Elizabeth to Valhalla field to inspect his plane and the damage done to it. He used his left hand in driving.

What was learned of the accident did not come from Colonel Lindbergh or his fiancée; to reporters, friends, army officers alike, after the crash, he made only his sphinxlike remark, "I have nothing to say," when they asked him where he had been, and where he had lost the wheel to his plane. He did broaden his remarks a little as he left the field to go to the embassy. "This is not an accident, it's just a mishap."

Anne Doesn't Weaken
He is understood to have told friends also that Anne bore up bravely throughout their ordeal and did not hamper him in any way in his maneuvering to bring the plane down. Throughout he would not indicate where the two went for their picnic.

The plane which crashed was the four-passenger Travelair monoplane City of Wichita, borrowed last week by the aviator for his flight here to visit his fiancée. At the field it was believed repairs could be made without too great difficulty, although these are likely to take several days.

It was not known what effect the crash would have upon the plans of Colonel Lindbergh and Miss Morrow. Friends, however, seemed to think he would await repairing of his plane here, or possibly borrow another plane for the flight back to the United States. There has as yet been no announcement as to the date or place of their marriage and these plans remain as much a mystery as ever.

Donovan Anti-Dry
As the story of the long negotiations between the president-elect and Donovan is being told, Mr. Hoover had considered the assistant to the attorney-general first for attorney-general, but had found so much opposition from the dry forces in the south and other sections that he regarded it as necessary to look elsewhere.

It was represented that Donovan was not in sympathy with the dry law, and that no matter how persistently he might drive forward to enforce the prohibition statute there would be constant criticism from the dry forces.
