

SERIES FOR COAST BASKETBALL TITLE TO OPEN TONIGHT

SEATTLE, Mar. 1.—An undefeated University of Washington basketball team was ready to meet the northern invasion of the University of California team...

Before what is expected to be Seattle's largest basketball crowd, more than 9,000 persons, the Huskies and the Bruins will clash in the first game of a three-game series for the title of the Pacific coast.

The California team arrived here last night from Berkeley with all the squad in good shape with the exception of Captain Corbin, who was suffering from an injured nose received last week.

Despite this handicap, Coach Nils Price said he would start Corbin at forward. Corbin, whose regular spot is in center, has been shifted in order to let Ten Eyck, tallest man on the Bear squad, jump against "Stork" McClary, the giant center of the Huskies.

While Washington rested in preparation for the fast game expected tonight, the southern champions took a light workout this morning to loosen up after their train trip. Washington, with its impressive record of no defeats and high scores against its opponents, was given a slight edge by sports authorities over California in the series.

The lineup as announced last night are: Washington Post, California Corbin; Joffe, Stevens; McClary, C. Ten Eyck; Dolstad, G. Gregory; Deranson, O. Coffield.

which is abolished by the act. During the coming two years the board is directed to conduct a survey of all of the institutions under its direction with a view to consolidating their functions, eliminating duplications in work and reorganizing the higher educational system of the state.

The funds for each of the institutions as budgeted and appropriated by the legislature for the coming biennium will not be disturbed, but at the end of two years the state funds accruing to all of the schools will be pooled and placed under the control of the board of education for disbursement as they shall direct.

ZANE GREY WILL DEVELOP MINING CLAIM WINKLE BAR

Ben B. Irving, U. S. Mineral surveyor, returned yesterday from Winkle Bar in the Rogue River, where he surveyed the claim filed by Zane Grey, noted author, whose lodge is located on the bar. The property has been worked by several mining concerns, but none of them had sufficient capital to carry the work through to conclusion.

Mr. Grey has already ordered construction of a domestic water system and has taken steps for immediate improvements and development of the claim, upon which he will file patent as soon as the work is finished. He also ordered the construction of 29 cabins in connection with his lodge, so that he may have suitable accommodations for entertaining the many friends who usually accompany him on his annual visitations to the recreation spot.

The property is reached from West Fork and all materials and supplies must be taken in by pack train from that point.

ONCE DECLARED DONE FOR MERMAID WINS 2 TITLES

CHICAGO, Mar. 1.—Physicians and swimming instructors once said she couldn't do it, but Jane Fauntz, 19-year-old Chicago mermaid, did it just the same. Gaining speed and grace with every year, Miss Fauntz, who once was injured so severely in an automobile accident that she was told she could never swim again, last night won two national amateur women's swimming titles at the national meet at the Lake Shore Athletic club.

She outclassed a fancy field to win the national women's low board diving title and after a few minutes' rest, she came back to capture the 100-yard breast stroke championship. It was not only her greatest aquatic triumph, but the first time in the history of the women's national championship meet that a diving champion has won the breast stroke event.
