

LOCKWOOD FAILS IN FINAL TRY ON STEELHEAD BILL

SALEM, Ore., Mar. 1.—A fish measure was introduced in the lower house Thursday afternoon when the sportsmen suddenly made an attempt to rush their steelhead legislation. After an hour's battle on parliamentary procedure with the sportsmen trying every available means to push their bill through and with the commercial fishing proponents opposing them on every move, the matter finally closed where it started—with the bill tabbed. During the fracas the bill had been amended until it reached the stage of the ridiculous.

The bill in question, Lockwood's bill, H. B. 448, closing the steelhead season from December 1 to April 15, had been lying in the game committee since early February. Meanwhile the other steelhead bill, H. B. 475, was twice defeated in the house. Wednesday evening shortly before adjournment when members were weary and unattentive, Lockwood of Columbia county, made a motion to have H. B. 448 taken from the game committee and referred to the fisheries committee. The motion prevailed.

And so the matter remained until Thursday afternoon when the sportsmen's proponents grasped the opportunity of having Fisher, occupying the chair in the absence of Speaker Hamilton, Briggs made the motion to have the bill taken from the fisheries committee and the matter was on with motions and amendments and previous questions coming in rapid fire order until Fisher was completely confused.

Winslow, of Tillamook, suggested an amendment to have the closed season begin January 1 instead of December 5. Lockwood agreed and made such motion. Scope of Lincoln and Polk made an additional amendment to have the closed season end March 1 instead of April 15. Both amendments were made.

Then Winslow told members that in effect as amended the bill was designed to take away a month of steelhead fishing was actually taking away nothing and giving them two additional months. "Such legislation is ridiculous," said Winslow, who closed his talk with a plea for the Childs' resolution providing for a commission to make an interim study of fish legislation.

New Editor Experienced.
Harris Ellsworth, the new editor of the Roseburg News-Review, has had a great deal of experience in newspaper fields.

Following his graduation from the school of journalism at the University of Oregon in 1922, he was employed for nearly two years with the Register Publishing company in the advertising department. He then was named business manager of the 4-L Lumber News, a trade paper published by the lumber interests of the Pacific Northwest, continuing in that capacity until a year ago, when he resigned to accept a position as field manager for the Oregon State Editorial association.

This was a new office created by the association, so that it was necessary for him to establish the

policies of the office and build up methods of procedure and operation. Under his directions the office of field manager became of great benefit to the newspaper making up the association, helping them in problems relating to business management and advertising and also acting as a clearing house for information, in addition to many other lines of related activity. With such a background of experience, Mr. Ellsworth comes to the News-Review fully qualified to direct business affairs and editorial policies.

Former Editors Retire
B. W. and Bert G. Bates, who are retiring from the control of the News-Review, have long been connected with the newspaper and printing business in Roseburg. B. W. Bates has been in business in Roseburg for thirty years, first in the mechanical department of the Roseburg Review, and later as editor and publisher of The Plaindealer and later The Evening News.

After selling The Evening News to Carl D. Shoemaker, Mr. Bates, for a period of four years, engaged in the job printing business in Roseburg, during which time his son, Bert G. Bates, became associated with him. Mr. Bates then took over The Evening News again and continued its publication until the consolidation with The Roseburg Review in 1929. Since the merger Mr. Bates and his son have directed the activities of the News-Review company as it expanded to its present size and importance.

Mr. Bates has not made definite plans for the future. It is his intention to spend several months traveling, and he will be in the nature of visits to various sections of the coast, during which time he will probably select the site for engaging in future business.

Bert G. Bates has accepted a position with the Fawcett publications and is leaving about March 15 for Robbinsdale, Minnesota, to become the editor of two of the magazines published by that concern, and will probably later go to Hollywood, to aid in the publication of a screen magazine which the company is arranging to publish.

The new owners, in taking over control of the News-Review, announce that they contemplate no immediate changes either in personnel or policies. Such changes as may be made in the future will be put in effect only after a careful study of conditions and with a view of giving the most efficient service to the patrons of the News-Review and the community served.

The intangibles tax and the excise tax bills have now passed both houses and are before the governor.

The newest measure of the big four, the one authorizing the state tax commission to levy up to one additional mill on all the tangible property of the state, necessary to remove the state deficit, was up for third reading, but, on motion of Senator Bennett, it was deferred to the committee on assessment and taxation. It had not been before the senate committee.

Auto Liability Less
The senate adopted a majority report of the roads and highways committee on senate bill 212, relieving motor vehicle owners from responsibility for injuries to passengers in their vehicles, then passed the bill on third reading and passed it. It was amended so that drunkenness is one of the exceptions.

Relations Admitted
There is no attempt at pretense from "Lulu" as to her relationship with McGurn. They are not married, she said.
