YOU'RE AS OLD AS YOU WALK; SPINE REQUIRES EXERCISE

A woman is as old as her spine. Observe a woman as she walks. How do you know whether she is young or old?

If she has a light, springy step, if her back is straight and her figure slim and buoyant, you know she has youth. The dead, settled walk belongs to the aging.

The lift of the youthful walk comes from the back. The heavy, settled look that bespeaks the years in the result of a collapse in the vertebrae of the spine.

In modern life, the poor back never gets any exercise. The whole tendency is for the spine to settle down upon itself, by its own weight. One vertebrae is pushed hard against another, leaving no space for elasticity.

This settling of the spine squeezes the nerves, thus stiffening the back and inducing that dreaded "middle aged spread"—because the whole body settles on to the hips.

How can the back be exercised? How can the settled vertebrae be pulled into place again so that the erect back pulls all the slumped body into its youthful, alert shape once more? The following exercise, practised before going to bed and upon arising, will show you how.

Exercise

Remove all binding clothing and slip into some loose, short garment.

Rest your weight on your right foot and slowly stretch your right arm up as high as you think you can. Then make an effort to stretch it still higher. As you stretch, hold your left hand be-



Let body fall loosely from the waist and twist it from side to side with head and arms dangling.

tween your right hip bone and your ribs, where it can feel the stretch. As you lift your arm, feel with your left hand the way your ribs are lifted and your spine is stretched.

After stretching as high as you can, lower your arm gradually, keeping the body stretched. Your hand will tell if you cheat and let the body sink. That space between your hips and your ribs that you

get now only when your arm is stretched high is the distance there should always be between them if your spine is to be as erect as nature meant it.

Practice this exercise morning and night, first on one foot, and then on the other until you know the feel of an extended body. These exercises should be practiced without strain or hurry and never to the point of fatigue.

ASSASSIN GOES CRAZY AND ADDS TO HIS VICTIMS

SKOPLJE, Yugoslavia, Mar. 2.—Zia Vuciturna, who shot and killed Alchibados Bebe, the assassin of Zena Bey, Albanian minister at Prague last November, today became violently insane while on the Belgrade-Skopje express and killed Inspector Savitchitch of the Yugoslav ministry of the interior and two Serbian soldiers.

He fired indiscriminately at those on the train, he also wounded several other passengers. Eventually he was overpowered and put in chains.
