

POLICE USE TEAR BOMBS TO SUBDUE RIOTOUS STUDENTS

ANN ARBOR, Mich., Mar. 5.—Four thousand students celebrated Michigan's basketball victory over Wisconsin last night, 37 to 22, by attempting to storm their way into the Michigan theatre.

Police tear bombs repelled three attacks, but it was the appearance at the theatre of Dr. Clarence Cook Little, university president, that finally dispersed the crowd. Six students were arrested but only one was being held by police today.

The students, singing and dancing through the streets in a riotous frenzy because the team had just assumed Michigan a tie for the big ten championship, rushed the doors of the theatre, demanding free admittance.

The theatre manager called upon stage hands and ushers to repel the rush which followed his refusal of the student demand, and then called police who brought tear bombs. Three times the blinding, choking gas pellets routed the mob, which gradually decreased in numbers to about 500.

Six ornamental doors and a large window were broken and a giant electric sign was damaged when its supporting cables were cut. Bottles, eggs, stones and vegetables were thrown by the students.

Dr. Little, summoned from a formal dinner at his home, spoke briefly but energetically to the crowd and within a few minutes the attack was ended.

The Michigan theatre was giving a free show for students in Hill auditorium, university hall, when the crowd stormed the theatre.

can't you?" Councilman Kilder asked.

"Yes, I can put the motion alight," Mayor Hoover responded, "but it won't do any good."

The motion was put before the council and resulted in a unanimous vote for the issuance of the warrant.

The councilmen contend that the charter gives the council the exclusive authority to pass upon matters relating to expenditures, and that any warrant issued upon the authority of the council is valid, even though it does not bear the mayor's signature. It is understood that local banks have agreed to accept the warrants, even without the mayor's name attached, provided the warrants are authorized by the council.

Mayor Hoover announced that he had signed the warrant for Chief of Police Vaughn, despite the fact that this appointment is also in contest. This action, the mayor said, was taken because of the fact that the chief of police had had sickness in the family and had urgent need for the money. The mayor also stated that he would not continue the contest over the chief of police at the present time.

Councilman Shoemaker asked Mayor Hoover if a similar condition had not existed several years ago, when the mayor had refused to sign salary warrants for another city officer and that the warrants had been issued by the council. Mayor Hoover stated that he did not know of any such occurrence, and that the only time when such action had been taken was a

number of years ago when the council paid a bill for light and water over the mayor's objection, but that the action was later rescinded upon court order.

Create Stop Street

The council took action last night to make Oak and Military streets and Corey and Harvard avenues stop streets from Jackson street to the city limits, and signs are to be ordered at once and placed at all intersections. A petition asking that this be done was received two weeks ago and referred to the street committee for a report. The recommendation of the committee was received last night, approving the petition and proposing that the new regulation be put into effect as soon as possible because of the heavy traffic that the street carries.

The petition also asked that the splash wall be lowered at the east end of the Oak street bridge to give better visibility, but it was pointed out that this is a matter that should come before the county court.

W. F. Thomas reported to the council that Series A Improvement bonds are due April 1. There is more than enough money in the sinking fund to pay the bonds, he stated, but the money is invested in securities. He asked authority to use cash from the general fund to pay the bonds, transferring the securities to the general account. The matter was referred to the committee on expense and accounts.

Constable Shoemaker reported that he had received complaints of an open private sewer in North Roseburg. The health and police committee was instructed to make an investigation.

Gas Station Discussed

The committee on health and police was also ordered to investigate the matter of permitting a service station to be constructed at the intersection of Cass and Jackson streets.

James Hutchings has leased his property on the corner to the Texaco oil company and proposes to build a modern and attractive super-service station. There has been some protest from business men in the vicinity, and a petition was presented last night, signed by about 70 names, asking the council to refuse a permit. The council also heard, on third reading, an ordinance that would regulate the size of ramps or driveways, which would greatly handicap a service station at the site proposed.

Attorney R. L. Whipple, appearing for Mr. Hutchings, stated that the council should give careful consideration to the ordinance before passing it. If the ordinance is adopted, he stated, it may work a serious handicap upon some future development, so that thorough investigation should be made before action is taken.

Mr. Whipple also stated that even should the measure be passed he seriously doubted whether or not it would stand in court, as a man is entitled to free ingress and egress to and from his property.

The present ordinance, Mr. Whipple informed the council, provides suitable regulation, requiring that the work be done under the supervision of the city engineer, and that a bond be posted to insure the work being done in accordance with the city's regulations.

After discussing the proposition briefly, the council decided to make a further investigation, and ordered that the petition and ordinance be held over until next meeting, and that the health and police committee will make an investigation in the meantime.

A petition asking for the improvement of Morton street in Haskell addition, by grading and graveling, was referred to the committee on health and police.

The aviation bond ordinance was placed on third reading and was passed by a unanimous vote. Mayor Hoover stated that he would not sign the ordinance until after he had looked into a legal matter in connection with it.

MEXICO TORN BY WAR OVER GIL'S REGIME

vals since the general embargo of shipments of this character was established in 1924. While no other comment in connection with the Mexican revolution situation was available at the White House, it was said that President Hoover at this time sees no reason to change the policy as to arms exportations followed by his predecessor, Calvin Coolidge.

Licenses for arms shipments are granted by the secretary of state. While state and war department officials were in conference today with regard to the situation in Mexico, there was no intimation that a request had come from the government in Mexico City that it be permitted to purchase war supplies in the United States.

Rebels to Lose All

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 5.—The Mexican government announced today that steps will be taken to confiscate all the property of the rebel leaders.

This announcement made clear the decision of the government to enforce a previously existing order that the property of persons rebelling against the government will be taken over.

Diego Rivera, noted Mexican artist and radical leader, today announced the opposition of the national workers and farm bloc of which he is head, to the new revolution because "the movement is frankly reactionary." He said that consequently his group would combat it.

Felipe's Claim Victory

NOGALES, Ariz., March 5.—General Francisco Borquez, revolutionary commander in northern Sonora, early today received reports of the capture of Monterey, capital and important munition center in the state of Nuevo Leon. Word of the victory was sent by General Gonzalo Escobar, commander-in-chief of the revolting forces.

A general engagement about the capital resulted in defeat of the federal forces and capture of many men as well as large stores of ammunition, and placed the city definitely in the hands of the revolting forces, the communication from General Escobar said. Prisoners taken were reported to include three generals, not identified by the communication, 23 officers of high command, 45 lesser officers and 599 privates.

Dispatches said casualties appeared to be high, but that no definite check of dead and wounded had been made.

Escobar's report said that the prisoners would be treated as prisoners of war, and would not be shot summarily. The general spoke highly of the discipline of the men fighting under him.

Munitions reported to have fallen into the hands of the revolutionists as a result of the Monterey victory included 1,000 rifles and 12 machine guns.

Capital Menaced

The capture of Monterey puts revolutionists another step forward in their circling of Mexico City. If the fall of the state capital is followed by capitulation of the state of Nuevo Leon in general to the revolutionary forces, only Baja California, Chihuahua and Tamaulipas of the northern border states will remain unshaken.

Another dispatch received by General Borquez told of the routing of federal forces under General Jaime Carrillo near Mazatlan in the state of Sinaloa. General Carrillo and his 600 men were overtaken by revolting forces at an unnamed point south of Mazatlan, scattered and put in flight.

City's Loss Denied

BROWNSVILLE, Tex., March 5.—General Gabriel R. Cervera, commanding officer in charge of Federal troops at Matamoros, Mexico, across the Rio Grande from Brownsville, today denied reports that Monterey had been taken by rebels.

Two trade loads of soldiers were sent from Matamoros toward Monterey last night to join federal forces in defending the city. General Cervera said a battle for Monterey began Monday and was continuing today.

Direct communication with Monterey has been broken, but a wire still is open to Victoria, capital of the state of Tamaulipas.

Federal Troops Active

MEXICO CITY, March 5.—Federal troops moved to two far flung fronts today to give battle to rebel armies which threatened the existing Mexican government.

Commanding the army of the north, whose objective is recapture of Sonora, a thousand miles to the northwest, was General Plutarco Elias Calles, secretary of war, and commander in chief of the state.

The army of the south was placed in charge of General Antonio Alvarado. It is his task to dissolve the forces of General Jesus Maria Aguirre whose troops have captured the state of Vera Cruz and are now threatening an advance on Mexico City.

General Calles, as secretary of

war, is commander-in-chief of both armies, but will take the field himself with forces sent to Sonora for the northern campaign leaving actual charge of southern operations to Alvarado.

Revolt Widespread

Meanwhile in official government statements there were indications the rebel movement is more widespread than the administration has heretofore admitted. The state of Coahuila was definitely involved in the revolution with defection of its military chief, General Jose Gonzalo Escobar, noted in a statement of president Porfirio Gil Oaxacan and Isthmian disturbances were noted in an official resume of military operations early today which said small bodies of troops were being sent to suppress the movement in Oaxaca.

Mexico City is quiet. The heavy troop movements through the city's streets draw crowds of on-lookers, but there have been no disturbances. These movements were being principally of cavalry, infantry and mountain artillery with the majority of forces dispatched going in the direction of Vera Cruz, east of the city.

Governmental Issues Plea

The official resume of military activity yesterday issued early today said that aeroplanes had flown over Vera Cruz and dropped pamphlets appealing to officers and men of the rebel army of General Jesus Maria Aguirre to return to their old allegiance.

At Yaltuena field the army air force prepared planes for use against the rebels; the camp was a hive of activity.

The official resume remained clamped tight on outgoing news dispatches which were subjected to considerable delay before being released, and then usually in considerably abbreviated form.

Rebel Successes

NAYAGUA, Sonora, Mexico, Mar. 5.—General Ochoa, commanding several hundred troops, today peacefully occupied Las Mochis and San Blas, in the state of Sinaloa, for the revolution. Federal forces under General Alvarez were retreating southward, but a line of bridges and destroying communication lines south of San Blas, it was reported at revolutionary headquarters here.

Two thousand revolutionary troops under the command of General Turbe were repairing railroad tracks torn up north of San Blas yesterday by the fleeing federal general and his detachment, Colonel Ricardo Topete, commander of the revolutionary forces in southern Sonora, said. Colonel Topete declared that preparations were under way to launch a drive toward Mexico City.

Monterey Falls

MONTEREY, Nuevo Leon, Mexico, Mar. 5.—General J. G. Escobar, commander-in-chief of the revolutionary movement in northern Mexico, issued the following statement to the Associated Press this morning:

"I am pleased to inform you that after ten hours of combat this city was taken by our troops who fought valiantly as never before. We took from the enemy 570 enlisted men, three generals and 75 officers. The enemy suffered considerably losses in killed. General Larraga, commanding officer, was killed. We captured horses, saddles,

with his audience, so a brother performer told him to sing it in better English.

Claude Neon has patent suits against several companies alleged to be infringers have not been dismissed as has been reported. It is pointed out in Roseburg by J. S. McDonald Electric Shop, local service representative for Electric Products Corp. of Oregon, corporate member of the 12 Pacific coast states of Claude Neon Lights, Inc., and sole Oregon manufacturer of genuine Claude Neon signs. Attention is directed to a full page correction made by the publishers of "Signs of the Times" magazine, national outdoor advertising journal, in the February issue, as well as an editorial retraction on page 115, which says:

"In the January, 1929, issue of Signs of the Times, page 134... we stated that the Claude Neon (patent) suits referred to had been dismissed. This was an error. The true facts are as follows:

The case entitled Claude Neon Electrical Products, Inc. vs. Aurora Products, Inc. is pending in the district court of the United States, southern district of California.

Claude Neon Lights, Inc. vs. Air Reduction Co., Inc. is pending in New York; a motion for preliminary injunction has been made and is held under advisement by the court.

Claude Neon Lights, Inc. and Claude Neon Federal Co. vs. The Q. R. S. Company, et al., is pending in Illinois. An order for preliminary injunction has been entered therein enjoining the defendants, and each of them, from the manufacture, sale or use of any Neon tubes and or signs, displays or advertisements containing Neon tubes as found in plaintiffs' exhibit 1.

Claude Neon Federal Co. vs. David Hilgenberg (doing business as the Chicago Neon Sign Co.) a consent decree for an injunction and an accounting has been entered, damages awarded and paid and an injunction issued.

Claude Neon Lights, Inc., and Claude Neon Federal Co. vs. LaFrance Corp. and Thomas F. Kelly, a decree pro confesso was entered. This case is pending in Illinois.

The case entitled Electrical Products Corp. vs. Brilliant Tube Sign Co. et al was dismissed without prejudice, but immediately another case against the same defendant and similarly entitled was filed.
