## Jardine's New Position Will Give Him Opportunity to Elaborate on His Cooperative Marketing Ideas

WASHINGTON, Mar. 5.—As counsel for the Federated Fruit and Vegetable Growers, which he became on his voluntary retirement as secretary of agricultural Monday, Wm. M. Jardine is stepping into a position to develop cooperative marketing to the extent of its manifold ramifications.

In the four years of his administration Jardine has placed above everything else the department's efforts to encourage and aid order marketing of farm produce. He consistently maintained that the practice, once definitely established, would be one of the cardinal principles of farm relief.

The Federated Fruit Growers is a cooperative sales agency operating in virtually every important market in the United States. It was created and is supported by cooperatives handling such highly seasonal fruits as peaches in Georgia and watermelons in Florida—fruits for which the market period is extremely short and always crowded. Big fruit and vegetable cooperatives, which have an all year market, are not members.

The working scheme of the federation is simple and effective. It places representatives in the various sectional markets to handle the produce shipped from cooperatives in the territory. Thus through a single agency as many as 30 or 40 cooperatives, all in the same

## NEBRASKA COMPANY WINS SUIT TO KEEP AGENTS IN OREGON

(Associated Press Local Wire) SALEM, Ore., Mar. 5.—A suit brought by the Mutual Benefit Health & Accident association of Omaha, Nebraska, to enjoin the state insurance commissioner of Oregon from cancelling their license of their agents and denying them the right to do business in Oregon has been decided in favor of the plaintiff in an opinion announced by the supreme court today, affirming Judge L. H. McMahon. The opinion of the court is written by Justice McElride. The record in the case shows that the plaintiff has eighty four agents writing policies in Oregon. The volume of its business in Oregon is indicated by the fact that its last annual tax in this state amounted to \$16,451.27 which tax was 24 per cent of its last premiums written in 1927. Justice McElride in the opinion says, "There is but one question to be decided in this case and that is, whether a mutual insurance company, organized legally in Nebraska, may, upon compliance with the procedural matters required by the Oregon insurance laws, carry on the business of health and accident insurance in this state. There is no question that every matter relating to procedure has been complied with; so, the only question to be decided is whether a mutual insurance company of this character, without capital stock, can be licensed to carry on its business in the state of Oregon. We are of the opinion that it can be so licensed."

In his new job Jardine will have headquarters in Washington, where he will have at his command every facility for developing the cooperative marketing theories he has espoused as secretary of agriculture. Announcing his retirement, Jardine said he would offer whatever assistance his knowledge of the subject might be to President Hoover and the new agricultural secretary should it be their policy to continue cooperative marketing promotion.

Jardine said in announcing his resignation that he owed it to his family and to himself to return to private life. His new job is described as "offering an ambitious salary."

His friends say Jardine is a triumph of personality. Although he has a string of titles and degrees, he is a plain, unassuming man. Who he is humble in the vast store of his technical and practical knowledge. He is recognized as a foremost authority on marketing, economy and demand factors. He is famous for his "common sense" economics and is probably the worst bridge player in Washington. He celebrated his fiftieth birthday last month.
