FREE TEXT-BOOK

BILL BEATEN IN OREGON SENATE

(Associated Press Local Wire)

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Among other measures passed were:

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H. B. 553—Requiring cities and towns to provide sinking funds for payment of interest and principal on bonds.

H. B. 592—Providing for special income tax bill.

H. B. 609—Appropriating \$10,000 for survey of higher educational institutions.

H. B. 524—Providing for the regulation of corporations owning, controlling directly or indirectly, or having an option for the purchase of a majority of the voting stock of any national banking association or any state bank or other institution under the supervision and control of the state superintendent of banks.

H. B. 554—Appropriating \$35,000 to pay expenses of new condition of Oregon laws.

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H. B. 438—Providing standard grades for potatoes.

H. B. 315—Allowing Multnomah county 30 per cent instead of 10 per cent of total amount raised in state by market road tax.

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
