Bills Signed By Patterson

(Associated Press Special Wire)

SALEM, Ore., March 5.—Governor Patterson today signed the following bills:

Senate bill 173, providing for fees in favor of corporations organized for purposes of booming logs.

Senate bill 174, relating to the regulation and control of fraternal benefit societies.

Senate bill 175, relating to filing of certified copies of records in probate proceedings and defining the duties of administrators and executors.

Senate bill 176, authorizing state traffic officers to arrest livestock thieves, and removing limit from number of traffic officers that may be appointed.

Senate bill 177, authorizing deputy sheriffs to sign applications for drivers' motor vehicle licenses.

Senate bill 178, licensing and regulating employment agents.

Senate bill 179, to license the taking of snail from Sandy river.

House bill 173, providing for service of summons outside of state on next of kin incompetents.

House bill 174, authorizing the open season and reducing the bag limit on deer.

House bill 175, prescribing a uniform and standard system of accountancy for all municipal corporations.

House bill 176, providing for conversion of life insurance corporations into mutual life companies.

House bill 177, making unlawful during the closed fishing season to have any net in a boat equipped for fishing.

House bill 178, increasing salary of secretary of state board of horticulture.

House bill 179, requiring clerk of the state board to preserve as a public record all instruments affecting real property executed by the board.

House bill 180, extending authority of state engineer to inspect construction of structures of any kind or stream.

House bill 181, specifying under what conditions executors may be excused from furnishing bond.

House bill 182, exempting chiropractors, osteopaths, naturopaths, Christian Science practitioners, undertakers, and women who have children under 15 years old from jury service.

House bill 183, relating to collection of hospital fees by employees and making them accountable.

House bill 184, prohibiting night fishing and hunting.

House bill 185, creating murderers' creek and Deer creek game refuges in Grant county.

House bill 186, creating Canyon creek game refuge in Grant county.

House bill 187, providing manner of citation for adoptions in cases where consent of parents has not been obtained.

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 6.—Egg prices took another tumble today indicating bird's intention to stick to the nest for some months to come. All grades were down one cent, standard extras at 25, standard firsts at 24, fresh medium extras at 23 and medium firsts 22. Butter values were unchanged.

The result in Mexico has begun to display some effect on the price of green vegetables, especially peas and tomatoes. Both were higher today. Mexican tomatoes, which have been providing the main supply, are being at the international line.

An excellent lot of California cantaloupes came on the market at \$1.65 to \$1.75 a crate wholesale. This was reported to be one of the finest assortments ever shipped here.

On the Matson liner, Wilhelm, due in Portland tonight, will come the first consignment of fresh Hawaiian pineapples ever shipped direct to Portland. This direct shipment is expected to lessen the price, since the roundabout haul to California, necessitating a week or more of delay, will be eliminated.

Lemons were up 25 cents, due to reported scarcity.
