

ANNUAL SPRING STYLE SHOW IS ON BIG SCALE

**Ambitious Display Will Be
Presented at Antlers
Theatre Tonight by

The style show to be staged at the Antlers theatre tonight under the auspices of the American Legion auxiliary is expected to be the most ambitious in which the local merchants have participated. Interest has been quite keen in the event, and merchants are making elaborate preparations to exhibit the spring and early summer styles now being displayed in the leading clothing establishments of the city. The American Legion auxiliary for several years has sponsored the style show, which always proves one of the most interesting events of the season. Mrs. V. J. McNeill and Mrs. George Wharton, assisted by a large committee of auxiliary members, have planned for a very unique method of handling the styles.

The stage will be arranged and furnished to represent a porch party, where Mrs. Paul Bubar will act as hostess, and the various models will be received as guests, which will give a very interesting way of modeling the garments, relieving any monotony that might otherwise exist.

The labor connected with the preparation of the stage, and the properties and furniture are being donated to the auxiliary, so that there is little expense in staging the show, giving an opportunity for greater profit. The money realized is to be used in the auxiliary's local service activities.

friends declared that though a millionaire many times over he remained the same modest person who came to this country when young, settling in Xenia, O., and moving to Indiana in 1877.

Became Party Power
A gift for organization work developed in Mr. Taggart when he organized his first business ventures and turning his attention to politics, he rose rapidly, developing his leadership and making it felt throughout the democratic party. One of the first political positions held by Mr. Taggart was chairman of the Indiana state democratic committee in 1892.

Three years later he was elected mayor of Indianapolis, held office for three successive terms and refused to campaign for the fourth term.

It was in 1909 that Mr. Taggart was elected to his first term as a member of the democratic national committee. He was re-elected in 1904 and was made chairman of the committee after the national convention in St. Louis. Twice afterward in 1908 and 1912, he was a member of the national committee after party leaders had each time refused his resignation.

Two men, former Senator John W. Kern and Samuel M. Ralston, former governor of Indiana, were said to be products of the Taggart regime. Taggart was at the zenith of his power in 1916 when he was appointed by Governor Ralston as

United States senator from Indiana to fill the unexpired term of Benjamin F. Shively, who died in office. At the conclusion of his term Mr. Taggart ran for re-election but was defeated.

Resort Made Famous
One business venture, his health resort at French Lick, famous as a resting place, playground and political camping grounds, has attracted visitors from all sections of the United States. This hotel proved a mecca for both republican and democratic leaders.

Mr. Taggart remained president of the French Lick interests until 1921, when he was succeeded by his son, Thomas H. Taggart. In his later years, Mr. Taggart spent practically all his time in French Lick, although he continued to maintain his home at Indianapolis.

Mr. Taggart married Eva D. Bryant of Garrett, Ind., in 1877.

**"LITTLE EGYPT" OF
PAST GLORY MEETS
OLD TIME FRIEND**

CHICAGO, Mar. 6.—"Little Egypt," credited with having introduced the "Oriental dance" to America, and Edgar J. Gard who says he was the first man to offer waffles for public sale in America, met last night and recalled the days of their glory.

"Little Egypt" is Fredah Mahaz, wife of a restaurant owner, a very domestic person, according to her neighbors, and a woman who regards present day dancing as highly improper. Back in 1902, during the Chicago world's fair, she did a dance to a flageolet and tom-tom accompaniment which proved one of the magnets of the midway plaisance.

Gard, who now is an engraver, said his patterned pancakes at two booths which operated not far from the "Egyptian theatre" where "Little Egypt" danced. Mrs. Mahaz, in recalling those days, said that Congressman Bloom of New York was a concessionaire on the midway, and that he composed the "Oriental" music for her dance. It is the same weird melody that has since been invariably associated with this type of terpsichorean.

Mrs. Mahaz was brought to America from Egypt especially for the exposition. As soon as her dancing began to win favor, she was featured, and later toured the country.

The meeting of these two, who played parts in the 1902 exposition, took place at a gathering called for the purpose of boosting the 1933 fair.

**COMMANDER BYRD'S
AIDE RESIGNS POST**

LONDON, Mar. 6.—An Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Wellington, New Zealand, says that Lieutenant Richard Byrd, second in command of the Byrd antarctic expedition, is resigning his position.

Wellington, New Zealand, Mar. 6.—Commander Richard E. Byrd's supply ship, the Eleanor, having arrived at Dunedin bearing traces of terrific storms south of New Zealand on her way back to the ice barrier with supplies. It was at this point that Commander Byrd ordered her to return with her cargo to New Zealand.

The base ship, the City of New York, is expected on Monday and both vessels will lay up at Dunedin for the winter.

TRAFFIC GROUP TO HOLD MEETING IN EUGENE FRIDAY

A. C. Marsters, president of the Roseburg Chamber of Commerce, W. C. Harding, secretary, accompanied by Frank Norton and Foster Bunker will go to Eugene Friday for a meeting of the executive committee of the Western Traffic association, the organization recently formed to secure lower freight rates between intermediate points on the Southern Pacific railroad.

The meeting is preparatory to the hearing to be held at Medford on the 13th with the Interstate Commerce commission, when Western Oregon shippers will present an application asking the commission to enforce the regulation prohibiting a short haul rate of more than 100 per cent in excess of the long haul tariff.

Increased the authority of the state engineer over diversion dams and is intended to facilitate the water master's work in dividing water from rivers among those entitled to its use. Under its terms he may require the construction of gates and outlets that will allow efficient control of the water involved.

House bill 488 by Chinnock amends the code, giving justices of the peace concurrent jurisdiction with the circuit courts in the trial of misdemeanors on arrests made for violations of the water code.

House bill 489 also by Chinnock, clarifies the statutes prescribing the procedure for transferring water rights or changes in point of diversion.

COOLIDGE FEELS ODD IN ROLE OF PRIVATE CITIZEN

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., Mar. 6.—In the first interview he has given since he left the White House, Calvin Coolidge today indicated that he had not been a private citizen long enough to tell how it seemed.

Surrounded by a dozen newspaper men and women in the office where he practiced law before he went into the public service, he was plying with questions about his future plans and his feelings now that he is free from the burden of governmental cares.

He intends to keep himself as far removed from the public attention as possible. He has no definite plans for the future, except for the writing of a series of magazine articles for which he is now under contract.

For the present, at least, he will remain in Northampton, although he has not decided whether he will make his permanent home here. He does not plan to re-engage in the practice of law.

He was much amused by various newspaper cartoons depicting his return to private life and laughed over one that showed him with a contented smile snugly tucked in bed under an old-fashioned patchwork comforter.

Livy Stipp Appointed
SALEM, Ore., Mar. 6.—Stipp, for several years district attorney for Clatsop county, has been appointed attorney for the state industrial accident commission under a law passed by the recent legislature. Heretofore one of the assistants of the state legal department has been assigned to this work. Under the new law, while he will be known as an assistant attorney general, the attorney for the accident commission will receive a salary paid from the commission funds and will give full time to the work.

Reed Law Amended
SALEM, Ore., Mar. 6.—The market road law as amended by the legislature does not increase the limitation imposed upon Multnomah county under that act, but leaves it at 10 per cent.

The old act required an annual state levy of one mill to be apportioned among the counties on the basis of their assessed valuation on condition that they impose

a county levy sufficient to match the state apportionment plus their share of the surplus from Multnomah county's share. The Multnomah surplus is created by a provision of the act that no county shall receive more than 10 per cent of the total one mill in the state. Multnomah is the only county to which this part of the act applies, the surplus being created by the large assessed property valuation in that county.

As amended the act does not require the counties to match the fund, and they get their share of the state levy and of the Multnomah surplus as before. An effort was made to increase the Multnomah county share to 20 per cent, but this failed in a floor contest over a divided report of the roads and highways committee.

**FORMER SENATOR
CLAPP, MINNESOTA,
DIES IN 78TH YEAR**

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—Moses Edwin Clapp, Senator from Minnesota from 1901 to 1917, died at his home here today.

Mr. Clapp was 78 years old and was a republican.

In 1901 he was elected to the senate to fill a vacancy, and was re-elected for succeeding terms until 1917. After his retirement he resumed the practice of law here.

Former Senator Clapp was a leading figure in the senate two decades ago. He was prominent in the investigation of campaign expenditures in 1912 and introduced the bill to prohibit the sending of

SPECIAL SESSION FOR FARM RELIEF MAY OPEN APR. 15

WASHINGTON, Mar. 6.—On the second full day of his administration Herbert Hoover's mind turned to the special session of congress which he has promised to call to deal with the farm relief problem and the tariff. He talked the question over with Representative Tilson of Connecticut, the republican leader of the house, and other members of congress, but reached no final decision as to the date.

Representative Tilson recommended that the call be issued either for April 10 or April 15 and the probabilities are that Mr. Hoover will select the latter date, since it falls on Monday.

Farm relief will be taken up first by the house while the ways and means committee is perfecting the tariff revision amendment to the existing law. The senate in the meantime will perfect its organization and give attention to non-budgetary matters, many of which failed with the last congress.

The chief executive had many callers during the forenoon and received two recommendations for the office of solicitor general of the United States made vacant by the elevation of William D. Mitchell to the attorney generalship.

Senator Reed of Pennsylvania proposed the name of John G. Buchanan, a Pittsburgh lawyer, while the appointment of Justice Charles Dawson of Kentucky was urged by Senator Baughman, J. M. Chilton, national committeeman, and R. W. Hunter, republican state chairman of Kentucky.

Another caller was Senator Borah of Idaho who said he congratulated the president on his inaugural address and especially that part of it dealing with general law enforcement.

POLICEMAN UNDER SURVEILLANCE IN CHICAGO MURDERS

CHICAGO, Mar. 6.—Ever since the Valentine's Day gang massacre, the state's attorney's office has closely studied the possibility that one of the slayers may have been a police officer. Today, these investigators said a policeman now is under surveillance as a suspect.

A raid yesterday on a liquor depot supplied the officer's name, they said. On a wall of the depot (a garage) was found his name, address and telephone number, with information on where he might be reached at any hour of the day.

The place raided was operated by Claude Maddox and Danny Vallo, both wanted in connection with the slayings.

John Stege, deputy police commissioner, does not hold with the state's attorney's men that a policeman was involved. He reiterated today that the sepiate slaying was accomplished by paid killers from out of town.
