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MOUNTAINEERS DUPE WISE MEN WITH "RELICS"

"Rare" Antiques Produced
in Secluded Kentucky
Workshop With Aid
of Ford Motor.

Use of U. S. Mails to Sell
Articles of Limestone
Bring About Clash
With Courts.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Mar. 8.—Kentucky mountaineers in a measure, always have interested scientists. Their pure Anglo Saxon blood, their ideals and ideas really make them an interesting people. But an idea evolved in recent years which resulted in many celebrated northern and eastern museums displaying "rare" Indian relics purchased at good prices now engages the profound study of the scientist who soon will be called upon to testify in a federal court in Louisville as to their authenticity and whether or not famous museums have been duped by just a plain Kentucky mountaineer's idea. Federal investigators say they have and here's the story of what they found:

Cumberland City is tucked away in the Cumberland mountains of Kentucky. Near it live Mark Hanna Gaffey, W. M. "Wade" Bell and R. V. "Velt" Jones.

Cumberland City came to the attention of Indian relic collectors, antique hunters and scientists upon discovery that the surrounding country abounded in a vast wealth of prehistoric objects of great value. Many of the relics were of a strange variety and unknown to science.

From time of discovery until Uncle Sam took a hand there was a steady flow of rare pottery, objects of age old Indian art and decorations into the hands of collectors, according to United States District Attorney Thomas J. Sparks, of Louisville.

Certain relic collectors and exporters began to lose faith in their purchases and their source and complained to the government. An investigation started.

Work Shop Found
Agents of the government uncovered Indian relics in the hills of Clinton county until they came upon a strange work shop—then was when attention was directed at Gaffey, Bell and Jones.

FIVE DROWN WHEN SEDANS ARE DRIVEN OFF OPEN BRIDGE

ABERDEEN, Wash., Mar. 8.—Five men were drowned and three others were injured when two sedans drove off an open end of the Wahluke bridge near here, early today. One of the automobiles failed to function.

The dead are: Carl Corey, driver of the first machine; L. T. Corey, Carl's father; Charles Porter, driver of the second car; Jim Collins; a man named Peterson.

The three men to escape from the closed automobile were: Joe Corey, brother of Carl Corey; Geo. Read and Al Smith.

All of the eight men were loggers and were traveling from Grass Creek to Cosmopolis.

It was said that Corey did not see the bridge open and whizzed off the span into the murky darkness before he had realized what had happened. The second machine, driven by Porter, was closely following the first automobile and it also plunged into the river before Porter could apply the brakes after witnessing the leading car disappear.

CHRYSLER TO ERECT KING OF BUILDINGS

NEW YORK, Mar. 8.—Walter P. Chrysler, motor magnate, announced today details of the tallest skyscraper in the world which he will build as a personal investment.

The building, 68 stories high, will dominate the Grand Central district, which now has a skyline marked with the peaks of tall buildings. The Chrysler building will occupy a site facing on Lexington avenue between 42nd and 43rd streets. Its cost is estimated at \$15,000,000.

It will rise 800 feet to exceed the Woolworth tower by 17 feet. The building proper will be 56 stories, above which will rise a dome of 12 stories.

Sub-Boat Lung Successful At 200-Ft. Depth

NEWEST, Fla., Mar. 8.—The newly developed artificial "lung" for use in escape from disabled submarines on the ocean floor, has been proved successful from a depth of 200 feet in the final tests conducted in Florida waters.

Lieutenant C. N. Momen, and Chief Torpedoman Edward Kallinowski yesterday overcame the tremendous pressure of 200 feet when they stepped out through a hatch on the deck of the submarine S-4, and rose to the surface approximately nine minutes later unharmed.

Momen, who invented the oxygen mask device, which somewhat resembles the gas mask in use during the war, and Kallinowski have made repeated successful tests with the "lung" from varying depths, but yesterday was their first venture at great depths.

The men, in escaping from the sub, entered a water tight hatch on the boat's deck singly. Standing erect, each man allows sea water to enter the hatch through a valve. When the air inside the hatch has been compressed to an equal pressure with the water outside, the water stops rising in the hatch, and the man opens an outer door and steps out.

Both Momen and Kallinowski were aided in making their way to the surface by lines attached to the submarine and held on the surface with buoys. The journey from the sub to the surface is made slowly, to allow the body to acclimate itself to the changing pressure.

COLUMBIA GORGE BUS SYSTEM BUYS CONNECTING LINES

PORTLAND, Mar. 8.—Purchase for a consideration of \$145,000 of additional connecting lines giving the Columbia Gorge motor coach system uninterrupted entry into Salt Lake City, was announced here last night by W. T. Crawford, president and general manager of the gorge lines. The Columbia Gorge company now operates between Portland and Pendleton.

The systems involved in the transaction are the New Hives Stages, Inc., operating between Twin Falls, Idaho, and Salt Lake City, and the Blue Mountain Transportation company, running stages between Twin Falls and Pendleton.

Crawford said the acquisition of the lines provides a direct 900-mile line from Portland to Salt Lake City.

Schedules on all runs will be revised, the general manager announced, and fifteen new motor stages will be placed in operation. Capital stock of the Columbia Gorge system has been increased from \$200,000 to \$500,000. It is said the new stock has been absorbed by Motor Transit Incorporated, which recently acquired the California Transit corporation and Yellow Line, transcontinental lines.

DYNAMITE SLAYS FIVE; FOUR OTHERS MAY NOT SURVIVE

SCRIBNER, Neb., Mar. 8.—Five men were killed and thirty persons were injured in an explosion of dynamite late last night during a barn fire at the home of Carl Hollander, county supervisor.

The dynamite had been stored in the barn for blasting of ice choked streams.

The dead are: Gus Patrick, Fred Keltner, Guy Clark and two mechanics, strangers in Scribner.

Four of the injured may die, doctors said.

Pittack, Keltner and Clark were city firemen. They were caught by the explosion which occurred without warning ten minutes after the fire was discovered.

Firemen approaching the place were told by a spectator that there was no danger of explosion as there were no caps with the dynamite. Hardly had this assurance been given before a tremendous blast rocked the countryside.

Those most seriously injured in the hospital are: William Strube, broken leg, body mangled; Art Schoenbeck, injuries undetermined; unconscious; Fred Pascher, fire chief, arm broken; possible skull fracture; Elmer Spell, crushed chest, arm broken in two places.

Mellon Undecided on Date
of Resignation From
Treasury; Cabinet
Men Confer.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8.—Robert P. LaMont, chosen by President Hoover to be secretary of commerce, told newspapermen at the White House today he is "playing the game with this administration" and had resigned as a director of the association against the prohibition amendment.

He said he had been requested at one time by a friend to join the association and that "we all do some things for friendship." He added that when he had become a member of the organization the prohibition situation was "intolerable" and that he thought lawless conditions still existed.

Mellon Undecided
Despite reports which have been circulated that Secretary Mellon will retire as head of the treasury after serving a year in the cabinet of President Hoover, it was learned today that he has no definite time for his departure.

Mr. Mellon has wished to be in position to devote time to his own business but which he left it to come into the government service. His operations had been perfected to a point where his absence did not affect the business. It has been one of the chief desires to perfect the organization and operation of the treasury to the same point before retiring and this work is regarded as having been nearly completed.

Hoover Meets Aides
President Hoover met with his cabinet today for the first time, outlining in a broad way the general lines of his administration.

THREE BURNED TO DEATH IN PLANE

PORTLAND HONORS CHINESE

PORTLAND, Mar. 8.—The body of Toy Quo, pauper, aged 100 years, today rested in the Chinese section of Lincoln memorial park here, and not in a pauper's grave. Toy Quo, pedler, philosopher, philanthropist, died Sunday in the county hospital. Funeral services were held yesterday and attended by many prominent in Portland's civic life, including two former governors, Oswald West and Ben W. Olcott. For thirty years Toy Quo peddled flowers, cigarettes and philosophy on Salem streets. Then he moved to Portland and for twenty years followed the same pursuit. Of the earnings of fifty years he kept only enough to feed and cheaply clothe himself. The rest he gave to those who had less than he.

LINDY TO FLY AGAIN

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 8.—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, who has only just regained the use of his right arm injured in the crack-up of his airplane here more than a week ago after a pleasure flight with his fiancée, is back in his favorite role of good-will flier. President Portes Gil today was to turn from his active direction of the war against the insurgents to christen the trimotored plane in which the colonel will inaugurate the new air mail service between this city and Brownsville, Texas. The flight will be made tomorrow, starting at 7:45 a. m.

SLAYER ELUDES POLICE

MIAMI, Fla., Mar. 8.—An all-night search failed to disclose any sign of Eddie Wilson, wanted for the murder of Thomas "Fatty" Walsh, while police believed he still was in hiding somewhere in the vicinity of Miami. Wilson, alleged gambler and gangster, was named in a murder warrant last night as the man who shot the former bodyguard of Arnold Rothstein as he sat in a card game in a luxurious suite in a hotel here late Wednesday night.

Wilson was said to have been proprietor of a gambling "layout" that occupied a fourteenth floor suite of the hotel. The suite was leased by K. E. Gaylor, and Walsh and Arthur Clark, who was wounded at the time Walsh was killed, were understood to be associated with them.

The Walsh killing Wednesday night was the signal for the opening of a concerted drive on gambling within the county by Sheriff M. P. Lehman. A number of gambling halls were raided last night, and the sheriff declared he will continue the campaign.

MAN TRIES SUICIDE

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 8.—His throat terribly slashed, C. S. Wallace, believed to be from Outlook, Wash., was in a hospital here today in a serious condition. Police said he attempted to end his life by slashing at his throat with a razor. Among Wallace's belongings was found a discharge from company C, fourth Washington infantry, giving his home address as Outlook. He had written a note to "the chief of police, Portland," in which he took full responsibility for the attempted suicide but gave no motive. PASSENGERS FROM HAVANA FORCED TO YIELD WET GOODS

NEW YORK, Mar. 8.—An extraordinary force of 123 customs men searched 400 passengers of the liner Shawnee, arriving today from Havana via Miami, asked large quantities of liquor and imposed fines aggregating \$800.

A fine of \$5 for every large bottle found was imposed and \$1 for each small one. In addition 20 bottles were found in suitcases, but on which no fines were levied as it was considered useless to try to find claimants.

The passengers were greatly surprised as they began to disembark. Ordinarily they would have been permitted to walk ashore with their baggage without a search as their bags had been inspected by the customs at Miami.

Customs officials calculated that every third passenger had a supply of liquor and there were as many women as men among the offenders.

Some of the passengers, noticing the customs men, returned hurriedly to their cabins, unloaded their liquor and spread the word to fellow passengers who also left bottles behind them.

EL PASO, Texas, Mar. 8.—El Paso, Texas, Mar. 8.—Soldiers of the government, defeated today by rebels in a battle for control of Juarez, will be disarmed and temporarily interned at Fort Bliss, Texas, under an arrangement made today at a conference between Gen. Miguel Valles, head of the rebel forces who captured Juarez; Gen. Mathias Ramos of the federal garrison, and Brig. Gen. George Van Horn Moseley of the American forces in El Paso. They conferred on the international bridge, reaching an agreement to halt hostilities.

JUAREZ, Chihuahua, Mexico, Mar. 8.—Raked by artillery, its principal streets transformed to a battleground, Juarez fell today before the onslaught of the invading revolutionaries after a sanguinary siege which completely routed defending federal forces.

Bombardments from rebel artillery left the Sixteenth of September street, the city's famous thoroughfare, littered with the dead and dying while the insurgents charged in mounted columns against the fleeing federals. A battle that (Continued on page 3.)

\$300,000 FORTUNE IN OKLAHOMA OIL FALLS TO WORKER

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 8.—Robert Edwards, 32, of this city, who has been a working man most of his years, supporting an aged mother and sister, learned yesterday that oil lands near Tulsa, Okla., have enriched him by \$300,000. Edwards heard news of his good fortune from John Stone, Oklahoma City attorney and executor of the estate of Edwards' grandfather, John Haugh, who died 2 years ago in Australia.

"I don't see any reason why I should quit work now," said Edwards. "Perhaps I'll buy a small automobile and pay off a few debts, but I won't allow money to make me lazy."

Edwards obtained a leave of absence from the construction company which employed him in order to visit his mother, Mrs. Katherine Edwards, and his sister, Laura May, who live in Los Angeles. Mrs. Edwards is the mother of fifteen children who live in various parts of the country. She heard the news of the wealth yesterday, her sixty-seventh birthday.

CHEAP GAS FOR 3 YEARS FORECAST

LOS ANGELES, Mar. 8.—Indication that low gasoline prices may prevail in southern California for the next three years was seen by filling station men in the offering today by two major companies of contracts to furnish oil for this period at 13 to 15 cents per gallon.

W. Stockman of the Independent Sugar Service Station association pointed out that the top price quoted is one cent below the top figure at the time the "war" began, and minimum offered is one cent under the present wholesale rate.

Retail prices in the metropolitan district averaged 10 1/2 cents, with a maximum of 12 1/2 cents per gallon.
