EX-POLICE CHIEF, CREDITED WITH 200 SLAIN, EXECUTED

MEXICO CITY, Mar. 8.—The execution of General Jesus Palomera Lopez, former chief of the military police of Mexico City, removed one of the most picturesque figures in this country has ever known. He was accused of attempting to turn his regiment over to the rebels.
Tall, of military build and hard of face, General Lopez was all the more imposing because of his fearful reputation. His friends were few and to mention his name was sufficient to strike terror into the hearts of many.
He variously was credited with having killed from 200 to 500 men and it was said twice in his prison almost covered the hands.
Most of his victims, according to public accounts, were civil prisoners accused of one crime or another and judging from tales the people tell his short effective punishment relieved the courts of much travail.
Although General Lopez denied the government's charge of treason, documents allegedly found in his possession were held to be convincing proof.
Known as "the butcher" during his term as chief of police, General Lopez faced the military judges stolidly and heard his sentence of death without a whimper.
Less than an hour later he was taken in an army truck to the San Lazaro marksmanship school on the road to the Valbuena airfield for execution.
Using an automobile headlight as a lamp and the aid of an army motorcyclist on which to rest his rifle, he wrote a last letter to his wife. Just as dawn was breaking unblinded he faced the firing squad and fell a martyr.

AIRCRAFT OUTPUT INCREASE IN 1928 PUT AT 140 PER CT.

(Associated Press Special Wire) NEW YORK, Mar. 7.—Aircraft output figures released today by the Aeronautical Chamber of Commerce of America show an increase of 140 per cent in commercial aircraft production in 1928. Approximately 5,000 planes and 3,500 aircraft motors were built in the United States last year with a valuation of more than \$75,000,000. Of these 3,750 were commercial ships and 2,675 were commercial motors, the rest being for military use.
In the commercial field biplanes outnumbered monoplanes two to one, but the valuation of the monoplanes was greater. This is explained by the increasing use of biplanes for small open cockpit ships and of monoplanes for larger cabin jobs.
The figures place Wichita, Kan., in the lead for production with 927 planes built during the year. New York is second with 837 planes but the value of the New York ships was more than twice that of the Wichita output, there being many more large planes.
In the number of planes built Ohio was the third state with 816, Missouri fourth with 736, Colorado fifth with 341, Illinois sixth with 245, Michigan seventh with 191, and California eighth with 140.
The estimated gross value of aircraft built in various states follows: New York, \$8,000,000; Missouri, \$3,500,000; Kansas and Michigan, \$3,000,000 each; Ohio, \$2,500,000; California, \$1,500,000; Colorado, \$750,000; and Illinois, \$500,000.
New Jersey and Connecticut led in engine production with Michigan, New York and California following in that order.
