KELLOGG PACT WAR BARRIER. BRITISH LEADER STATES

(Associated Press London Wire)

GENEVA, Mar. 8.—Sir Austen Chamberlain, in an interview with the Associated Press, said he had always regarded the Kellogg pact for the renunciation of war as one more barrier erected by international cooperation against war.

"Let me say definitely and explicitly that I said nothing to belittle the importance of the Kellogg pact," he said. "If I had done so, it would have been in contradiction with every public utterance I have made since the pact was proposed to us and would be directly contrary to the spirit in which both the British government and the British people welcomed and supported Mr. Kellogg's initiative."

"Since I spoke to the British press I have had an opportunity which I had not then of reading President Hoover's inaugural address and though our thoughts were naturally expressed in different language, I discover no great difference between what the president said and what I said to the press here."

"I have always regarded the Kellogg pact as one more barrier erected by international cooperation against war. It comes to confirm and fortify engagements already taken under other auspices by many nations. It is common ground to us all that these engagements, valuable as they are for the maintenance of peace, are not absolute guarantees against war."

"Peace, said the president, will become a reality only through self-restraint and active effort in friendliness and helpfulness. It is to such a cause in international outlook and in the standards in international relations that I, like the president, look to make real and solid the improved conditions which already reign among us."

SILENT TONGUE FORCES OUSTER OF OLYMPIAD WINNER

NEW YORK, Mar. 8.—Ray Barbuti, Olympic 600-meter champion, will remain suspended from amateur competition until he identifies the A. A. U. official he has charged knew that certain track and field athletes were receiving money to require.

A four-hour session of the registration committee of the metropol-

itan association, A. A. U. last night, with Barbuti and several newspapermen as witnesses, failed to develop any new facts which might have permitted the suspension to be lifted.

Barbuti denied many of the published statements attributed to him but stoutly insisted his charges as to over-payment on expenses accounts were true and that a "certain A. A. U. official" knew of it.

Efforts of Joseph A. Reilly, president of the association, to get Barbuti to identify this official met with failure. Barbuti said it would be very unparliamentary to give the name. He has retired from track competition.

LADY DEMOCRATS URGE RESIGNATION OF JOHN J. RASKOB

WASHINGTON, March 8.—A resolution demanding the resignation of John J. Raskob as chairman of the democratic national committee was unanimously adopted yesterday by the National Woman's Democratic Law Enforcement league at its second annual convention.

"For the good of the democratic party," read the resolution, "we demand that this Tammany leader pay off the debt he incurred in the name of the democratic party and at once resign, and that a competent leader acceptable to the majority of our party be appointed to succeed him."

Mrs. Catherine Wainich McCulloch, a Chicago lawyer, told the women that the democratic party was desperately in need of help and support at this time.

"In spite of the fact that all the members of our organization voted for Mr. Hoover, the republican, nevertheless we should all be democrats," she said.
