REBELS TAKE JUAREZ AFTER SHORT BATTLE

begin at dawn had brought to the rebels possession of all the government's seven strongholds shortly before noon.

General Matias, commander of the federal forces in Chihuahua, fled with his handful of followers to find shelter on the shore of the Rio Grande in plain view of hundreds of Americans in the Texas city of El Paso.

Stray shots fired from the Mexican battalions wounded one boy on the American side, Louis Chavez, a lad of six. Several bullets crashed through the windshields of automobiles and one smashed through the window of an El Paso home, but no one was injured other than the boy.

The list of dead in the revolt was completed unofficially today, showing the number of rebel victims at 14, while nine federal were reported slain.

General Miguel Valles, in charge of the rebel forces in command of the city, told a reporter for the El Paso Herald that the lives of none would be endangered, even those who fought against him, if they would come over to the rebel cause.

"Will there be any executions?" he was asked.

"I do not know," he replied. "I have ordered my men not to take anything without paying for it. There will be no looting."

After the first brief fighting today, the defending federal troops, outnumbered 600 to more than 2000, divided into detachments. Part of the soldiers were strung along the bank of the Rio Grande with the hope as a protecting breastwork.

U. S. Refuge Denied

EL PASO, Texas, Mar. 8.—Brigadier General Van Horn Moseley refused permission to General Matias Ramos to gather his Mexican federal troops on the United States side of the international border for an attempt to recapture the city of Juarez which has fallen. General Ramos has established headquarters at the southern base of the international bridge where a small group of federal still are holding out.

Previously General Ramos had refused permission to General Moseley to enter Juarez and confer with the rebel forces, to whom Moseley wished to issue a warning against firing into the United States. It is believed Ramos feared Moseley might be struck by a stray shot.

El Paso Views Battle

EL PASO, Texas, Mar. 8.—Fighting started in Juarez shortly after 6 o'clock this morning between rebel and federal forces. Rebels approached the city on a railroad train from a point eight miles south where they had stopped late yesterday. Federal troops opened fire on the rebels with machine guns mounted on buildings. After the first exchange of shots, the federal forces retired to Stanton and Santa Fe bridges.

The starting of the fighting was plainly visible from El Paso. The heaviest firing was being done just two blocks away from the thickly populated district of South El Paso. The gun fire roused the town and there was much excitement here.

The federal forces in Juarez are estimated at some 600 men, while the rebel forces appeared to number some 2,000 or more.

Many Rebels Fall

The federal machine gun fire took heavy toll of the attackers. Bodies could be seen from this side of the border, sprawled on the pavement of Sixteenth and Seventeenth streets one of the main thoroughfares. No estimate of the casualties has reached here, but it was feared they may be heavy.

As the firing continued, the belief that the city had surrendered waned.

Fifteen of the civilian volunteer defenders of Juarez threw down their guns and under a wild dash for the international bridge when the battle opened. They were halted on the American portion of the bridge and arrested by United States border patrolmen. Their ammunition was confiscated and they were led away.

Plans to Bomb Rebels
After attacking the city from the southwest, the second rebel contingent attacked from the east, but were repulsed after a concentrated machine gun fire was directed at them. They retreated and are believed forming for a second effort.

The Mexican civilian here and a Mexican army battalion are preparing to take off from El Paso in a plane bought by the Mexican government here yesterday. The plane will be loaded with bombs and they will attempt to bomb the main body of the rebel troops.

U. S. Forces Alert

EL PASO, Texas, Mar. 8.—American forces, both civil and military, were prepared for any eventuality here this morning as the battle between federal and revolutionists opened in Juarez. The entire El Paso police force patrolled the south section of the town and United States troops lined the border with machine guns and field artillery trained upon the Mexican side.

Battalions from unembattled Juarez fell on American soil early today. They fell harmlessly near the Rio Grande.

Rebel cavalry charged down the streets of Juarez in what appeared to be their most powerful offensive of the day for control of the important northern railroad center, and point of entry. It was during this thrust that the stray shots reached the American side of the border.

Washington Aide.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 8.—Approval of the Mexican revolution to the American border with the battle at Juarez served today to increase official concern here.

President Hoover and the heads of interested departments are maintaining the best possible contact

with the situation below the boundary line. They are hopeful that the battle at the Mexican city across from El Paso will not endanger American life or property and that no international complications will develop.

The keenness with which the government is surveying the situation was exemplified in last night's conference between President Hoover, Secretary Good of the war department, General Summerall, the army chief of staff, Chairman Board of the senate foreign relations committee and secretary Kellogg. At the conference a general inventory was taken of developments to date and possibilities of the future were discussed.

Thus far no effort has been made to disturb the routine procedure that seeks authority with the commander of the eighth corps area at the Antonio, to take the necessary steps to protect the American side of the boundary in the battle zone. Major General Lanister, commander of that area, has not received any special instructions. It was said.

From centers of activity in Mexico other than Juarez, no startling developments had been reported over night to the state department. Advisers were that Mexico City was quiet and conditions normal.

Ban on Airplanes

Replacement of the embargo of shipment of commercial airplanes from the United States to Mexico was announced today by Secretary Kellogg. The embargo, which was lifted a year ago, is effective at once.

Rebel Chief Escapes

VERA CRUZ, Mar. 8.—General Jesus M. Aguirre has reached the jungle region on the isthmus of Tehuantepec. The train in which he fled this city after the collapse of his revolt was found at Tlaxiaco, Oaxaca, where he had abandoned it. Federal forces continued to follow him on but general is now difficult in the tangled wilds in which he has sought refuge.

The city awoke today to find life almost normal after a week of excitement and battle. Telephone and telegraph services with the capital were restored yesterday and the train service over the Mexican line to Mexico City was scheduled to be resumed today.

The foreign consuls have intervened in behalf of officials whom Aguirre forced to serve his revolt and there have been no reprisals. Persons made prisoners by Aguirre have been released.

Revolt Just—Mrs. Obregon

NOTICE, Aztlán, Mar. 7.—Mrs. Alvaro Obregon wife of the former president of Mexico—who was exiled several months ago—is now living in the seclusion of her modest home in Navajón, Sonora.

The assassin dealt the family a severe blow H. R. Stark, Navajón publisher, who returned last night from Navajón aboard the first

train to arrive from the south for several days, said. The Obregon boys, sons of the former general and president, now playing about in the streets of the town, would be in legitimate military college were their father alive, he declared.

The mention of her ill-fated husband brings tears to her eyes. "I am so sorry there has to be fighting again in Mexico," she said, "I am sure, however, that the cause of the rebellion is right and just. I am proud that the principles of my husband are being upheld. He was true to his country. Mexico was a religion to him. I am troubled because so many of our fine men have to go to war, but I am proud of them."

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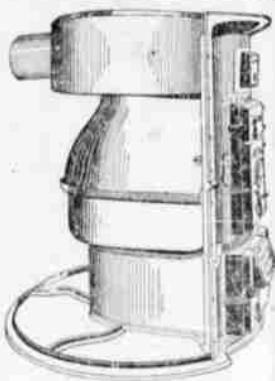
