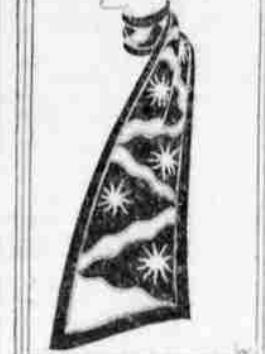
Honors were held by Mrs. Strohmeyer. At the ten hour luncheon was served at the card tables.

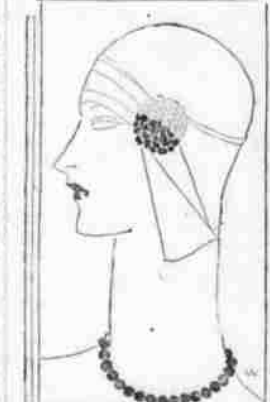
