PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 12.—Eggs and butter prices were unchanged today. Retail prices for eggs as listed at the Vambill street public market by the city market master were 27 and 23 cents. Wholesale buying prices at the dairy exchange were 24 and 23¢. Green peas from the south were down one cent to 19 and 20¢. Rindarb and lettuce continue firm and unchanged. Tomatoes are still flapping at moderately low prices, but when the present supply is depleted an advance was expected. One dealer reports quite a supply of ripe tomatoes on hand. Onions continue weak despite their reported scarcity. Buyers were reluctant to accept offerings. Fruits, poultry and fresh meats showed no change.

FATAL POWDER BLAST

MADERA, Cal., Mar. 12.—Injured in a powder blast which wrecked a burning building, Charles W. Riggs, 20, died today. COTTAGE GROVE JOINS WESTERN TRAFFIC GROUP

By a unanimous vote of the membership of the chamber of commerce, Cottage Grove yesterday joined the Western Oregon Traffic Association, which was organized in Roseburg a few weeks ago, and which now represents nearly a score of the principal cities and towns of the western half of the state. Cottage Grove, which was represented at the Roseburg meeting, did not have a clear understanding of the purposes of the association, and invited the secretary, E. G. Kingswell, of Sutherlin, who was one of the organizers, to address the forum luncheon, held yesterday, in regard to detail the plans of the organization. Mr. Kingswell showed how the larger commercial centers are being developed at the expense of the intermediate points, by securing a low freight rate from one terminal to another, the railroad company making up its loss in handling expense by increasing the short haul rates. This was done, he stated, in face of an interstate commerce regulation which limits the short haul rate to 100 per cent in excess of the long haul. The Southern Pacific, he stated, has kept the excessive short haul rate in effect by continually making applications for rehearings and holding off enforcement of the order while the hearings were continued. The association, Mr. Kingswell explained, is applying to the interstate commerce commission for strict enforcement of the regulation and is asking that there be no further extensions granted the Southern Pacific. A hearing will be held at Portland on the 18th, followed by a session at Medford, where the association will present its data and complaint. The association will also continue its work in the future to endeavor to secure better transportation rates for the intermediate points.
