ANACONDA COPPER VOTES TO DOUBLE ITS SHARES

BUTTE, Mont., Mar. 14.—Stock holders of the Anaconda Copper Mining company, at a special meeting here today, voted to double the present capital stock of the company. Authority was granted to increase the stock issue from 6,000,000 shares of \$50 par value to 12,000,000 shares of the same value.

A total of 3,305,032 shares of stock or more than two-thirds of the stock now outstanding was represented at today's meeting at which J. R. Hobbs, vice-president, presided.

Today's meeting approved the proposal of the board of directors of the company at a meeting March 5 to offer the additional shares to its stockholders at a price of \$55 per share, the funds thus raised to be used for retirement of the principal on \$103,500,000 of first consolidated mortgage bonds, series A, due February 1, 1933. The new stock will be issued to present stockholders at the rate of two shares for each five now held.

KIDNAPERS DEMAND \$50,000 TO RETURN JOSEPH B. DRELL

CHICAGO, Mar. 15.—The whereabouts of Joseph B. Drell, chain cigar store owner, reputed to have amassed a fortune through gambling operations, was still a mystery today although police had previously reported he had been surrendered by kidnapers.

Drell's automobile was forced to the curb yesterday after he had taken his two children to school. Witnesses said three men forced him into their machine at the point of a revolver and drove off. Police were told last night that Drell had been put out of an automobile blindfolded in Niles Center, a suburb, and had taken refuge in a Chicago hotel for the night. Efforts to find him today, however, were futile and police were inclined to believe the telephone calls to a neighbor which reported Drell safe, was a ruse of the kidnapers who had demanded \$50,000 ransom for Drell's release.

CO-DEFENDANT BECOMES ACCUSER OF BANKER

SPOKANE, Wash., Mar. 15.—James C. Harris, co-defendant with E. E. Flood on charges of conspiracy to embezzle approximately \$40,000 from the now defunct Exchange National bank, today pleaded guilty and said he would turn state's evidence. Flood was vice-president of the bank when Harris was its trust officer.
