NEW STEEL FOR JAIL FRONT WILL BE SHIPPED SOON

Shipment for new steel for the jail room in the county court house is expected to be made within a few days. It will be necessary to remove the present front, which has been withstood the six-hour security test, and replace the bars with heavier steel. It will take only a few days, it is believed, to make the change after the new bars are received. The jail crew, however, has not yet received word to start tearing out the front, but are expecting such authority at any time. The company has been urged to rush shipment of the new steel. The jail is being cleaned out today, and the installation of heating and plumbing fixtures will probably be started the first of next week, so that heat may be turned into that section of the building, and the jail put in use, with the exception of the main cage, which cannot be utilized until the new front comes and the floor can be poured.

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 16.—Cattle compared with week ago: Steers 50 to 75 cents higher, heavier calves steady to 50 cents lower. Bulk good steers \$12.50 to \$13.50. Scattering loads available and Thursday at \$12.00 less on shirable steers. Steers \$10.00 to \$11.00. But a few down to \$9.50. Heifers in loads up to \$10.50, down to \$9.50. Cows desirable stock \$8.50 to \$9.50. Cows and calves \$7.50 and calves \$6.50. Bulk light vealers \$14.50. Bulk \$12.50 to \$14.00. Carves \$12.50 down. Heavies and thinners down to \$8.50. Hogs compared with week ago: Feeder pigs steady. Bulk at butchers, including over-lows, \$10.00. Scattering loads steady at \$12.50. Over and under weights \$11.50 down. Extreme heavies mostly 10.50 or better. Bulk packing sows \$2.25 to \$2.50. Mostly \$2.75. Slaughter pigs 10.50 to 10.75.

Sheep and lambs: Quotably steady with week ago. Bulk of sheep brought to arrive. Choice up to 97 pound woolled lambs quotable up to \$16. Yearlings up to \$13. Ewes \$8 down.

PORTLAND, Mar. 16.—Egg and butter prices remain unchanged. Eggs were plentiful and storage has begun in Portland. Prices were not expected to decline any further. Butter was also plentiful with an easy undertone.

Lettuce was higher by 25 cents. Rhubarb was firm. Other fruits and vegetables were around old values.

Poultry and dressed meats were stationary. The jumble orange market has gone on another low price spree. A leading produce firm quoted these Saturday morning at \$1.40 to \$1.65 for a box containing 350 oranges. This wholesale price was lower than that prevailing in a previous price-lowering race.

Oregon City, as before, was leading in the new "war." Merchants there were quoting the fruit at all sorts of prices. BOSTON, Mar. 16.—The Commercial Bulletin today says: "The past week has been less active in wool and prices have been a bit irregular. Tax day and tariff uncertainties have had some to do with this state of affairs, although the market seems fundamentally sound."

"In the west, buying of the new clip has been negligible. The manufacturers are receiving fair initial heavyweights orders. Foreign markets have been fairly steady although some irregularity in crossbred prices is reported and the tendency for such wools still is downward."

"Wool is quiet. Hardly anything is reported in the way of news from the west." The Commercial Bulletin will

publish the following wool quotations today:

Scoured basis: Oregon, fine and f. m. staple \$1.03-1.05; fine and f. m. fr. combing, \$1.00-1.02; fine and f. m. clothing, 95-98; valley No. 1, \$1.02-1.05.

Mahair: Original bag average 12 months Oregon 55-60.

Graded stock: First combing, 65-70; good carding, 45-50.

Broccoli shipments in carload lots will not start before the middle of last of next week, unless the weather should turn warm and wet, according to E. A. Peters, federal inspector. The crop is still being held back by the lack of moisture and warm weather, and there is no immediate prospect of the rate of maturity increasing. Shipments are being made by truck to Portland and Seattle markets, with a fair price being realized. The Melrose and Garden Valley districts are expected to have the heaviest yield. The estimate is placed at about 175 carloads for the county.

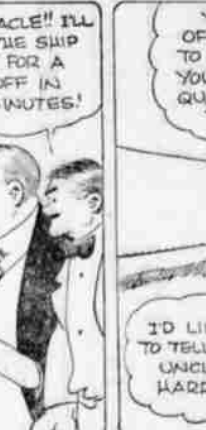
