DRAIN HOOPSTERS WIN SO. OREGON B LEAGUE TITLE

Coos River Defeated in Final Game of Meet Held at Ashland Last Week.

Douglas County Boys Make Fine Showing in Beating Coos County Team by Score of 16 to 10.

Drain high school won the class B basketball tournament conducted by the Southern Oregon Normal school Saturday night, defeating Coos River by a score of 16 to 10. This invitational tournament, which is held annually by the Southern Oregon Normal school, is for the teams of secondary high schools, eighteen teams participating this year for the honors, which the Douglas county boys captured after a series of hard contests.

Coos River, which went into the Coos district tournament at Marshfield, defeating Roseburg senior high, only to lose the district championship to Myrtle Point in the finals, was expected to win the invitational tournament, but Drain high school surprised everyone by their sensational victories, which carried them through the eliminations and up to the finals, where they carried away the class B championship for southern Oregon.

The Drain team was the only Douglas county group to survive the elimination. Port Orford beat Riddle 28 to 17 in the first match of the tournament and Merrill beat Glendale 21 to 12.

In the first championship round Drain won from Merrill 23 to 13 and in the second round Drain beat Central Point 24 to 19.

Coos River trimmed Port Orford 28 to 25 in the first round and beat Malin 23 to 12 in the second round, which brought Drain and Coos River up to the finals. Coos River, which won the consolation trophy last year, was expected to win over Drain, but the Douglas county boys with a brilliant attack, backed by a strong defense, defeated the Coos county team 16 to 10.

The consolation prize was awarded to Powers, last year's champions, who beat Gold Hill 25 to 13.

In the first consolation round Riddle beat Gold Hill 25 to 24 and Glendale was beaten by Powers, 34 to 15.

AL SINGER GETS DISPUTED VERDICT OVER BUD TAYLOR

NEW YORK, Mar. 16.—Al Singer, east side featherweight, again has taken Bud Taylor's measure, and proved his gameness.

Accused of a lack of courage, especially when hit about the mid-section, Singer withstood a terrific body assault to capture a close decision over Taylor in ten furious rounds in Madison Square Garden last night.

The decision was received with considerable criticism by some of the 20,000 spectators, about half the ringside experts and one of the judges. One judge and the referee voted for Singer and the other for Taylor. There were no knock-downs.

Singer won on a foul from Taylor here a month ago and immediately was charged with taking "the easiest way out."

\$100,000 HANDICAP AT TIA JUANA WON BY GOLDEN PRINCE

TIA JUANA, Mexico, Mar. 18.—Golden Prince, winner of the \$100,000 annual Cotroffo handicap at the Tia Juana jockey club track yesterday, will be shipped to Chicago and Kentucky tracks to continue his racing campaign. It was announced today.

Golden Prince came by his victory in the Cotroffo truly in one of the greatest races ever seen at Tia Juana. The "Kentuck Express" beat Nishapur a good long neck for the world's richest stake—a prize of \$98,000 to the winner. Schnitzer was third, beaten off six lengths, and Quick Return, a surprise, fourth.

The race was run in two minutes and two and three-fifths seconds. This equals the record held by Carlaris. The pace was killing, with the quarter in :23 1-5, half in :47 and mile in 1:37 1-4. Golden Prince clocked 112 pounds. Carlaris toted 108. Racing precedent really gave the track record in case of equal times to the horse carrying the most weight, thus entitling Golden Prince to the mile and a quarter record.

MEDFORD JUNIOR HIGH WINS TITLE FROM ROSEBURG

Exciting Contest Decides Southern Oregon Hoop Championship; Score 19 to 16.

Medford junior high school won the southern Oregon junior high school championship 19 to 16 in a thrilling game played here Saturday night. Roseburg staged a brilliant rally in the last few minutes of play, but started their burst too late as Medford had piled up a margin that Roseburg could not overcome in the allotted time.

Roseburg made a poor showing in the first half. Zenor, the regular Roseburg center, was employed out of town and failed to arrive in time to play the first quarter. When he finally reached the gymnasium and got into his suit the game was in the second quarter. He had not warmed up and so did not play his best ball until the second half. At the end of the first half Medford was leading 12 to 7, holding the edge gained during the first few minutes of the game.

The visitors were working a beautiful system of recovery off the bounding board. The Medford center was much taller than any of the Roseburg boys, and four other players on the team would fight to recover the ball off the bounding board passing it back to the center who stayed farther out on the floor where he was uncovered. It took the local boys several minutes to catch onto this system. The Medford boys were also good on long shots. Roseburg's passing attack was not functioning properly and the boys had trouble hanging onto the ball.

In the second half the Roseburg team began to hit its stride, and with the score 16 to 19 in Medford's favor uncorked a wild rally that brought the crowd to its feet.

While the Medford coach glued his eyes to the stop watch to halt the game on the split second Roseburg started cutting down the Pear Pickers' lead. The game ended with the ball in Roseburg's possession under the Medford basket and the score 19 to 16. Had the Roseburg rally started a minute sooner the local boys might have won the contest, as they were gaining rapidly in the last few minutes of play.

"Bucky" Harris to Start New Managerial Work With Material of Fine Promise.

Heavy Hitters, Abundance of Good Twirlers and Stellar Outfield Are on Hand.

PHOENIX, Ariz., Mar. 18.—Whether Stanley "Bucky" Harris plays or not, he is a factor that cannot well be overlooked when the chances of the Detroit Tigers in the forthcoming American league campaign are considered.

"Buck" might be new to the club, but nevertheless he is an experienced hand at putting out good ball teams. His record will attest to that. In the five years that he has been wielding managerial reins, his products never have finished out of the first division.

Considerable interest will center upon Harris' debut with the Tigers for his accession to the manager's job brings them a leader of a type new to Detroit baseball. He has a way of handling the team that is interesting to study. His players readily have accepted them for their pilot and gave him their full confidence and respect.

The ex-Washington pilot believes the team has more speed than last year, boasts both power and pitchers and unlimited pennant spirit.

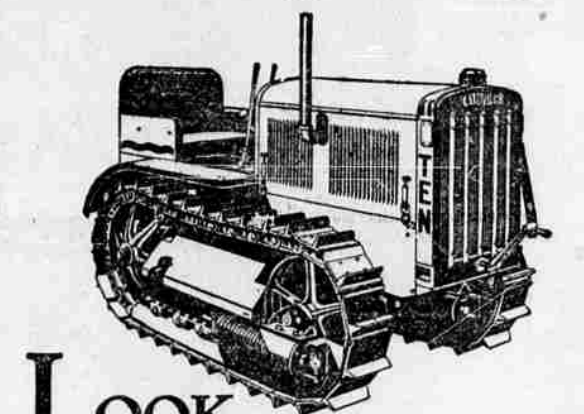
