

## FARM PRICES SHOW INCREASE DURING FIRST 2 MONTHS

Nearly All Lines of Produce Show Gain According to Report U. S. Bureau Agriculture.

The index of the general level of farm prices advanced from 123 to 126 per cent of the pre-war level from January 15 to February 16, according to the bureau of agricultural economics, United States department of agriculture. At 126 the index is 1 point above February, 1928, and the highest February figure since 1926.

The advance in the index of farm prices from January 16 to February 16 was due to higher prices for all grains, fruits and vegetables, cotton, cotton seed, hogs, lambs, chickens and work animals, which more than offset slight declines in the farm prices of beef cattle and veal calves and seasonal declines in butter and egg prices.

Indices of farm prices by groups of commodities changed as follows: Grains advanced 8 points; meat animals, 4 points; fruits and vegetables, 2 points; cotton and cotton seed, 1 point. Poultry products declined 3 points, and dairy products 1 point.

The farm price of hogs on February 16, at \$8.85 per hundred pounds, was about 8.5 per cent higher than on January 16 and approximately 16.5 per cent above a year ago. From January 16 to February 16 the farm price advanced about 11 per cent in the corn belt, 6 per cent in the far west, 4 per cent in the north Atlantic states, 3 per cent in the south Atlantic states, 2 per cent in the north central division and 1 per cent along the south Atlantic seaboard.

These upturns in farm prices of hogs were accompanied by indications of a 3 per cent reduction in the inventory of hogs on farms on January 1, 1936, as compared with January 1, 1935. Receipts of hogs at 7 primary markets during the four-week period ending February 16 were about 15 per cent smaller than during the corresponding period of last year. Due to advances in the farm prices of both corn and hogs, the corn-hog ratio for the United States, at 19.2, was the same on February 16 as on January 16, while the ratio for Iowa advanced slightly from 11.4 to 11.5. The ratios on February 16 compare with 9.6 for the United States and 9.7 for Iowa in February of last year.

Of the grains, corn leads in the magnitude of price change from January 15 to February 15, advancing approximately 8 per cent during the month. The advance in the farm price was fairly general over the United States except for a slight decline along the Pacific coast. On February 15 the farm

price of corn was about 10 per cent above a year ago. The principal factor affecting the farm price advance since January 15 has probably been the continuance of a relatively high export demand. Receipts at 14 primary markets during the week ending February 5 were about 15 per cent smaller than the average for the two preceding weeks and commercial stocks continue to be materially below those of a year ago.

The farm price of wheat advanced about 6 per cent from January 15 to February 15, reaching \$1.09 per bushel for the first time since July, 1925. However, the farm price is still approximately 10 per cent below February of last year. The advance in the farm price of wheat has been accomplished by a decline in commercial wheat stocks in this country and indications of some damage to domestic and European winter wheat crops, due to storms and cold weather with inadequate snow covering.

The farm price of potatoes advanced about 1 per cent from January 15 to February 15, farm price advances of 3 per cent in the south Atlantic states, 5 per cent in the north Atlantic states, 3 per cent in the north central division and 1 per cent in the far west, being almost wholly offset by a 7 per cent decrease in the north Atlantic states. On February 15 the average farm price for the United States was 45 cents per bushel as compared with 46 cents a year ago. Large supplies at producing centers have prevented any material farm price advance for the country as a whole since January 15, 1935.

The farm price of eggs declined approximately 3 per cent from January 15 to February 15. While egg prices were declining 13 per cent in the far west, 11 per cent in the south Atlantic states, 10 per cent in the north Atlantic states and 6 per cent in the north Atlantic states, the farm price advanced approximately 3 per cent in the north central states. The farm price in the north central states was accompanied by decreasing receipts at primary markets due to unfavorable weather conditions. In the remaining states, the farm price continued a seasonal downward trend due to the fact that the farm price in these areas is largely governed by local market conditions.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 16.—The difference in views between Warden John Snook of the Atlanta federal penitentiary and the department of justice over use by the department of "under cover" agents in the prison may result in congressional action.

Senator Borah, republican, Idaho, is expected to confer with Attorney General Mitchell on the Snook case soon. The department has said that if Snook's resignation is submitted it will be accepted. He is understood to be ready to submit it if the sole complaint against him is his objection to the use of "under cover" agents.

While not prepared to take sides in the Snook controversy until he is informed of all facts, Senator Borah is outspokenly opposed to the employment of the "spy" system in the federal prisons which he regards as a step backwards by 200 years.

Production for the first nine weeks of 1935 for the lumber trade was 1,399,325 feet, or 52.1 per cent below the weekly operating capacity of these mills for the period. ## FIGHT IS WAGED AGAINST LEPROSY IN PHILIPPINES

May 1st, the anniversary of the battle of Manila, has been designated as Philippine Day by the trustees of the Leonard Wood memorial for the eradication of leprosy, and every town, city and village in the United States has been asked to join in this observance.

On May 1st, 1927, Major General Leonard A. Wood appealed to the American nation for a fund of \$2,000,000 to eradicate leprosy in the Philippines, where the largest colony of this pitiful human beings found anywhere, are living under the Stars and Stripes. The response was instantaneous, over \$1,000,000 having been contributed; and on May 1st, 1929, an effort will be made to reach the objective of the campaign—completing the removal of this great scourge of the world from the Philippines Islands.

J. H. Booth is chairman of the local committee in charge of arrangements. There are 3,000,000 lepers in the world, 12,000 of whom are on the Philippine Islands alone; and Cebu, an island 200 miles south of Manila has facilities for caring for 6,000 of them.

Very little attention was paid to the leprosy problem in the Philippines before the United States assumed responsibility for its government. It was then estimated that there were ten thousand lepers in the islands, their existence comparable only to a living death. They were doubly afflicted, for besides suffering from this dread disease, they were also subject to ostracism and social privations due to extreme poverty.

On this island, the lepers have built up a real community, many of them leading surprisingly normal lives in spite of their physical condition. Some of them live in little huts, made of palm or grass, with thatched roofs. Then there are steel-reinforced concrete houses, long and low, each dwelling divided into several rooms, where groups of lepers live. These farm, have their own gardens, and sell merchandise to each other. They have organized their own orchestras and athletic associations; and they have an open-air theatre, reading rooms, a hospital, schools for the children, and stores. They even celebrate various holidays and have fiestas.

It is an astounding fact that children of leprosy parents are born clear of leprosy and are not carriers. Yet there are at Cebu today hundreds of unfortunate boys and girls, as yet unborn by the dread disease, but destined to live in a leper colony and finally themselves to become victims, for the present children's home is too small to accommodate another child.

To spare the children of leprosy this monstrous fate, \$100,000 of the amount raised will be expended in erecting a new and more adequate building.

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There are many who are classed as real experts. The conference next year will meet at the University of California at Los Angeles on the invitation of Dean Earl J. Miller of that institution.

CHRISTIAN SCIENCE CHURCHES

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## HEAVY PENALTIES AWAIT MOVIE FOLK ON TAX RETURNS

(Associated Press Los Angeles Wire) LOS ANGELES, Mar. 15.—Continuing its operations against income tax counselors who made at longed fraudulent returns for their movie clients, the government today sought indictment by the federal grand jury of at least one more tax expert.

A new list of screen celebrities, the names of whom are withheld by United States Attorney Samuel W. McNabb, were scheduled to appear this morning before the grand jury to testify as to methods pursued by the accused tax advisors in fabricating returns.

The revelations in connection with the indictment of Miss Marjorie Berger, Hollywood tax counselor, for alleged falsifications in tax statements of several film notables still further discovered that McNabb made public the fact that the government does not contemplate criminal proceedings against the film stars, but said they undoubtedly would be heavily penalized by the government for the assertedly falsified tax statements.

The United States attorney gave it as his opinion that the motion picture celebrities involved had acted on advice of the tax counselors and without criminal motive.

DISCARDED WIFE EXPOSES \$6,000 INSURANCE FRAUD

(Associated Press Los Angeles Wire) BUDAPEST, Hungary, Mar. 16.—Five years ago, in order to marry his sweetheart, Josef Bako, a named man, secretly examined the body of a brother, carried it home, dressed it in his own clothes, placed his own wedding ring on the dead man's finger and lied after setting the house afire.

The authorities, finding the charred body which they believed to be that of Bako, certified to the death and Bako's wife collected \$6,000 in insurance for the destroyed building and \$350 on her husband's life insurance policy. She remarried the following year.

To her surprise, however, she recognized Bako on the street yesterday, and had him arrested. On being questioned at police headquarters, Bako was said to have confessed the unusual fraud and today was held for bigamy and vandalism.

SWEDISH BRIDE ELECT NAMES NORWEGIAN MAIDS

(Associated Press Los Angeles Wire) OSLO, Norway, Mar. 16.—Princess Martha of Sweden has paid Norway a graceful compliment by choosing four of her bridesmaids from among Norwegian girls.

Like the democratic modern princess she is, she has not confined her choice to daughters of royal families. Miss Ingrid Nansen, daughter of Professor Fritz Nansen, the Norwegian Arctic explorer, is one of the bridesmaids who will accompany her to the altar when she marries Prince Olaf on March 21.

The other three Norwegian bridesmaids are young girls closely related to court circles.

CALL MONEY RATES MAY ADVANCE TO 15 PER CT.

(Associated Press Los Angeles Wire) NEW YORK, Mar. 16.—Heavy week-end profit taking caused considerable irregularity in today's stock market. Selling pressure was particularly effective against the motor and chemical shares, while the coppers, oils, and rubbers gave the best exhibitions of group strength.

The belief is widely entertained in Wall street that next week will witness another stringency in call money, some observers forecasting rates as high as 12 to 15 per cent. With copper now selling at 21 cents a pound, assuring immense profits for most of the leading producers, there was a revival of activity and strength in the copper shares.

Radio (old stock) dropped 5 points on a few sales but the new stock held within a point or two of yesterday's closing price. Matheson alkali broke 64 points and Allied Chemical, Packard Motors, Yellow Truck, Hudson Motors, Bethlehem Steel and U. S. Steel common sold down 2 points or more.

J., a sweetheart of her childhood, employed as a clerk.

The marriage, says the newspaper, took place last January 1, but was kept secret to avoid publicity during their honeymoon, from which they have just returned.

The American says Mr. and Mrs. S. R. Guggenheim, parents of the bride, made the announcement and are thoroughly in accord with their daughter's marriage.

Mrs. Wettach is 25 years old and became acquainted with her husband when the Guggenheims had a home at Elberon, N. J., not far from Deal, where Mr. Wettach, Sr., conducted a riding academy. The two young people soon became friends and often rode together about Elberon.

PETITION ASKS PAROLE FOR BANKER J. V. BURKE
