UNIVERSITY OF OREGON REGENTS ORDER BUILDINGS

(Associated Press Leased Wire) EUGENE, Ore., Mar. 17.—The board of regents of the University of Oregon yesterday approved the resolution dividing equally the \$250,000 appropriated by the legislature for extension and research work of the University and Oregon State college, thus making the funds available at once. The resolution had already been approved by the college regents.

The university regents also authorized construction under the direction of the building committee of a new medical clinic in Portland, to cost \$100,000 to be paid from funds given by the general education board.

Construction of a fine arts building on the university campus was authorized. This building will cost \$150,000 and is expected to be under construction by May 1.

The building committee was authorized to proceed with construction of a new infirmary on the campus, to cost \$100,000, as soon as \$50,000 to match the state appropriation has been raised. It is planned to have construction under way by July 1.

The regents today heard the legal opinion of I. H. Van Winkle, attorney general, that the present board can enter into contracts and transact other business until the new board of higher education takes charge of July 1, and that all acts of the present regents will be binding on the new board.
