UMPUQUA COUNTRY NATIVE SON, 1852, ROSEBURG VISITOR

Mr. H. Putnam, residing about five miles west of Drain on the road to down river points, was in town today looking after business matters. But the business transactions that brought Mr. Putnam to Roseburg are not what interested the News-Review man who met the gentleman. Rather it was the fact that this pioneer farmer and stockman has lived on the place below Drain, through which Elk creek flows, for pretty much all of the 77 years of an active life. In fact, the home of this pioneer is a part of the old donation land claim owned by his grandfather. Mr. Putnam was born in what was at that time known as the Umpqua country in 1852. His father, Chas. F. Putnam, came to the Oregon country in '48, and was one of that ill-fated Donner party that passed through the harrowing experiences in the Sierras the winter before. Mr. Chas. F. Putnam was a printer by trade, and after reaching Oregon City was employed on the Oregon Spectator, published in that town before Portland boasted of a newspaper. While an employee on that publication, Mr. Putnam met Miss Rose A. Applegate, daughter of a pioneer who came west in the first wagon train in '43, and a little later these two were married, subsequently moving to the Umpqua country. Born in this section of the southern Oregon country in 1852, the pioneer and native son who came to Roseburg today, despite his 77 years, is still rugged and delights in caring for a few purebred Jersey cows and a flock of sheep. He does his own work, shins his Jersey cream each day, and with Mrs. Putnam enjoys his every-day experiences on the old farm. In speaking of his trip to Roseburg today Mr. Putnam stated that he does not find time to get away from home very often, as his work keeps him closely coupled, and as he takes pride in the Jerseys and the sheep, he is contented to stay on the job and keep things moving along as they ought on every well-regulated ranch.
