other belongings today in the worst flood since 1872. Augmented by thousands of mountain streams, lakes and other tributaries, the swollen waters of the Danube were rushing past towns and villages along the banks, throwing huge ice barriers around Bratislava and other towns, completely isolating them.

Czechoslovak artillerymen and engineers, after failing to demolish 40-foot ice barriers with mortars, howitzers and high explosives, bored large holes in the masses of ice and inserted large projectiles which they exploded by electricity. The terrific detonations of the shells startled the populations with revived memories of the world war.

The great river, which is choked with millions of tons of thawing ice, was rising steadily and threatening further disaster. Church bells tolled along its 1,500 mile length warning riparian dwellers to flee for their lives.

At many places peasants drove their cattle before them and carrying household effects on their backs, groped their way across hastily built pontoons on the Danube. In the darkness the cries of women who had lost their children could be heard. To add to the confusion, the entire electrical system broke down. Invalids, and aged and ill had to be carried on the shoulders of soldiers and placed in ambulances.

Scores of outcast dogs driven from their haunts by the rising waters invaded villages and in some cases attacked the fleeing fugitives.

The cities of Karlsruhe and Bismarck were under water, the inhabitants taking refuge in schools, churches and theaters when their frail wooden homes collapsed under the fury of the Danube's waters.

Losses were estimated at several million dollars.

**CARNATION CO. UNITES
TEN PORTLAND DAIRIES**

PORTLAND, Ore., Mar. 20.—A consolidation of ten Portland dairies under the name of the Carnation Farm Products company has been announced here. The consideration involved the transfer of the ten plants to new ownership is said to have been two million dollars. The purchaser is closely affiliated with the Carnation milk products, manufacturers of evaporated milk, operating in Oregon since 1920.

The companies united under the new organization are the Portland, Danvers Milk company, Fernwood dairy, Riverview dairy, vine brook dairy, Green Hill dairy, lodge dairy, Modern dairy, Holsteinerwald dairy, Oregon creamery and Rainbow Products company.

The identity of these companies will be preserved and they will continue to operate under the same management.

HOOVER ASKED TO
REQUEST HYDE TO
TELL FARM PLANS

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—President Hoover was requested today by Representative Dickinson, Republican, Iowa, to have Secretary Hyde appear before the house agriculture committee and explain the president's views on farm relief.

Mr. Dickinson said that in view of the fact that the chief executive's ideas would not reach congress normally until his message is read at the outset of the special session, it would be extremely helpful if the committee in its deliberations before that time could have some specific knowledge of Mr. Hoover's views.

The president, while not intending to dictate the terms of the farm relief measure to be considered at the coming session, is ready at any time to discuss the agricultural situation with interested members of the senate and house, but he has indicated that there will be no public explanation of his views until his message to congress is read.

Although he declined to reveal Mr. Hoover's reaction to his proposal, Mr. Dickinson said after the conference that he was hopeful the president would approve his suggestion.

The legislative program for the extra session of congress was discussed today by President Hoover and Representative Tilson of Connecticut, the republican leader of the house, who said afterwards that it still was the intention to limit legislation very sharply and that the work should be completed within two or three months.

Discussing reports that he might be appointed governor general of the Philippines to succeed Henry L. Stimson, secretary of state, the republican leader said that as important as he considered that post, he would not give up his present position. He did not say that the appointment had been offered to him.

HOME POINTERS
(From School of Home Economics, O. S. C.)

When preparing fresh crabs for the table an unusual flavor may be obtained by cooking them in a solution of salt water to which has been added one cup of vinegar and whole spices to taste.

Tapoca placed in the bottom of fruit pies will absorb the juices and keep the pie from becoming soggy.

In the preparation of hash something to give a distinct flavor is needed. With veal, add bacon fat; with beef or lamb, liver is best. Liver added to corned beef hash is good.

A different flavor may be given to roast lamb if the meat is pierced in a number of places with a sharp knife and a bit of onion and green chili pepper crowded into each incision, and then roasted as usual or the onion may be rolled in red pepper and the green pepper omitted.

Celery leaves are especially good in dressing to be served with roast veal. Sausage meat adds a spicy flavor and green pepper and parsley are also good in this dressing.

Poisoning caused by botulism bacteria in home canned meat and vegetables in the northwest could be prevented if the foods were boiled vigorously for 10 to 15 minutes after taking from the can, according to J. E. Stimson, associate professor of bacteriology. Experiments show that animals fed with unheated portions of inoculated foods, soon develop symptoms of botulism and eventually die, while infected foods, which have been boiled to destroy the toxin, cause no ill effects.
