Notice is hereby given that the undersigned will, up to 7:30 P. M., on Monday, the 1st day of April, 1929, at his office in the City Hall in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, receive sealed proposals for the purchase of Aviation Park Bonds in the sum of \$25,000.00.

Said bonds are issued under authority of the Charter of the City of Roseburg, and Ordinance No. 921 as amended by Ordinance No. 924, duly and regularly passed by the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and approved by the Mayor of said City March 6th, 1929, for the purpose of providing funds for the acquisition and maintenance of an aviation park and field as described in Ordinance No. 920. The bonds are in denominations of \$500.00 each, and bear interest at the rate of five percent, per annum, payable semi-annually, and are dated March 1st, 1929, and are payable serially one tenth (1-10) each year, the first payment being payable one year from the date of issue.

COLLEGE STUDENTS DATED FOR MILITARY TRAINING

SAN FRANCISCO, Mar. 19.—More than 500 college students of California, Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana, Utah, Wyoming and Nevada who attended R. O. T. C. units at their schools, will be given summer field training at regular army camps during June and July. This was announced today at a news conference.

Training dates are between July 14 and July 25. Among camp locations, the number of students and branches in which they will be trained, are the following:

Washington: Fort Lewis, medical and dental, 50; ordnance, 40; field artillery, 36; engineers, 31.

Vancouver Barracks, infantry, 73; Fort Worden, coast artillery, 38; Fort George Wright, infantry, 102.

HUNGARIAN NOTABLE HANGS FOR MURDERING FAMILY

BUDAPEST, Hungary, Mar. 20.—Paul Ferenczek, formerly prominent in Hungarian social life, who recently confessed having murdered his wife and three children seven years ago, was hanged today in his confession he attributed his downfall to the "perversion and demoralization of human nature caused by the World war."

Ferenczek, who married three Turkish women after murdering his wife and children, was originally arrested as an active communist and then confessed to the quadruple murder.

Film Couple in Chief Roles of Illness Drama

BEVERLY HILLS, Cal., Mar. 20.—While Mabel Normand often described as the "hard luck girl" of cinema, her latest role in her palatial home here today, waging her desperate battle against the merciless ravages of the "white horror," tuberculosis, her physician, Dr. E. C. Fishbaugh, was calling a consultation to decide whether she should be removed to a sanatorium near Los Angeles.

Unaware that her husband, Lew Cody, well known in movies, and on the stage is back from New York, and now is fighting his battle to "come back" from a state of complete nervous prostration, she struggles on.

It was feared the knowledge of her husband's illness might weaken the slender thread which holds life in the body of the actress who, her friends say, "never turned a hungry man or woman away."

And Cody, grimly fighting his battle against shattered nerves, following an attack of influenza, in a health resort near San Bernardino, doesn't know that Mabel is nearing the valley of the shadows.

He contracted influenza in New York while arranging for a vaudeville tour of Europe. His physicians fear the effect on his already weakened nerves if he learns the sad truth.

X-ray examinations have shown that both of Miss Normand's lungs are badly infected. For days a fever, which kept her temperature at 102 degrees, sapped her strength. Her condition is grave, and her physician was to decide today whether her removal to a sanatorium will aid her struggle to live.

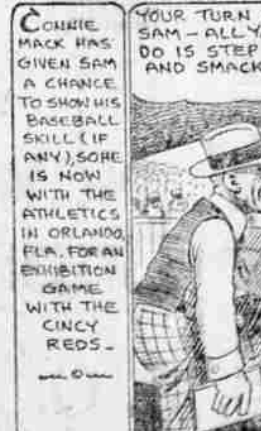

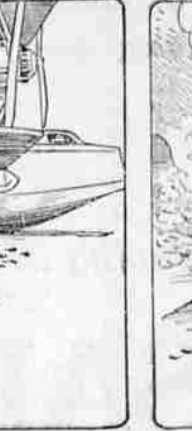
