

# MAN CAPTURED AT DREW HAS A STRANGE ALIBI

KLAMATH FALLS, Mar. 21.—A strange story of temporary lapses of memory induced by a girapendium during the world war has been told authorities by John E. Graham, alleged master forger and auto thief, captured early Saturday morning by Sheriff Lloyd L. Low at Drew, Ore., in Douglas county.

Graham is being held in the county jail while the sheriff is deciding which one of five counties will prosecute him. The sheriff and district attorney of Lake county are expected to arrive this afternoon to confer with Low on the case.

Graham said that he was subject to fits of temporary amnesia and contended that during his sensational check forging spree last week that he was suffering from this malady. Authorities are inclined to laugh at his explanation.

"He can remember where he went from the time he left Klamath Falls, but, strange to say, he claims his mind was an absolute blank when he passed these checks and when he stole a car in Lakeview," Sheriff Low commented.

"He said that shortly after he arrived at Drew he suddenly realized the car he was driving was not his and insisted that he be permitted to turn to Klamath Falls voluntarily and straighten out the matter. Well, he's back and we'll assist him in that respect."

Graham's purported check forgeries covered a period of several days. He passed bad checks in Klamath Falls, Lakeview, Marion county, Jackson county and Josephine county. In Grants Pass, Josephine county, Sheriff Low said, he passed a forged check of \$27.79 on the ex-sheriff of Josephine county, and in Salem he passed a forged check of \$47.50 on the secretary of state for a new automobile license.

"He is the fastest talker I have ever come in contact with," the sheriff quipped. "He claimed he was a member of prominent lodges, and in Grants Pass said he was connected with the Yellowstone national park. As near as I can find out, nobody turned him down."

Graham was formerly employed by George Grizzle of this city.

The bride, who is a year older than her 25-year-old husband, is an expert musician and needlewoman and has been called the prettiest unmarried princess in Europe.

Their marriage brings about a close union between the royal families of Denmark, Norway and Sweden, the three Scandinavian countries. For a while her husband, also is related to King Christian of Denmark, being his niece.

# MASTER PENMAN FORGES WAY OUT OF U. S. PRISON

(Associated Press Leased Wire)

KANSAS CITY, Mar. 20.—Astounded by the revelation that a man forged his way and that other out of the largest federal prison in the country, United States officials today planned to return Hays Van Gorder, recaptured master pen artist, to his cell at Leavenworth, Kansas, and continue a search for C. Von Esch, his companion.

The escape of Van Gorder and Von Esch, accomplished March 2 through forged court orders, was revealed yesterday when Van Gorder, arrested in Milan, Mo., for forging money orders, was recognized by postal inspectors here. He had been brought to Kansas City for arraignment in federal court.

The inspectors who knew Van Gorder well supposed to be in the Leavenworth prison, learned that he and Von Esch had been released on a writ of habeas corpus and these documents purporting to be orders from the United States circuit court at Topeka, Kansas. The inspectors received the fake documents through the mail.

Van Gorder obtained the documents from the clerk of the district court at Topeka last month when he applied for two certified copies of a writ of habeas corpus on which he was to be taken to Cape Girardeau, Mo., for trial on charges of postal theft, according to Alton H. Skinner, assistant United States district attorney for Kansas.

Apparently the documents were mailed to the prison officials by an outside accomplice or slipped into the mail by a convict employed to sort and open letters.

It was recalled by government officials that Van Gorder attempted a similar forgery to escape eight years ago. At that time he forged the United States attorney general's name to a pardon. A friend mailed the "pardon" from Washington in a franked envelope that had been stolen from the office of the attorney general.

Van Gorder had been "dressed out" and was being escorted from the penitentiary when he winked at prison officials investigated. They learned the pardon was a forgery and returned him to his cell.

Van Gorder, 63 years of age, claims to be a graduate of the University of Minnesota and a former school teacher in Minnesota and Wisconsin.

# FAMOUS RUSSIAN CHOIR COMING TO ANTLERS, APRIL 2

An offering which will probably rank as one of the outstanding features of the local musical season is the concert to be given here by the world famous Agrenea Slavlansky Russian Choir which will appear at the Antlers Theater Tuesday, April 2.

Under the direction of Mme. Arlene Slavlansky, daughter of Prince Demitro Agrenea-Slavlansky, who founded the choir in 1840, the group of thirty singers will visit here enroute to New York City, where they are to give their metropolitan debut at the Steinway Hall next month. The choir is coming direct from Japan where they were invited by the Japanese government as a special entertainment for the enthronement ceremony. They stopped off a week in Honolulu, and were acclaimed as the greatest singing organization that Honolulu has ever heard. So big was the demand for seats in Honolulu, that they were forced to give matinees almost every day, and even then Honolulu's biggest theater was not large enough to accommodate the eager throng.

Although the choir is famous for its choral harmony, their work is not confined to singing. They are very versatile, a dozen dancers are included in the choir and a group of ten furnish music on the balalaika, a queer lute-like, but beautiful sounding stringed instrument.

The organization of the choir dates back to 1840, when Prince Demitro was commissioned by the Russian czar to draft 100 of the Imperial opera house and conservatory to form a choir.

An interesting feature of the present choir, a continuation of the original, is that many of its members have been affiliated with the organization from childhood, many of them being direct descendants of members of the original 1840 choir.

With it are still some of the members who made an American tour in the early eighties, at which time the choir appeared in concert at the White House shortly before President Garfield was assassinated.

When Prince Demitro died in 1913, the leadership of the choir was taken over by his daughter Margaret, who will appear here personally with the choir, as its director.
