M., on Monday, the 1st day of April, 1929, at his office in the City Hall in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, receive sealed proposals for the purchase of Aviation Park Bonds in the sum of \$25,000.00. Said bonds are issued under au-thority of the Charter of the City of Roseburg and Ordinance No. 221 as amended by Ordinance No. 224, duly and regularly passed by the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and approved by the Mayor of said City March 6th, 1929, for the purpose of pro-viding funds for the acquisition and maintenance of an aviation park and field as described in Or-dinance No. 229. The bonds are in denominations of \$500.00 each, and

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HEAVIER PAYMENTS OF TAXES REFLECT PROSPERITY GAIN

WASHINGTON, Mar. 21.—An increase of \$75,000,000 or \$80,000,000 in income tax collections for March over March, 1928, was predicted today by Assistant Sec-retary Bond of the treasury. If the prediction is borne out, the total for this month will be approximate-ly \$590,669,000.

The showing of an increase in income despite a cut in the tax rate was regarded by treasury of-ficials as indicating the country was unusually prosperous last year. If the estimates are borne out the income tax payments for the first quarter of the calendar year will exceed those of the first quarter of 1928 by approximately \$73,000,000.

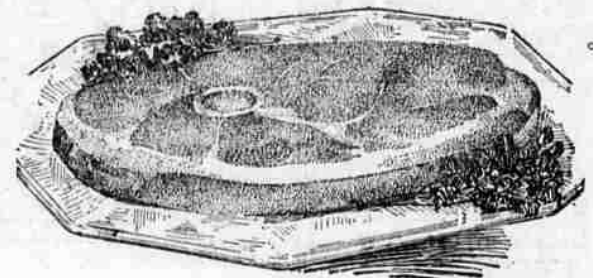
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
