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DRASTIC CRUSADE AGAINST WETS NOT PRESIDENT'S IDEA

Hoover Plans to Re-Build
U. S. Judicial System
and Put Power in
Organizations.

Choosing of Personnel for
Law Enforcement Probe
Commission Proves
Difficult Task.

WASHINGTON, Mar. 19.—President Hoover has no idea of any drastic, dramatic prohibition drives as a means of bringing about the general law enforcement for which he declared in his inaugural address.

The purpose of the chief executive is to build up the enforcement of the laws generally by tightening up the federal organizations and reorganization of the federal judicial system.

Mr. Hoover is undertaking to reduce crime in the United States and in doing so he expects the support of the press and every good citizen of the country.

Selections Difficult
The president is moving with caution in the difficult task of picking those who are to compose his law enforcement commission and the best information available is that he has not yet definitely decided on a single member.

Stories of names have been presented for his consideration, but many of these already have been eliminated for one reason or another, and he now is described as literally scouring the country in the effort to find suitable men who will be willing to undertake so gigantic a task.

The personnel of this commission probably will be more carefully scrutinized by the country than any that has been named, certainly in many years. This will be largely by reason of the fact that an investigation of the enforcement of the prohibition amendment is to be included in its work.

Quiz to Be Thorough
This phase of the whole inquiry will be the one to attract the greatest public attention and probably will require more exhaustive study than any other. Leaders of the organized wets and drys as well as many others will be heard and the testimony of many present and former prohibition enforcement officers will be taken.

In the effort to find the causes of present abuses in the enforcement of the eighteenth amendment, the commission will inquire into federal enforcement statutes to determine whether the abuses are inherent in those laws and if so what changes might reasonably be expected to relieve the situation.

Meanwhile, there are to be increased efforts at enforcement of the Volstead and other dry acts. Enforcement officials appointed or retained by Mr. Hoover are regarded as friendly to the prohibition cause and it is expected that they will be given a free hand in an effort to dry up the country.

President Hoover has not yet announced precisely what enforcement activities now carried forward by the treasury will be transferred to the justice department, nor is it clear whether he holds such transfer can be made without an act of congress.

TURKEY QUEEN OF AMERICA LIVES IN OZARK MOUNTAINS

Flock Captures Prizes All Over the Country and Eggs
Brink \$7.50 Apiece—Uruguay Foremost Producer
of Cattle—Sheep Yielding Many Farmers
100 Per Cent Profit on Investment.

LEBANON, Mo., Mar. 20.—The fable of the goose that laid the golden egg does not seem so improbable to a woman in the Ozark mountains of Missouri, whose flock of turkeys lay eggs that sell for \$7.50 apiece.

She is Mrs. Gladys Honninger, the "turkey queen of the Ozarks," who in a few short years has become the "queen of American Bourbon reds," her turkeys of that breed having swept the prize list at almost every big poultry show in the country.

They took 25 first places, nine seconds, seven thirds, and a number of display prizes and special awards at seven of the larger shows last year, including the International Livestock exposition at Chicago, the Madison Square Garden show in New York, the All-World Turkey show at Dallas and the All-American at Grand Forks, N. Dak.

Only one time in eight years has one of her turkeys taken as low as sixth place, and that when she had four birds competing in the same class.

Has 'Em Well Trained
Mrs. Honninger says Bourbon Reds are not the "wild critters" they are popularly supposed to be. Any bird in her flock will come at her call and follow her like a pampered pup. A hen she calls "Hope" will pose in any position her mistress places her, and "Sensation," a young tom, will spread his feathers and strut at the slightest command. Both paraded for the "movie" men at Madison Square Garden.

The hen, winner of grand champion ribbons, has taken first place at every show in which she was entered.

At the Grand Forks show Mrs. Honninger was asked to put a price on "Lone Star," winner of the highest honors ever awarded a Bourbon Red turkey. She replied that her birds were not for sale, but George W. Hackett, a foremost poultry expert, said \$2,500 would be a conservative price.

Born to the Business
Mrs. Honninger says she never really "entered" the turkey business, but was "born into it."

"I was an only child on my father's farm," she explains, "and naturally the care of the turkeys fell to me. I began to like them and when I was married 16 years ago decided to raise turkeys on some 15 acres of waste land, hills and gullies that could not be farmed. I got Bourbon Reds because I thought they were pretty."

For the same reason—because they were pretty—she entered turkeys for the first time in a poultry show. She says the years of selective breeding and care it has taken to make her flock the outstanding Bourbon Reds in the United States is "nothing." It was easy, she says, because she liked the work.

Asked how she prepares her turkeys for the ring, she replied, "I don't."

"When I first started," she admits, "I washed their feet before they went to the judges, but now I don't even do that."

Show turkeys Mrs. Honninger had out this winter traveled more than 5,000 miles before they returned to their home in the heart of the Ozarks, a mile and a half from Lebanon.

THE WORLD'S CATTLE
WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—The United States has only 58,180,000 of the 629,000,000 head of cattle in the world, a survey of all important countries shows. Nearly one-fourth of the total, or 150,832,000 head, are in British India, while Russia, with 59,180,000, ranks second.

In the ratio between human and cattle population, it is revealed that the United States has but 500 head for each 1,000 population. China is the lowest, with 55, while Uruguay's 5,000 head per 1,000 population leads the world.

Uruguay probably has the greatest density of livestock population in the world, sheep and cattle predominate, the estimated number being about 8,000,000 cattle and twice that number of sheep.

MAN NO RAIN MAKER

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—No human being can "make" rain, the United States weather bureau says. True, a little moisture can be precipitated in the laboratory by the use of special equipment, but to produce 1 inch of rainfall over a square mile, 73,320 tons of moisture would have to be drawn up into the air and then precipitated.

Enormous quantities of energy are used in nature to elevate moisture. It takes from 5,000,000 to 10,000,000 horsepower-hours to evaporate the water in a square mile of the average dense cloud. Even if it could be done by some artificial means, precipitation would be slight because there is not much water in a cloud.

STUDENTS PROTEST OUSTER OF THREE FACULTY MEMBERS

COLUMBIA, Mo., Mar. 21.—Nearly three thousand students at a mass meeting last night decided to appeal to the board of trustees from the decision of the board's executive group ousting three faculty members of the University of Missouri. The board's action was predicated on circulation among students of a sex questionnaire which was held to be highly improper.

Intervention of two professors, both under fire of the board, averted possible violence at the meeting. One was Dr. Harmon O. Degraff, dismissed by the board, effective March 23. The other was Prof. Jesse Wrench, who was reprimanded by the board.

The students adopted a resolution to memorialize the full board of trustees at its meeting April 6 to reconsider the action of the executive board. The resolution asked that the board retain Degraff, Prof. Max Meyer, and O. H. Meyer, student assistant in psychology.

Prof. Meyer is an internationally known psychologist and inventor and has been on the Missouri faculty 25 years.

100 PER CENT ON SHEEP

MINNEAPOLIS, Mar. 20.—Financial statements on many farms where sheep are replacing cattle, show a 100 per cent return on investment.

The experience of Frank and Louise Wettstein, of Conde, N. D., recorded in the office of a farm credit association here where most of the range financing is done, is considered typical for Minnesota and the Dakotas.

In 1925 they bought 30 ewes on a loan of \$48. At the end of the first year they had 56 lambs, sold \$156 worth of wool and 24 wethers for \$210. This amount almost paid the loan, and they still had \$1,000 worth of wool and mutton on the hoof in their 33 ewes in the flock.

VIRGINIA TROUT STREAM SELECTED FOR MR. HOOVER

WASHINGTON, Mar. 20.—Fishing holes for President Hoover in nearby Maryland and Virginia have been acquired through his secretary, Lawrence Richey, so that during the summer week-ends and dull days in the White House, the chief executive may be able to angle for brook, brown and rainbow trout.

The fishing waters in Virginia are at the source of the Rapidan river in Madison county in the Park area. The lease covers 18 miles of the stream.

A lodge will be built and \$14,000 expended to construct a road connecting the fishing grounds with the Madison County Courthouse, a distance of nine miles.

The Virginia area is within a three-hour ride from Washington by automobile and probably will be used almost exclusively for week-end fishing expeditions.

The Maryland ground is 12 miles from Frederick, and probably will be used during the summer when things are slack at the White House.

This property, known as Cacoon Furnace and which once formed a part of the estate of the first governor of Maryland, was bought by Mr. Richey as his own personal property.

Mr. Richey also obtained an eight year lease on several miles of the stream beyond the estate, giving a fishing range of more than ten miles.

President Hoover has abandoned the idea of establishing a summer White House at Mount Weather, Virginia. He will have no summer White House this year's congress will be in session most of the hot months and after it adjourns Mr. Hoover may make his projected trip to the West Indies and possibly Mexico.

No plans have been made for a summer White House next year but the possibility is that the president will spend part of the vacation period at his home at Stanford University, Cal., thus giving the Pacific coast a summer White House for the first time in history.
