NOTICE FOR BIDS FOR AVIATION PARK BONDS

Notice is hereby given, that the undersigned will, up to 7:30 P. M., on Monday, the 1st day of April, 1929, at his office in the City Hall in the City of Roseburg, Oregon, receive sealed proposals for the purchase of Aviation Park Bonds in the sum of \$25,000.00.

Said bonds are issued under authority of the Charter of the City of Roseburg and Ordinance No. 921 as amended by Ordinance No. 924, duly and regularly passed by the Common Council of the City of Roseburg, Oregon, and approved by the Mayor of said City March 16th, 1929, for the purpose of providing funds for the acquisition and maintenance of an aviation park and field as described in Ordinance No. 320. The bonds are in denominations of \$500.00 each, and bear interest at the rate of five per cent, per annum, payable semi-annually, and are dated March 1st, 1929, and are payable normally one tenth (1/10) each year, the first payment being payable one year from the date of issue.

The Council reserves the right to reject any and all bids. Bids must be accompanied by a certified check or draft for the sum of \$500.00 payable to the City of Roseburg, to be forfeited to the City in case the successful bidder shall fail to complete the purchase.
