TO STUDY FISH HABITS
To settle a controversy regarding the question of how long fish that spawn remain out of the Rogue river before returning, and what percentage of them do return to the State Game commission is making a large number of steelheads before they are liberated from egg taking stations. The work is being carried on in the Bear creek and Antelope and Little Butte egg taking stations. The left ventral fin is cut from each fish after it has spawned and is ready for liberation. Sportsmen are being asked to cooperate with the commission and report catches of any of the marked fish. It is believed that this experiment will aid in determining what percentage of the fish return to the Rogue after spawning.

DENNY WILLIAMS, BEAVER FIELDER, KILLED IN WRECK

SAN CLEMENTE, Calif., Mar. 25.—Misfortune overtook the Portland Beavers of the Pacific coast league Saturday night when Denny Williams, centerfielder and former Portland high school boy, was killed in an automobile accident.

Mack Hills and George Wuestling, also members of the Beaver squad, were injured in the accident. Hills was said to be suffering from brain concussion and Wuestling from shoulder and hand injuries which would keep him in from the lineup when the baseball season opens. The automobile plunged over an embankment, killing Williams, after being sideswiped on the highway. The players were returning to their training camp at Anaheim, from San Diego. Williams played with the Boston Red Sox last season.

Williams' wife, who had gone to Mobile, Ala., to attend the funeral of her father, was notified of her husband's death. Williams' remains will be brought to Portland for burial.

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LOCAL GUNNERS MAKE POOR SCORE

Roseburg gunners were forced to face a bad light in their shoot yesterday in the Oregonian's telegraphic contest, and as a result took three losses. The peculiar light condition caused the marks to be at birds thrown towards a glaring hillside and as a result they were unable to judge distances accurately, even the most experienced of the trapshooters being bothered by this condition, so that a score of 71 resulted.
